- Drive to your own picnic
- Drive to a car Event run by an Organised Business, not an incorporated car club (Repco, Football Club, School etc.)

At this time there is no limit as to the number of times this can be used. But the Club has to give access to this information to TMR and there is no time limit this detail has to be kept?

ALL the old rules still apply

Clubs with Head Offices in other States where they are incorporated do not have to be incorporated in their own State.


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
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30 YEARS: WHAT A JOURNEY

Our journey started in 1988 when Brian finally achieved his dream of owning a Mustang. His preferred model was a 1968 but he settled with what we could afford. It was a very tired and tatty 1965 Wimbledon White Coupe.



With John Greene's drawings, he set about converting it to a right- hand drive. It was prudent on those weekends to stay clear of the shed. His mate owned an engine reconditioning shop, so that was an easy job.

Next came many weekends of panel beating, but the first Sunday of every month we would always front up for the club run. After he was satisfied that the car was as straight and ripple free as could be came the undercoat, then the colour. It was not so easy as we both had a different colour in mind. He won and the car was painted light blue (A Nissan Colour), but she stood out in a crowd. I'll always remember a weekend run when we were in Byron Bay and several of our members took a wrong turn and suddenly spotted our car way in the distance and knew where to head to.

We had many enjoyable runs and weekends away with the club and met many members who became good friends.

In 1991 we went to our first Nationals in Fremantle along with John & Pauline Binge. Pauline & I had a lovely time looking around, while John & Brian worked non-stop on the Mach 1. I have a photo of Brian sitting on the ground with a small brush cleaning the wheels.

The next Nationals in WA were in Bunbury, so we decided to drive over. We took 2 weeks to make the trip and had many stops along the way, including a detour to take in the Mt Panorama Circuit at Bathurst. The concours weekend was wet and windy and Brian had to borrow a heavy jacket as he was one of the judges. After a very hectic weekend we were happy to put the old girl on the Indian Pacific and relax till we got back to Sydney. We never missed

a Nationals until his last one in Canberra in 2007 when we took the yellow 1968 Coupe.

Brian was never one for trophies but was honoured to be the clubman of the year for 1994.

In 1998 we bought a 1968 Shelby GT500 in bits from Kevin Musgrave. We flew down for the weekend to confirm it was the real deal. We put a deposit on it and three weeks later Classic Car Carriers were at our door with the car.

It was slow going with not much being done with the hours spent in the shed, but we didn't know at that time that Brian was suffering from a terminal illness. He thought that as we had the blue car to drive, he would just potter.



Things came to a head when an acquaintance put in an offer for the 65. As the expression goes, I was "not happy Jan"! Brian thought that with the 65 sold, he would have to get going on the Shelby. Rick again did the motor, Brian & Shane the panel work and we paid to have the car sprayed as Brian was by then on 24-hour oxygen. The funniest time came when he asked John Carrier, a club member who at the time owned a windscreen fitting business to fit the screen. It was booked in for 9 am. By 10 am we had two Carrier Vans in the backyard and another on the footpath. How many men does it take to fit a windscreen????

We had a lot of help getting it put together and finally she was registered. Her first outing was our state concours in Ipswich. She attracted a lot of attention on the Logan Motorway with cars slowing down to take photographs. She was also judged people's choice at the show.



Her last outing for us was at the Nationals at Royal Pines. Brian was persuaded to enter her in the display judged for the first time and we took home one of the display trophies. We had several offers while still at the show, but Paul Wall said that she had to stay in Qld, so she joined his stable.



We replaced her with a red 66 convertible and finally Brian got his 1968 Coupe.

It was always a known fact that eventually the convertible would go to Shane & the coupe to Nikki & Jason. We went on most runs in either car till it became to much for Brian. In March 2008 many of our fellow club members came in their Mustangs to farewell him on his last Mustang Run. Paul brought the 68GT500 and it stood proudly amongst all the other Mustangs, including our 2.

