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
Mid-Week, Mid-Month Run - Wednesday 12th June 2019 Woodlands Manor, Marburg





A large group of 22 Mustangs, 7 classics and 15 new ones, rumbled out of the BP servo at Archerfield at 11am to a delighted group of photographers. With the sun shining and enthusiasm high, we headed west towards Marburg. USA Road Trip / Opening of Mustang Museum / Charlotte, North Carolina

The 55th anniversary of the Mustang plus the opening of the National Mustang Owner's Museum in Charlotte, North Carolina, USA, was too much for twenty-one Mustangers (Red Shirts) to resist a six week road tour of South East USA.



After arriving on a nonstop, 15 hour, flight from Sydney to Dallas, the first thing on the Red Shirts bucket list was to check out 'The Grassy Knoll' and reflect on where we were on 22 November 1963. The Texas School Book Depository is now an extensive museum and is quite sobering to visit.

Besides recovering from jet lag, the next day involved collecting nine Mustangs and one SUV ('Bustang'). Whilst this sounds easy, the highway system around Dallas-Fort Worth is sufficiently complex to confuse even the best GPS, let alone the operator. Needless to say all eventually ended up back at the hotel, even if a little shattered.

Fully recovered next morning and with all cars equipped with walkie talkies, magnetic MOCA door stickers and Aussie flags, the next stop was San Antonio. Yes, Davey Crockett (or at least his legend) lives right down town in the Alamo.

After a short stop in Corpus Christi, to visit the aircraft carrier the USS Lexington, the Red Shirts made it to Houston in time to join the Mustang Club of USA, for a dinner at the Houston Space Centre, the guest speaker being astronaut Drew Feustel. Various tours next day allowed the opportunity to visit all aspects of this enormous complex.

The next major stop was New Orleans, with accommodation in the French Quarter, close to the famous Bourbon Street and its extremely loud jazz music. Yes, the weather did not disappoint, flooded streets and impossible driving conditions reminded all of where we were.

After passing through some severely hurricane damaged areas around the Gulf of Mexico the Mustang convoy (plus one 'Bustang'), made it to Ford's Garage in Fort Myers on the west coast of Florida. They all look the same, massive.

The Daytona Speedway encouraged a few Red Shirts to pilot a NASCAR around this famous track, some of course were happy to be passengers. The motel in this instance was across the road from the track, hence, the roar of cars could be heard well into the night.

Finally Charlotte, or to be more precise Concord. The day is 17 April and the birthday of the Mustang. Chartered members and those who had registered early were invited to be present at the official opening. Australia was well represented by several Red Shirts, who were then allowed to tour the museum before it was opened to the public. The Mustang Club of Australia (Queensland) is the only foreign club to be an original 'Charter' member. Hence time was spent locating the club banner as well as mention in other places such as the memorial bricks on the entry pavement.

Once again all felt privileged as most staff had given up their Easter break to allow Mustang enthusiasts to view a working factory. Needless to say, there were plenty of clip on koalas left behind at this location.

After heading north through the Great Smokey Mountains National Park, the option was to spend some time in Pigeon Forge, the home of Dollywood, or visit the Floyd Garrett Muscle Car Museum.

Whilst the date in the US was 24 April, it was decided to hold an ANZAC day ceremony to coincide with the dawn service in Australia. A very private location on the banks of Red River in Kentucky provided a very appropriate setting for a very solemn moment, followed by playing (via smart phone) of the Last Post.

No visit to this part of the world would be complete without a drive, even if it is in a tour bus, around the famous track at Indianapolis. The relevant history is well preserved in the associated museum.

Kissing the famous bricks which make up a metre of the race track is a tradition the Red Shirts just had to do. An added bonus was to see displays of Will Power (An Aussie from Toowoomba) winning the Indianapolis 500 in 2018.



With racing blood stirred up, a stop in Louisville to visit a different race track was a must. Churchill Downs is the home of the famous Kentucky Derby. Timing was a bit out on this occasion as the 2019 derby was held a week later. Hence, all were able to relate to the news, about the winner being disqualified for the first time since 1875.

It would have been good to have run into Keith Urban in Nashville, the capital of Country and Western. However, it was a thrill when the announcer at the 'Grand Ole Opry' welcomed the Australian Mustang Club to the audience. The Country Music Hall of Fame was a must, along with a paddle steamer ride on the General Jackson, along the Cumberland River.

