

Member Profile: Ray & Bernadette Law

1965 Ford Mustang K Code Fastback Factory GT Rangoon Red with Black Pony Interior

1965 Ford Mustang C Code Coupe Race Car Powder Blue #33

So, when and where did you purchase your Mustang:

First Mustang was a Wimbledon White/Red interior 1965 Ford Mustang coupe purchased from the Paul Wall collection that served us well for over 10 years (since passed on to another first timer)

A true Mustang aficionado never stops looking, and a 65 Fastback was always on the radar, so research over a period of time uncovered a Rangoon Red 65 K Code Factory GT Fastback from New York State.

You would think that this aficionado had then made it complete, however the racing bug had always been nagging and another sideline project came to fruition after negotiating the purchase of a 65 Arcadian Blue coupe from a Shelby owner in California who had started the process of upgrading the running gear of his daily driver however health reasons precluded further advancement.



What motivated you to buy your Mustang:

I have always been a car nut, and the Touring Cars of the late 60's at Lakeside and Surfers Paradise, particularly Mustangs, had made a serious impression. As they say in the classics, timing is everything and the planets aligned due to a redundancy (after 25 years) and a small ad in the Courier Mail had me on Paul's doorstep...pretty soon a White 65 Mustang was in our garage. The Fastback was a longer-term work in progress, and again an opportunity arose along with the strong Aussie dollar at the time...and you guessed it, a Rangoon Red 65 K code Fastback was also in the garage.

The 65 Arcadian Blue Coupe that turned into the race car was the way to satisfy the racing bug itch and pretty soon it too took pride and place in that ever-shrinking garage

As original vehicles, the White coupe and Fastback really only received running repairs and general maintenance as required the race car is a totally different story that may have to wait for another instalment

DELEGATES REPORT QHMC March

Guest speaker: Dominic Bunasia from Vehicle Import Specialists (VIS)

They handle import valuations: Import vehicle compliance

When ships hit bad weather and cargo is lost or jettisoned the loss is spread between the owners of the other cargo. This is covered by marine insurance.



With the problems with Asbestos, VIS supply a Forensic kit with swabs and sterile containers which are used on brakes, clutch, exhaust, head gaskets and carpet. These are then packaged and sent to the Australian Laboratory used by Australian Customs. If there are any negative results they are rectified in the origin country and re-tested. Dominic was very interesting to listen to and I am going to ask Chris if he could come to a Mustang meeting?

There is a delay with the bank getting the check book with the new signatures and with the computer sending group emails, Chris tried to tell them at the last meeting what we do so it will be good if we detail what we do, and the way Russell has the Treasurers computer set up.

DELEGATES REPORT MOCC Transport March 2018

Attended by Russell Whitney and John Greene

Transport have not finished checking the reflectiveness of new USA size number plates with 6 digits.

1st July will be the issue date for new reduced cost of rego for SIVS motor cycles.

June is when the Governor General should sign off on SIVS for BUSS clubs at 25 years.

We had a presentation on Autonomous Vehicles by Mat Doonan, Policy Advisor for transport. This was the testing they conducted on Driverless vehicles at New Farm delivering a parcel for Aust. Post. The area was chosen because of wide good condition footpaths, the test was successful, as it was late at night. They delivered one parcel.

Policy Advisor [Vehicle Standards] - Shane Lonsdale.

Federal Road Standards Bill 2018

Shane spoke of its impact on Queensland when I asked for a copy of the page he was reading from he said read it off the web site https://infrastructure.gov.au/vehicles/mv standards act/ I tried but forgot the question.

Luxury Vehicle Tax. The price is raised from \$65.00 to \$100.00 and the rate will increase by \$2 per \$100 of dutiable value. The Office of State Revenue is responsible progressing the legislative amendments to facilitate this change and are working towards an effective date of 1 July 2018.

This tax applies to new and used vehicles, Doug Young asked why other states have no stamp duty on transfer of registered vehicles - ACTION: TMR to provide an OSR contact for Doug to enquire further about duty.





Australian Border Force detects asbestos in classic cars, owners risk thousands of dollars in fines

DEADLY asbestos is being detected in an increasing number of classic cars - and unwary buyers are risking tens of thousands of dollars in fines and repairs.

DEADLY asbestos is being detected in an increasing number of privately imported classic cars — and unwary buyers are risking thousands of dollars in fines and repairs.

Australian Border Force has intercepted more than 50 classic and vintage cars containing asbestos parts so far this year, almost twice as many as the same period last year.

Valuable collector cars such as Ford Mustangs, Rolls-Royces, Bentleys and Jaguars — most of which are more than 40 years old — have been caught in the Customs crackdown.

Individual importers risk fines of more than \$3000 per offence, but the biggest expense is getting car parts tested and replaced.

Importers must pay for the testing of suspect parts and then replace them with asbestos-free components before the vehicle can clear Customs — a process that can take months and cost in excess of \$20,000.

"Recent history has shown a high incidence of imports in the classic car sector where asbestos has been found in parts such as brake pads, clutch linings and gaskets from vintage and veteran cars," said Stephen Hledik, the acting commander of Customs Compliance in the Australian Border Force. "If the Australian Border Force suspects there is asbestos present in the goods being imported we will instruct the importer to arrange for testing at their cost. That involves extra cost to them as well as delays as the testing is conducted," said Mr Hledik.