Well, as they say, life must go on and at that time I was treasurer for the club with Ray Law the president. He wanted to do something in Brian's memory and the past members memorial run was created. I have continued with the club, being either treasurer or secretary for several years



For a while we continued using the red convertible on runs with Ken Clark doing the driving. It was apparent that the car needed some work done as it was in the same condition from when it was imported. Shane did the work and used it for a couple of wedding parties for friends. (It was on full rego, so legal). Shane was a member of MOCA while he had his own Mustang, and he and Brian did many a working bee to get the clubhouse up to standard. They attended many car shows each year and one-year Shane won the people's choice at The All-American Day with his 1966 Wild Plum Coupe. They participated at many of the Hot Rod Spectaculars in Brisbane.

They also took both cars to the Rockhampton Hot Rod Show. Shane & Wade are heavily involved with drag racing, and the red convertible was sold to make way for a Black Monte Carlo drag car. (Shane said he had tears in his eyes watching the car driving away from his workshop)

However, it was all for the good as Wade has won the Australian Championships for his

class in 2017 & 2018 in the black beast and is trying for number 3 this year.



I didn't like driving the yellow car, so I go on most runs these days with Ken & Sue. Nikki & Jason enjoy driving it on weekends, so it still gets around. It is currently stripped back in Shane's workshop and will be getting a new coat of paint as soon as Shane finishes the body repairs that he deemed were necessary. It only went in for its regular service and is now getting the full treatment.

I am still very active in the club with being either treasurer or secretary for many years. I was on two National Concours Committees and with Sue do the tallying for our State Concours. I am currently on the 2019 state concours committee so I have a busy time ahead. Along with Ken & Sue, I am attending the Victorian Nationals to represent Qld at the national delegates meeting, a position I held from October 2004 till April 2007.

Looking through old photos to put with this article brought back many happy memories of trips away with the club. One of the best ones being when we did Mustangs across Australia in 1999..... 19 Cars made the journey.

Asbestos Update: from Old World Lamps & Tires

The following article has been sourced from Old World Lamps and Tires January 2019 newsletter and is indicative of the risk involved currently in importing classic vehicles with the potential of having some asbestos.

After over a decade of importing Old World Tyres (we) have finally been forced to undertake our first asbestos inspection. This was completed on a 1931 Cadillac sedan we imported for a customer mid 2018.

Over the past few years, I have been criticised overseas for the amount of, particularly veteran, imports we (Australians) have conducted over the last decade. What the criticisers forget is the outflow of cars to the USA & Europe to the big cheque books in the late 1960's and 70's before the days of the internet and Australians were aware of the true value & history of some of our original

Australian imported vehicles. I, personally, am very keen on returning as much of our lost early motoring heritage back to Australia as possible.

If, as many suspect, the asbestos checking is a government attempt to close down the collector car hobby or certainly any imports of new stocks into the hobby or the return of our motoring history, then the Government is achieving their objective as imports have slowed dramatically. If it is to see other country's economies like the US bolstered by having employment swell in the area of stripping out brakes and gaskets from potential exports to Australia, then again they are achieving that also.

Whilst I confess I do not understand the government's focus on asbestos in older vehicles being imported into Australia, it is a political decision and I acknowledge that Australian Border Force (ABF) & Customs officers do their duty by instruction from their political masters. Throughout the whole process of the asbestos inspection, I found the staff to be professional and courteous however the communication process between the ourselves as the importer and government staff is stilted at best!

The process of an asbestos inspection, in theory should be quite simple, however the execution was somewhat mind-blowingly complicated and long winded. In our case the container arrived as usual, and we lodged documents in the normal manner very early so as to fast track the documentation clearance system as much as possible. The Cadillac came back "red line" which generally means Customs wants to have a closer look at the attached documents, particularly the proof of payments to ensure that there is no funny business going on with the value of the car and the payment process. So we supplied the proof of payment, and then Customs come back and said they wished to do an asbestos test on the 1931 Caddy - thus began the hurdy gurdy.



The container sat on the dock while everyone (ABF, Customs and Quarantine) decided what to do and if our normal quarantine facility had the necessary approvals to handle the asbestos inspection. In the meantime, I had to alert our client that the asbestos inspection process had been initiated on their vehicle. After all the approval processes were sorted, Customs allowed the container to be moved off the dock and to our quarantine facility with the strict instruction "seals intact", which means the container cannot be unpacked until ABF & Customs are present. So the next process was to find a licensed asbestos inspector that ABF & Customs approved of (they do not have a list of preferred suppliers) - this process took another 14 days! With the container sitting there unable to be unpacked, the container was now well outside it's permissible hire period from the shipping line and demurrage was levied on a daily rate.