Still in Tennessee, no trip to this part of the world would be complete without a visit to Graceland in Memphis. Elvis certainly lives on, at least in a museum that pays tribute after tribute. Fortunately, Graceland has been preserved in its original condition and is a trolley ride away from the museum. Beale Street in down town Memphis holds its own against Bourbon Street, and is host to the famous B B King's Blues Club. Red Shirts strike again.

Clarksdale at the intersection of US Highways 61 & 49 in Mississippi is the home to the Delta Blues Museum as well as Ground Zero Blues Club. Lunch at this club was a unique experience, especially since Morgan Freeman is a co-owner.

A return to Dallas was quite surreal as Mustangs had to be returned and thoughts turned to the long trip home. Last minute shopping at Walmart filled in the afternoon before a 10 PM departure and then a 36 hours trip from start to finish. At last Aussie food!! Let's hope the enthusiasm for another magic trip is still around in 2024.

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




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WHO IS GALE HALDERMAN?

Even when an idea is great, it takes a team to make it a reality. Though <u>Lee lacocca</u> is often credited as "creating" the first Mustang, it took a team of dedicated professionals with a variety of skills who worked hard behind the scenes. Gale Halderman was one of the designers who created some of the first sketches of the Mustang and was the man who added a lot of the features that have made the Mustang an icon.

HALDERMAN'S PRE-MUSTANG WORK

Gale Halderman developed a love of auto design during his time at Dayton Art Institute and received a job offer from Ford before he even graduated. Halderman was able to convince the dean to allow him to graduate early in order to take the job after he saw some of Halderman's drawings. In them, he saw the same promise that Ford did, and recognized that Gale was already on his way to becoming an automotive designer.

Halderman was drawn to automotive design because of the challenges that it presented, offering a mental puzzle in addition to a design opportunity. Some of his first designs at Ford reflect that love of challenge. Halderman worked on retractable hardtops, the Ford Falcon, and the Thunderbird.

Every designer who worked with Gale commented on his skill and his diligence. Not surprisingly, he worked his way through the ranks. Prior to the launch of Ford's 1964 and 1965 car lines, Halderman was working as a design manager. The launch required he and his team to work long hours, but Halderman still loved automotive design.

IACOCCA'S GREAT IDEA

Then, Lee lacocca had an idea, a sort of contest between the design departments at Ford. Every department was supposed to submit their best design for a car that was personal and sporty, that would appeal to women and to men, and that could be made affordably. It was a challenge, and that, of course, was what Halderman had been drawn to in the first place.

One late weekend night, Halderman worked on his sketches. His design was sporty. It was personal, and it had the kind of customizable feel that made it the right car for everyone.

Halderman's designs were picked to be the basis for the team's clay model. It's not hard to find the Mustang we know and love in Halderman's sketches. It's there in the quarter panel side mouldings and hop-up design. His tail lights had the convex shape that has become iconic on early Mustangs. At the time, the project was called the "Ford Cougar" and early examples can even be seen with a cougar in the place that would be occupied by a running pony.



THE FIRST FASTBACK

The first Mustang Fastback, now considered one of the most classic styles of the first generation, was designed in secret because Halderman and his team knew that Henry Ford wouldn't approve of it. There were many rules that the design teams operated under, but as soon as the design team saw the prototype for the Mustang, they felt that a fastback version needed to exist, even if it would only ever be the one.

The team first created a clay model, and then a fiberglass finished model which they painted Candy Apple Red. This first fastback was covered in the courtyard, where Halderman's team took Lee laccoca during his next design review, adding an element of showmanship and pageantry in the hopes that it would pull laccoca to their side.

As soon as the cover was pulled off of the world's first red Mustang Fastback, laccoca's cigar began to twirl, a well-known tell for when he was pleased. Halderman knew then that there would be a Mustang fastback.



A STUNNING SUCCESS

Even though the Mustang's early engineers, test drivers, and prototype builders all loved it and said it was a special car, Halderman and his team were still blown away by the Mustang's runaway success. It was the modern-day equivalent of "going viral" and everyone involved was elated. The Mustang, by Halderman's count, broke seventy-seven of Ford's "rules" for vehicles, and apparently, that was exactly what people were looking for.

