\$85 for New Membership between 1st July and 31st December (\$25 joining fee + \$60 annual fee)
\$55 for New Membership between 1st January and 30th June (\$25 joining fee + \$30 - 6 months fee)







THE BEST EXPLANATION OF COVID 19

This was shared by Amanda Howson RNand tells us why this bug is NOT like the influenza virus influenza.

This was posted by a friend in Pathology. Thought it explained things really well. Oh OT, ED RN, NSW.

I was asked today what is the difference between a influenza and COVID19.... can we just have one day free?! Anyway here is the info to help you all,

"Feeling confused as to why Coronavirus is a bigger deal than Seasonal flu? Here it is in a nutshell. I hope this helps. Feel free to share this with others who don't understand."

It has to do with RNA sequencing...i.e. genetics.

Seasonal flu is an "all human virus". The DNA/RNA chains that make up the virus are recognized by the human immune system. This means that your body has some immunity to it before it comes around each year. You get immunity two ways...through exposure to a virus, or by getting a flu shot.

Novel viruses come from animals. The WHO tracks novel viruses in animals (sometimes for years watching for mutations). Usually these viruses only transfer from animal to animal (pigs in the case of H1N1, birds in the case of the Spanish flu). But once one of these animal viruses mutates and starts to transfer from animals to humans...then it's a problem. Why? Because we have no natural or acquired immunity. The RNA sequencing of the genes inside the virus isn't human, and the human immune system doesn't recognize it, so we can't fight it off.

Now...sometimes, the mutation only allows transfer from animal to human. For years it's only transmission is from an infected animal to a human before it finally mutates so that it can now transfer human to human. Once that happens, **we have a new contagion phase**. And depending on the fashion of this new mutation, that's what decides how contagious, or how deadly, it's going to be.

H1N1 was deadly, but it did not mutate in a way that was as deadly as the Spanish flu. Its RNA was slower to mutate and it attacked its host differently, too.

Fast forward.

Now, here comes this Coronavirus. It existed in animals only, for nobody knows how long. But one day, at an animal market in Wuhan China, in December 2019, it mutated and made the jump from animal to people.

At first, only animals could give it to a person. But here is the scary part. In just **TWO WEEKS**, it mutated again and gained the ability to jump from human to human.

Scientists call this quick ability, "slippery".

This Coronavirus, not being in any form a "human" virus (whereas we would all have some natural or acquired immunity), took off like a rocket. And this was because humans have no known immunity...doctors have no known medicines for it. And it just so happens that this particular mutated animal virus changed itself in such a way the way that it causes great damage to human lungs.

That's why Coronavirus is different from seasonal flu, or H1N1, or any other type of influenza...this one is slippery AF. And it's a lung eater. And, it's already mutated AGAIN, so that we now have two strains to deal with, strain S and strain L...which makes it twice as hard to develop a vaccine.

We really have no tools in our shed for this. History has shown that fast and immediate closings of public places has helped in the past pandemics. Philadelphia and Baltimore were reluctant to close events in 1918 and they were the hardest hit in the US during the Spanish Flu.

Factoid: Henry VIII stayed in his room and allowed no one near him till the Black Plague passed *(honestly, I understand him so much better now)*. Just like us, he had no tools in his shed, except social isolation.

And let me end by saying...right now it's hitting older folks harder...but this genome is so slippery, if it mutates again *(and it will)*, who is to say what it will do next.

!!!! flatten the curve.

Stay home folks. And share this to those that just are not catching on."

SIV's Regulations

President Alan has received numerous requests regarding using SIVS registered vehicles during our current situation. Below is his answer to one of these requests

From a club point of view there are currently no sanctioned runs therefore you can't take a SIV's registered car out for a run under this section of the regulations.

Following is the SIV's regulations

Scheme guide

Conditions and restrictions

A special interest vehicle must not be used for:

- General purposes for example, to commute to and from the registered operator's place of employment, running down to the shops, and other forms of everyday vehicle use.
- For hire or reward a fee cannot be charged for use of the vehicle, and the owner cannot receive any consideration or reward for supplying the vehicle.

You and anyone driving your special interest vehicle must only use the vehicle for:

- participating in rallies or events, including impromptu events organised by an incorporated vehicle club or events sanctioned by the Australia Street Rod Federation.
 - a rally is a social event where a parade of special interest vehicles
 travel together for competition or to meet at an agreed location. Rallies
 and events must be listed in the incorporated club newsletter or on the
 incorporated club's website or social media page (or in another manner
 approved by the club or Australia Street Rod Federation, such as the
 club calendar of events) prior to the event.
 - an impromptu event is an event that has been initiated by a club member, involves one or more vehicles, and must comply with the following elements:
 - involves an invitation to wider club members to attend the event; and
 - is either
 - endorsed in advance of the event by the relevant club or Australia Street Rod Federation committee; or,
 - where it exists, complies with published club guidelines as to what is a valid event; and
 - is listed either in the newsletter, on the website, or social media page (or in another manner approved by the club or Australia Street Rod Federation, such as the club calendar of events) prior to the event.

