SOCIAL DIRECTOR: Sue spoke about the Christmas Party at the Colmslie Hotel. There should be plenty of photos for Robyn after this event. She also had a contract from the VOCO Hotel for the 2021 National Concours, but it still needs a bit of fine tuning before it can be signed off. We also need a logo for this event.

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MEMBERS PRESENT AT THE MEETING WHO ARE CELEBRATING BIRTHDAYS THIS MONTH WERE GIVEN A FREE TICKET IN TONIGHT'S RAFFLE: Barry Lane

QHMC: John Greene invited members to join him and Russell to attend the next meeting. He also spoke about the Victorian logbook scheme.

NATIONAL DELEGATES: Martin gave an overview of the delegates meeting in October. There will be a new class trialled at the Adelaide Concours: RestoMod. There was also a presentation of a new website that has been adopted so far by S.A & W.A. It would cost approx. \$3,000 to set up.

He also outlined the painted silos tour that he is leading to the Adelaide Concours. There was a map in the November Magazine. If you are interested in going contact Martin. He also advised that bookings for the venue need to be finalized soon.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

NATIONAL LOTTERY: This is up and running. If you would like a book to sell or just buy a ticket, contact the secretary. Alan expressed the need for the members to actively promote this raffle to family and friends. Please take a book and if you are unable to sell all the tickets, just return the unsold ones plus the money for any sold to the secretary. It was also asked what % the Leukemia Foundation will receive. They will receive 50% based on their specific ticket allocation, which will be deemed payable on the conclusion of the Lottery in April, 2020.

Alan addressed the issue of funds held by the club. We have to outlay for the 2021 Nationals in advance and if for any reason the event is not successful, we have to be able to bear the loss. Also, repairs to the clubhouse are ongoing, and we need to be mindful of that as well. He also expressed concerns that the clubhouse was being under - utilised. It is part of our constitution that we retain our lease which is due for renewal in April 2020. It was suggested that we again have a day that members could bring their cars to learn how to present them for judging. Also, a swap meet was proposed.

Alan asked if any members were willing to take residents of aged care facilities on a short run in their cars and maybe morning tea afterwards. We have done this in the past with Canteen, but we would all have to renew our blue cards if we were to take minors. Questions were raised re liability which will be researched before any final action is taken. Monique Callander said she would liase with Blue Care regarding any issues.

LIFE MEMBERS: Alan Messenger proposed that the founding members be made life members under Rule 12 (a) i. He also proposed that the secretary, Margaret Moran be made a life member under Rule 12 (a) ii. Vic Newland asked if all the founding members were financial and was assured by Robyn that they were. Ric Dunford seconded his motion and it was passed by the majority of members. The founding members are John & Pauline Binge, Robin & Linda Bath, Aileen Nixon, Robin & Heather Bone, Neil & Kay Morris & John & Valerie Greene. All will be presented with their badges at the December Meeting.

SIVS REGISTRATION & MIDWEEK RUNS: There was a lot of discussion regarding the use of cars on impromptu runs. A lot of members voiced their opinions on this this subject and it is a thorny issue as to how it can be interpreted. Robyn will put in the next magazine a one page ruling from TMR with a link to the webpage. There was a call for more runs per month, but there were no volunteers to organise same.

Alan tabled a letter from Stan Gallo with ideas for the meeting format. Alan has taken points raised and we will address them.

From the President.

He needs the date, time, where, what the event is, who is the organising body and are the organisers an incorporated body. Given this data we can list these events.

Now to SIV's always a lively topic and one that is often interpreted incorrectly, here is the official definition

A concession (or restricted registration) is available if you are registering a classic or vintage car, a street rod or a historic vehicle. This concession is based on the vehicle having a very **strict and limited road use** which is reflected in the reduced fees and compulsory third-party insurance premium

This registration is designed for **older vehicles that will not be driven all that often**, the thinking is once or twice a month. There are a number of people who want to drive their older Mustangs more frequently, well the Queensland SIV's is not designed for very frequent driving in this case you should apply for full registration then you can drive your special car when ever and where ever you like.

Best wishes to you all for Christmas and I hope you have a great New Year.



New Tyres and a New Battery - Lessons Learnt

We have owned our 65 Mustang now for the past six years. When we purchased it, we were informed that the tyres were <u>relatively</u> new? I was always of the belief that the tyres were manufactured in 2013, because of a circle imprint on the tyre with a **13** in the middle of it. The tyres were made in America and I thought that was how the year of manufacture was marked over there.

Recently, I came into the garage and noted that the Mustang had a front driver side tyre flat. I said to Jenny that it was only flat on the bottom – not the sides or the top, so we should be able to have it fixed. I changed the spare over and took the flat down to our local Bob Jane T Mart.



A lady came over and served me – (Lilly) really knew her stuff when it came to tyres. I informed Lilly that the tyre was from our classic Mustang and that I had read an article some time ago about classic car tyres perishing before they would ever wear out, due to the low mileage these cars actually do.

Lilly looked over the tyre and showed me a split on the side wall of the tyre. She then explained to me where the manufactured date was on the inside wall of the tyre. Where she pointed to was a boxed series of four numbers which read **2800**. Lilly decoded these numbers for me – the tyres (remember, at the time of purchase I was told the tyres were relatively new) were manufactured in the 28th week of 2000. Yes, that's right – we had been driving on 19-year-old tyres! Is this a record or what? I was grateful that tyre disintegrated in the garage, rather than out on the open road doing 100 km's per hour. I was in shock, however grateful that this had come about the way that it had. Lilly asked me to look inside the tread track. My eyesight wasn't that good, so I asked her to explain – Lilly informed me that they were full of small cracks!