Halderman was an integral part of the first Mustang design team, and then the first-generation Mustang design. The problem with hitting it out of the park on the first swing is that it puts enormous pressure on the subsequent years. Halderman describes passionate discussions between designers who wanted to lean into the design features people had liked about the first Mustang and other designers who wanted to try something entirely different.

The first generation of Mustang reflects the battle between keeping what people loved and creating something new, with no two years being exactly the same. Even the two closest years, the <u>'65 and '66</u> Mustang, were full of differences. When Bunkie Knudsen and <u>Larry Shinoda</u> joined the team at Ford and brought the best and the worst of GMs design ideas with them, it became clear how broad the appeal of the Mustang was. Far from just being a personal sporty car, as they originally envisioned, the Mustang was also an enthusiast car.

Because Knudsen and laccoca's tastes were so different, Halderman claims that the design team actually would make two almost identical models with touches that they knew would appeal to either but not both. Fortunately, they never visited the design studio at the same time.

HALDERMAN'S CONTINUED CONTRIBUTIONS

Halderman's contributions to the Mustang haven't gone unrecognized. In 2004, Halderman was inducted into the Mustang Club of America's Hall of Fame. In 2014, Halderman was presented with an lacocca award, and if you visit Tipp City, Ohio you'll find the Halderman museum.

In the Halderman museum, Gale keeps his favourite Mustang: A Candy Apple Red Convertible. He also regularly holds meetups for Mustang owners at the Museum and can be found at many Mustang events and gatherings. Halderman is infallibly humble, discussing at length not only his contributions but also the way the entire team came together to create a car that people would still be talking about nearly sixty years later.

Clean Air Matters

London Ultra Low Emissions Zone (ULEZ)

I start with some good news. There has been some considerable uncertainty created by various TfL communications on exemptions under the ULEZ. Not least the online -Ghecker" seemed to be providing incorrect responses and suggesting historic vehicles were not exempt. There was also some doubt as to whether or not exempt vehicles had to be put on a register.

I am now pleased to provide a quotation from a TfL letter dated 22 June.

I would confirm that vehicles registered with DVLA and taxed in the historic vehicle tax class will be exempt from the ULEZ.

All vehicles constructed before 1 January 1973 will also be exempt from ULEZ, as they currently are for the London Low Emission Zone (LEZ).

Vehicles that meet either of the above criteria and are registered in the UK will be automatically exempt and will not need to register with us, as long as their DVLA records indicate that their vehicle has historic vehicle tax class or was constructed before 1 January 1973.

I think this sets out the position both clearly and accurately, and members can feel confident that any conflicting advice they might receive is wrong.

Wales Clean Air Framework

The Federation has responded to a consultation regarding the Welsh Clean Air Framework.

That consultation contains the worrying suggestion that historic vehicles should only be exempt from LEZs if they are not capable of modification to enable them to comply. The Federation is aware that there has been some perhaps unfortunate publicity, including the Jaguar E-Type used at the Royal Wedding, which might suggest that it is both easy and desirable to re-engine historic vehicles.

In its response to the Consultation, the Federation has pointed out that such changes would be cultural vandalism and would destroy the authenticity of the vehicles.

As both the English and Scottish Clean Air frameworks consulted upon start from the assumption that all historic vehicles (defined as being in the historic taxation class) will be exempt, the Federation is hopeful that our submission will be properly taken account of and the proposal modified, but it might be useful for members located in Wales to encourage political support for our position if possible.

Other Clean Air Zones and Low Emission Zones

It does now look as if we may be at the beginning of a rapid roll-out of local Clean Air or Low Emission Zones and the Federation is working out how to respond to each of them as they arise. Local authorities have different methods of promulgating consultations, some of which assume that only local people need to be made aware of them, so If any member becomes aware of a local consultation is commencing, of which we might not be aware, please do not hesitate to let either Emma or myself know.

Heritage Skills Academy

Trailblazer Apprenticeship Success

Two months ago, we received the news that the Heritage Engineering Apprenticeship scheme we have been working on for over a year had been allocated a funding band of £21,000 by the Institute of Apprenticeships. With the scheme costing around £30,000 to deliver we were hoping for the top band funding which is £27,000. The difference between the funding and the delivery cost has to be paid by the employer on top of paying the apprentice salary and travel costs. At the lower funding band we knew this would not make the course financially viable with most employers being small businesses. We therefore appealed the decision and I am very pleased to confirm that the appeal was successful and we have been allocated a funding band of £26,000.