Note: Incorporated vehicle clubs should maintain a register of endorsed impromptu events. This register should contain information on the impromptu event.

- participating in processions for which a Special Events Permit has been issued under the *Transport Operations (Road Use Management – Accreditation and Other Provisions) Regulation 2015.*
- exhibiting the vehicle in displays, fetes or similar functions conducted for religious, charitable or educational purposes.

- ceremonial purposes (such as weddings, formals, funerals) involving immediate and de facto family members, or as part of a sanctioned incorporated club event, provided this is not done for fee or reward. Immediate and de facto family means parents, grandparents, sons, daughters, grandchildren, adopted children and adopted grandchildren, but not extended family members such as aunts, uncles, nephews and nieces.
- preparing for, proceeding to, and returning from any of the above activities, including events in other states and territories in which the club is directly involved with.
- direct travel to and from an approved inspection station to get a safety certificate or certificate of inspection before offering the vehicle for sale.
- travel in order to have the vehicle repaired is allowed. There is no distance restriction, however, such travel must be reasonable and justifiable by the vehicle operator.
- road testing within a 15km radius from the place where the vehicle is garaged
 or is being repaired. The purpose of the travel must be to road test the vehicle
 following repair or restoration, or for general vehicle maintenance and not for
 any other purpose. This does not include use as an everyday means of
 transport. A passenger may travel in your vehicle to assist with road testing—
 only if your vehicle can legally carry passengers.

Buses are permitted to carry non-fare paying passengers for journeys (joy-rides) from an event (for example, a fete) and return provided the length of the journey does not exceed 5km. Payment of any kind cannot be received for these journeys.

Heavy vehicles over 4.5t GVM are permitted to carry a load provided the loaded GVM or gross combination mass (GCM) does not exceed 50% of the maximum permitted mass for the vehicle configuration. This mass is based on the lesser of:

- Individual axle ratings
- Tyre manufacturer's limits
- Manufacturer's GVM or GCM
- Regulation mass limits.

If your special interest vehicle does not have permanent lighting, you must carry a removable lighting system with the vehicle at all times and use that system whenever lighting would normally be required. Carbide lights are acceptable where that type of light was originally fitted.

The only section in these guidelines that may allow you to drive your car is

 road testing within a 15km radius from the place where the vehicle is garaged or is being repaired. The purpose of the travel must be to road test the vehicle following repair or restoration, or for general vehicle maintenance and not for any other purpose. This does not include use as an everyday means of transport. A passenger may travel in your vehicle to assist with road testing—only if your vehicle can legally carry passengers.

However, this road test may be in breach of the Government regulations in relation to staying at home and only going out for essential travel during the Covid-19 emergency.

Therefore, we as a club cannot condone you driving your SIV's registered car and it is up to you to decide if you would meet the road test criteria under SIV's and the Covid-19 travel restrictions.

Guidelines for MOCA Sanctioned Car Runs

One of the functions of MOCA(QLD) is to organise car runs for its members. The club is bound by it rules to hold one run on the first Sunday of each month with an exception being in January each year, a run on the first Saturday, the fish and chips run.

The club is not confined to this one run per month, members may organise any number of runs they wish, planned well in advance or impromptu, providing the guidelines below are followed the run will be sanctioned as a club run.

For a run to be sanctioned by MOCA (QLD), therefore has to meet the criteria required for SIVS registered vehicles. To do this the following conditions must be met.

- 1. The run must be open to all financial members of the Club.
- 2. The run must be advertised on the club website or in the magazine.
- 3. The run must be given a sanctioned number by the run coordinator or nominee.
- 4. Where possible the run must have at least 7 days' notice period to allow review and posting on the website. When a lesser notice period is given SIVs sanctioning cannot be guaranteed.
- 5. The run must normally follow the guidelines that can be obtained from the secretary or run coordinator.

Large number of COVID-19 infringements issued following car rally at Rochedale

Queensland police were left disappointed and frustrated after issuing 58 COVID-19 infringement notices at a large car rally in Rochedale last night (Saturday, April 5) with State Disaster Coordinator, Deputy Commissioner Steve Gollschewski saying such blatant disregard puts all Queenslanders at risk.