"It's the responsibility of the importer to make sure the asbestos parts have been removed before importing the car into Australia. Importers need to be aware that Australia's total ban on asbestos (introduced in 2003) means zero per cent asbestos content."

News Corp Australia has spoken to three private importers who've been caught out by the recent detection of classic cars containing asbestos, but none wanted to comment publicly.

One importer said testing and repairs cost him \$14,500, another said the process set him back \$25,000. Another importer said he was \$10,000 out of pocket.

Australian Border Force says it has the discretion to not issue fines but will use its powers to keep vehicles in quarantine until asbestos parts are removed.

One classic car importer who was caught out said it is "Russian roulette whether or not your car gets an inspection".

However, he cautioned anyone planning to import a classic car to get it checked first.

"Anybody who buys an imported classic car needs to get it inspected by an authorised asbestos expert whose qualifications are recognised by Australian authorities, otherwise you could be wasting your money importing the car in the first place," one importer told News Corp Australia.

The Australian Border Force does not collect samples or dismantle cars suspected of containing asbestos. Instead, the importer or their broker is responsible for arranging testing by an accredited expert.

Testing for asbestos requires microscopic analysis by "an occupational hygienist"

For testing in Australia the laboratory must be accredited by the National Association of Testing Authorities (NATA); overseas test results will only be accepted by a "NATA-recognised equivalent".

Australia's prohibition on asbestos has been in place since 2003 and "the significant health risks of asbestos are well known", said Mr Hledik. "We make no apologies for our work to protect the community from the significant dangers of asbestos."

He said many overseas sellers will claim a car is asbestos-free "but importers shouldn't rely on the assurances of the seller alone," said Mr Hledik.

"Get it tested, or remove and replace the suspect parts, and you'll save yourself a lot of time, effort and money when your car arrives in Australia."



The Lubricating System within your Engine

Why does your engine need such a complicated lubricating oil system? To answer that question the first thing we need to understand is the mechanics of the automotive engine lubricating system.

The lubricating system is designed to deliver clean oil to each individual component in the engine. It does this by

- First drawing the oil from the sump, into the oil pump.
- The oil pump then forces the oil through the oil filter
- Then pressurised oil feeds the main bearings and oil galley-ways.
- From the main bearings, the oil passes through feedholes that have been drilled into the crankshaft and onto the bearings of the connecting rod.
- The cylinder walls, piston pin and Gudgeon pin bearings are all lubricated by the flinging off of the oil as the crank rotates. Though in some cases an oilway is drilled in the con-rod to send pressurised oil to this area.
- The pressurised oil galley-ways are responsible for the lubrication of the cam bearings, lifters, valve springs, timing chain and gears.



An engine lubricant has three primary functions.

- One is to control friction and wear. It does this by inserting an oil film between the
 two interacting machined surfaces. This oil film prevents metal on metal contact,
 in doing this the lubricant film reduces friction.
- Another important role is temperature control. Some heat is generated by friction at the interaction point between the components. Also, the lubricant removes heat from the piston. The lubricant absorbs this heat, carrying it away to dissipate it in the sump or in the oil cooler.
- To prevent corrosion within the engine and neutralise the gaseous products of combustion.

"Oils ain't Oils!"

To quote a now famous 1980s advertising slogan for Castrol oils, and it is true.

In a previous note I explained what an oil must do within an engine or at least explained the mechanical side. Chemically engine oils have a huge role they must protect everything in the engine. If you want your engine to perform correctly and give you a long life then you must do three things.

- 1. Buy the oil designed for your engine type (year) and a recognised brand
- 2. Change the oil when recommended but as a minimum at least once a year
- 3. Regularly change the oil filter/s

An engine oil is a very complex mix of oils and chemicals, around 80% lubricating oil and 20% additives. Each engine oil type is designed or formulated for a type of engine. Mainly to meet changes in emission controls and equipment.

When you buy an oil, you must read the label very carefully. Forget the brand at this stage and read the oil descriptors and rating. There are three key ratings SAE, API and ACEA, in this note I will not talk about ACEA ratings as they are for European vehicles and do not apply to American Muscle.

A label will first say **engine oil** the give the **SAE rating** of the oil **10W-30** or similar. This indicates a multi grade oil. 10W is the viscosity of the oil when cold, you need this lower viscosity to pump the oil through the engine when starting. But engines get hot and as they do the oil gets thinner, the second number is the viscosity at running temperature. The next Item on the label will be the **API rating SG** or two letters starting with S. The **S** is for spark ignition engines when as **C** is for compression ignition engines, oils will have both S and C API ratings.

The most important additive you must have in your oil is ZDDP and this in not used in the oil formulation of modern oils as it destroys Catalytic Convertors use to clean up exhaust emissions. ZDDP is one of many anti wear additives but is the cheapest and the best at preventing sliding wear in the valve train area. So, ZDDP is essential in engine oil for our Classic Mustangs.

Following are a few engine oils that will suit Mustangs 1965 to 1989 with original style engines;

Penrite Classic light 20w-60 and Mobil 10w-40 Older engine Oil are two that will do the job, the Penrite is a marginally better oil and easier to obtain.

Mustangs had Cat converters installed from 1979 but that depended on the state the car was sold in, anyway most owners removed them as they were quickly destroyed by the zinc in the oil. In 1989 Ford got serious and added 4 cat convertors to the Fox series from then on all Mustangs had to use a zinc reduced or free engine oil.

For Modern Muscle you must use a full synthetic oil rated at API SN SAE 0W-20