Although not £27,000 we have accepted the decision and we are now confident that with this funding level the Heritage Engineering Apprenticeship will be successful in attracting both employers and apprentices.

Over the last six months the level of interest in the course has been tremendous and the Heritage Skills Academy that has been running the course from our dedicated facility at Bicester Heritage has seen significant growth in numbers of employers coming forward and particularly the number of people wanting to do this apprenticeship and make a career in classic vehicles.

The course is block release, based at Bicester and by the end of the year there should be at least 30 apprentices being trained in this new standard. The news about the funding could now accelerate that growth but it also gives us all the confidence to expand the facility when the numbers increase and we need more room. To date we are well ahead of our 3 year plan and that has also allowed time to look at specialist skills that have not been included so far in the training.

Coachbuilding and trim are two areas of skill that we keep getting asked about and are presently not available as part of the apprenticeship but that may now change. This specialisation is covered in the apprenticeship standard and is covered by the funding if there is sufficient interest to be able to run a

course which ideally would be for 10 apprentices.

Having the facility at Bicester Heritage has been a big boost in getting people to know about the apprenticeship course, but also to find out about the other courses that are available from the Heritage Skills Academy. The courses for English Wheel run by Clement and Boggis have already been very successful and Heritage Skills Academy are interested to talk to clubs who would like to organise practical days where the Heritage Skills Academy team can work with club members on specific marques.

SEMA Federal Legislative Priorities: 2018

RPM Act: In July 2015, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) inserted a provision into the proposed greenhouse gas rule for trucks and buses stating that the Clean Air Act (CAA) prohibits emissions system modifications to motor vehicles that are converted for racing. The language also provided the EPA with the authority to regulate race products which can be installed on highway vehicles. While the EPA removed the provision from the final greenhouse gas rule, the agency continues to assert its newfound authority to regulate race parts and its position that converted street vehicles are illegal even if there is no enforcement against the individual. SEMA is working with key members of Congress to pass the Recognizing the Protection of Motorsports Act" (RPM Act), H.R. 350/S. 203, which clarifies that the CAA allows for emissions modifications to motor vehicles used exclusively for racing and that it is legal to produce, sell and install race parts for these vehicles. SEMA and its coalition partners have built strong bi-partisan support for the legislation in the 2017-2018 session of Congress. including more than 185 bill sponsors. Passing the RPM Act into law is the SEMA/SAN's top legislative priority.

Tariffs: The Trump Administration has imposed or threatened to impose global or country-specific tariffs on many products. While SEMA supports taking actions against unfair trade practices, tariffs are a blunt instrument for dealing with trade disputes and often have unexpected and unwelcome consequences. Beyond imposing a tax on trade, tariffs create downstream price spikes, hoarding, marketplace confusion and supply chain disruption. Although the intent may be to use the tariffs as bargaining chips in trade negotiations, they have already inflicted harm on many SEMA members who are now faced with trying to absorb higher prices.

SEMA is actively opposing the tariffs including testifying before the U.S. Department of Commerce (DOC) against potential tariffs of up to 25% on imported automobiles and auto parts. The U.S. government has also imposed tariffs on imported steel (25%) and aluminum (10%) and is preparing to impose 25% tariffs on \$50 billion worth of Chinese products and potentially even more. A number of countries are now imposing retaliatory tariffs on American products. SEMA is urging the president and lawmakers to use other mechanisms available under U.S. trade law to combat unfair trade.

Replica Vehicle Law: SEMA worked with leaders in Congress to enact a 2015 law permitting small volume automakers to each sell up to 325 turn-key replica vehicles in the U.S. (5,000 worldwide per company) under a simplified regulatory system. cars resemble production manufactured at least 25 years ago such as 1930sera hot rods and 1960s-era Cobras. Before the law was enacted, the federal government did not differentiate between a company producing millions of vehicles and a business producing a few custom cars. As a result, a small -kit car" market emerged where a manufacturer sold car parts, frequently assembled, and the buyer installed the engine/ transmission. While states have often regulated kit cars built by hobbyists by the model year they resemble, the federal government viewed a manufacturer-completed replica car to be a current model year vehicle. The law now allows each manufacturer to sell up to 325 completed replicas in the U.S. subject to equipment regulations, the same as kit cars. Hobbyists will still have the freedom to assemble their own vehicle if they prefer. SEMA is working with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and the EPA as they draft regulations to implement the law.