The \$1,334 infringement notices for failing to comply with a COVID-19 direction issued by the Chief Health Officer (CHO) were issued to drivers and passengers, males and females, aged between 17 and 30.

Around 10pm police were alerted to a gathering at Brickworks Place involving approximately 150 cars and a large number of people congregated in a warehouse carpark.

Multiple police units responded with many of the cars attempting to flee the area, with some driving across grassland and becoming bogged in the process.

Deputy Commissioner Gollschewski, the State Disaster Coordinator said an integral part of the Queensland Police Service response to the COVID-19 pandemic is to improve the safety of Queenslanders through ensuring compliance with the CHO's directions, particularly around self-isolation, mass gatherings, borders, non-essential business activity and private residence gatherings.

"This is all about safety. About saving lives. About stopping the spread of COVID-19. We all, every single one of us, must do our bit. We are in this together.

"It is inexcusable what happened at Rochedale last night and such blatant disregard for the lives of Queenslanders will not be tolerated.

"Largely Queenslanders have made significant adjustments to their lifestyle in order to comply with these health directives, to help protect their families, friends, neighbours and the broader community, and I thank them for that."

When did you Purchase Your Mustang?

- 1. The convertible was a California registered car that was tidied up by a collector and repairer in Fort Lauderdale. We purchased the car from him around 2008 and shipped it to Australia.
- 2. The Mach 1 we purchased from a friend in Tampa out of his collection and did a road trip to Charlotte for the Mustang 50th where we had two cars on display and we were also filming 5 episodes of the Man and Machine TV series with Glenn Everett, Matt & Sheri Clarke. Our Mach 1 can be seen on the episode that covered the Mustang 50th.

What motivated you to buy your mustang?

Now this is a long story, but the short version is:

Firstly, and foremost --- having an understanding and lovely wife!!

But the real reason started this process many years ago 1979-1982 to be exact.

Back then, I was an apprentice Chef in Melbourne – at a place called "Leonda by the River" (back in the day it was a swanky high-end establishment, where the hob knobs dined and had weddings and major functions -- still going today)

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
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Classic Mustang Engines and ZDDP

Mustangs, other higher-powered muscle cars and some vintage cars operate under a different set of conditions to those of the modern the daily driver. Depending on the engine vintage, the camshaft may feature flat-tappet lifters (solids or hydraulics) and/or may run stronger valve springs in a flat-tappet or roller cam setup.

Older engine designs may also feature a two-piece rear main seals these can weep with the modern full-synthetic oils. Further, these vehicles may often experience limited use with extended periods of storage.

A result of all these factors, is a need to carefully select the proper engine oil for these engines. There is a critical need to protect flat-tappet camshaft engines with the proper levels of zinc phosphate oil additives. The problem is that the bulk of modern non-synthetic and synthetic off-the-shelf engine oils have been manufactured to comply with Environmental mandates, with no thought given to the needs of older engines with flat-tappet cams.



The result of running a flat tappet camshaft using an oil without sufficient ZDDP

In the 1960s, when high-performance flat-tappet camshafts were common, ZDDP featured a zinc level of 0.07 percent. At that time, new camshafts were phosphate-coated as well, the combination worked well to protect new camshafts and lifters from premature wear, especially during break-in. In the 1970s, zinc levels increased to 0.09 percent as ZDDP is also an excellent antioxidant. As engines became more powerful, oil formulations changed becoming more complex, with more specialised additives such as friction modifiers, antifoamers, antioxidants and detergents. In the 1980s friction modifiers gained further popularity to aid fuel economy, with zinc content increasing to 0.2 percent.

Unfortunately, Phosphorous is a well-known for "poisoning" catalytic converters as a result reducing their effective life. In 2000, the limit for Phosphorous in engine oil was reduced to 0.10 percent, at the same time dropping the zinc level. In 2004, Phosphorous dropped, to 0.08 percent, with zinc down to 0.09 percent.

Effectively this means that the current off the shelf oils will not meet the engine protection needs of classic Mustangs without special precautions being taken during the engine build and run in.

API SERVICE CLASSIFICATION FOR PASSENGER CAR ENGINE OIL



Unfortunately, in Australia we have few options, most oils specifically formulated for Classic vehicle are manufactured in the US, Royal Purple, Lucas and Penn and Castrol in the UK. However, Penrite is now offering several oils in Australia that will meet classic Mustangs needs, these being Classic light 20W-40 or HPR 20WW-60 both contain high levels of ZDDP. An alternative is to use an engine oil with an API rating of **SG.** Shell Mobil and Nulon manufacture API SG engine oil, but you have to look hard and carefully to find them