As it turned out Bob Jane had a promotion going at the time of "buy three and get one free" – so new tyres fitted with the manufactured date code of **2419** i.e. the 24th week of 2019. Feeling so much better about driving our Mustang now and the ride is so much smoother with brand new tyres. Happy days!

On the same day the battery went flat, so after jump starting the Mustang at Bob Jane, I drove it straight over to my Local battery store. Pulled the invoice out of the glove box, to be informed that the two-year warranty had expired in September this year. Here, I learnt that classic car batteries should always be hooked up to a trickle charger, to stop the battery charge consistently going up and down. So, a new battery and a trickle charger fitted as well, with another two year's warranty and a suggestion that with constant trickle charge, should achieve four years life of the new battery – let's see about this, as time will tell the story.

Anyway, the lessons have been learnt and advice to fellow members is to:

- Know the date of manufacture of your car tyres
- Think about updating your tyres every six years (differing opinions on this one)
- Fit your classic car battery up with a trickle charger

If you take this advice, then you may not end up like me and have to have new tyres and a new battery fitted all on the same day. Ahh..... the joys of owning a classic car

A Routine Day in Smokey Yunick's Workshop,

also starring Albert, the Alligator.

Smokey Yunick was a self-taught mechanic and engineer who specialised in getting more power from typical American V8's, and in spite of his lack of formal education, was employed as a consultant at different times by Ford, Pontiac and Chevrolet. He didn't have much to do with the Mustang story being focused mostly on Nascar racing, in early days with the Flat Head V8's and later full-size Fords. He was also supplied with cars to race in their name and he was quite highly thought of in a maverick, unpredictable kind of way.

Being outside the factory system he was free to try any idea he thought up and quite often they worked. This did not endear him to the factory engineers who had to follow a more conservative line. He delighted in outsmarting race officials and finding loopholes in the rules that no one else noticed. As an example, fuel tanks were strictly limited in size, but the rule setters forgot to mention the fuel line. Fitting a fuel line 25mm in diameter, that wound all around the car between tank and engine, gave Smokey's entry quite a few extra litres. Enough to make a difference, and to the fury of the scrutineers, no rule had been broken.

However, before he became well known, he opened up a small workshop in Daytona Beach. This workshop was on a piece of cheap land backing on to a swampy canal, and in 1947, alligators were seen here every day, but most were easily chased off. One about a metre-long named Albert became relatively tame when fed with lunch scraps and took to sleeping underneath the spare parts counter. When customers stood close to the counter, they often looked down to see what their toes were bumping against and what that strange hissing noise was. On realising that it was in fact Albert the alligator, it was remarkable how quickly they were able to step back ------ and how seldom they ever returned to buy more parts.


A regular routine developed where an acquaintance of Yunick's named John would call in about 3.30 every Saturday afternoon, as drunk as a skunk after being on the turps all day, and would drag the alligator by the tail all around the workshop, proclaiming that he had no fear of alligators, knew how to train them, could show them who was boss, and so on and so forth. Of course, metre long alligators don't stay that size, they get bigger, and also become a bit fed up with behaviour like this.

Came the day when Albert saw his chance and got his jaws firmly clamped on two of John's fingers. Of course, Albert's instinct was to roll once he had a good grip, and John had to roll with him or risk losing an arm, and it was now Albert's turn to drag John round the workshop. Smokey Yunick was welding a tow bar nearby and trying not to be distracted by all this, but eventually, could ignore it no longer. To get some peace and quiet he tried to pry Alberts jaws open with a tire iron, while blood squirted freely in all directions. In a fury of pain drunken John kicked out at Albert, and very soon Albert had him by the foot. This was definitely Albert's day!

In the heat of the moment, Albert lost track of who was friend and who was foe and snapped his jaws on Smokey's

expensive new steel capped work boot, eventually pulling it off his foot as he hopped wildly about. Alligators can move surprisingly fast and Smokey was now handicapped by having one leg shorter than the other, as he scrambled frantically round the workshop. After a couple of laps, Albert, believing he now had a nice juicy foot, went out the back door and into the canal with the new boot clamped in his jaws.

Throwing the injured John out the front door, Smokey was now confronted by the customer waiting for his tow bar. He accused Smokey of ill-treating the alligator and threatened to report him to the authorities. In order to get rid of the customer Smokey returned to welding the tow bar, only for the sparks to set fire to the sock on his unprotected foot. Somehow, he wasn't having a good day!

The grim faced driver was novice Bobby Johns, desperate to drive at Indianapolis, which explains why he's been talked into this.

He crashed in qualifying, fortunately unhurt.

Soon John's wife arrived, she'd also had a few too many and had a lawyer in tow. The lawyer had a camera and wanted some crime scene photos to help their case for damages. He wanted shots of the workshop, the blood [of which there was plenty], and most of all the alligator. "Let's do the alligator first" says Smokey " it's out the back in the canal" and seizing the lawyer by the collar and seat of his pants, he ran him at high speed through the back door and hurled him into the canal, just where Albert was last seen. Seeing the dropped camera, that was booted into the murky water too.

Well a man can only be patient so long!

Next day Albert returned looking for lunch scraps, but had to be barred from the premises, something he found hard to understand. Was it something he'd done?

Spare parts sales began to pick up almost overnight.

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


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MOCA NATIONALS 2020 – PAINTED SILOS RUN TO ADELAIDE