Finally with ABF, Customs, an asbestos hygienist & myself as acting mechanic all together at the container yard, we opened the doors of the container and removed the Caddy, and the other goods within

the container. The Caddy was then placed inside the quarantine facility where the inspection commenced.

The testing itself was relatively simple – take samples of potential areas of hazard ie wiring, firewall heat suppression, head &exhaust gaskets, brake linings etc. a total of seven samples were taken of suspect areas.

Where the process became truly extraordinary was when Customs required that all the other goods are "held, not to be released is case of cross contamination" until the Cadillac was cleared or any offending material is removed. So over \$100,000 worth of goods including customer tyres and our stock was held while this process was concluded.

Several days after the testing, the results were returned in a 28 page report and there was asbestos found in the brake linings and the exhaust header gaskets. As such, the process of finding a new asbestos hygienist was undertaken, as the previous hygienist firm was not allowed to undertake the removal, so as to prevent the perception that one firm may be "gold digging" for work. However this required more time consuming logistics and again put further delays into the removal of the asbestos and the release of the container.

Once a new firm was located, the process of coordinating the new hygienist, ABF & Customs together begins and four weeks later a date is finally secured. So on a Monday morning, we all assembled to remove the offending parts. As this was a 1931 Cadillac and the parts are not available off the shelf, I was keen to ensure only the brake linings (not the entire shoes) with the asbestos were removed. Luckily the linings were riveted to the shoes not bonded and I could drill out the rivets and remove the offending material without destroying the integrity of the Caddy. Likewise, I un-bolted the exhaust header and dropped the engine pipe so the gaskets could be removed without any damage to the car. After 51/2 hours, the asbestos was removed bagged, tagged and sent off for destruction.

Then another week later the official certificate was finally issued and all up costs calculated at around

the \$5000 mark! I was relieved, thinking that meant that finally all the other goods in the container were released for quarantine inspection, but no, it takes another 2 weeks before the computer system is updated to release the goods for inspection some ten weeks after the container arrived! Needless to say, I (and my customers) were considerably frustrated (an understatement) with the length of this process.

I seriously question the political motivation of this process, considering the amount of asbestos already in Australia. As mentioned previously, I have no problem with the ABF & Customs staff members - they are doing the job as directed by their political masters. However the process & lack of timely procedure sucks. Weeks of delays, extraordinary costs and interruption to business and the hobby as a whole. Even in the event the government persist with the process, there needs to be some better process and procedures developed to minimise the disruption to business and reduce the extraordinary costs levied upon the importer of a collector vehicle. Reports are rife of importers going broke or just deciding to give up under the constant government pressure & cost of asbestos inspections. The government accepts other perceived antiquated aspects of collector cars like, no indicators, two wheel brakes, acetylene headlights, wood wheels etc. Surely accepting a very minimal chance that a vehicle may contain asbestos would be reasonable? Particularly considering the amount of asbestos currently in Australian cars and other parts of Australian society.

Our hobby earns the government millions in revenue - just with this container alone there was nearly \$20,000 in GST and 10s of \$1,000 more to be spent on the restoration of the vehicles contained in just this one container, in turn creating jobs & making the Australian economy thrive and producing more GST for the government. By my estimate, the collector car hobby is a \$500mill to \$1-billion industry and with this pinpoint focus on old car imports, the government is potentially shutting down a huge segment of our industry, costing themselves \$millions in lost revenue by focusing on one tiny aspect of what is a whole of nation asbestos issue. Hopefully common sense somewhere in the political arena, driven by a loss of revenue, will ultimately prevail.

In order to facilitate the recognition of the importance of our hobby and the supporting industry, we need to unite and make representation to the Federal Ministers to streamline this process and confirm once and for ever if this is actually designed to be a back door process to close down the collector car market. It is time to for representatives from individual aspects of the hobby to collectively meet with all appropriate ministers and lobby government to get a clear direction on the asbestos issue and the government's intentions toward the collector car hobby as a whole
