I have asked Chris to hold off on putting the IMPROMPTU Events on the club FACEBOOK Site

The reason is that Clubs are contacting TMR to verify the rules for IMPROMPTU Rules.

Three years since we were granted the option to List events on Facebook or media pages and SIVS Cars were able to attend advertised events as long as they are put on by incorporated car clubs. After the last TMR meeting Doug Young [retired lawyer] has asked if we could do as Western Australia does and have Impromptu Events with details logged on Facebook.

They agreed and sent out an Email to MOCC members. The main point of the Email: - from Manager Registration Policy: - Impromptu Events, TMR is happy for Queensland Incorporated clubs to manage impromptu events on a case by case basis, as long as the event is added to the incorporated club's newsletter, website or social media page.

Doug Young has read this as a lawyer and is saying this is a policy announcement meaning; - What type of use is envisaged by Impromptu Events? The answer is enthusiast type use, and not every day type vehicle use. So, no work-commuting, no work use, no hiring out, no use for running down to the shops etc. But a trip to meet another enthusiast would be OK. Or a picnic. Or to pick up a friend from the airport who would enjoy the experience.

I will let this run its course and see if Doug can convince TMR this is what they meant in the Email???

Russell Whitney had a phone call from TMR to ask his view on lowering the Roll on 30 years to 20 years. His was the same as theirs to leave it, as the loss in revenue will have to be made up. The view of the meeting was to agree with Russell.





The Economic Impact of Old Cars

(Article in January 2018 edition of Hemmings Classic Car magazine, written by Richard Lentinello)

Lately in the news I've been reading that many European countries are considering a plan to ban gasoline powered automobiles by 2040. There are also discussions on possibly banning the sale of gasoline altogether. Could the USA be far behind in doing the same?

If so, these drastic measures may very well render our beloved collector cars useless and valueless. While we all want clean air, these politicians simply don't realize just how owners of collector cars, hot rods, racing cars, sports cars, low riders, vintage trucks, rat rods, and all the other segments of the collector car and performance car hobby contribute to the country's Gross National Product. The combined financial contribution of the various collector car interests and the automotive aftermarket, and those businesses that rely on them, is truly enormous.

Demand for reproduction parts, restoration parts, performance parts, racing parts, street rod parts, truck parts, motorcycle parts, and off road parts has generated, and continues to generate, great growth, not only for the companies that produce and sell these components but also for the companies that feed off them. Broken down this way, it becomes clearer to see that the entire automotive industry has had a positive impact on the cities and towns in which these parts manufacturers and suppliers are located. As their businesses have grown, so has their need for warehouse space, which in turn has allowed realtors to profit, as well as the towns themselves through increased real estate taxes resulting from the occupied buildings, some of which never would have been occupied in the first place.

Stocking automotive parts in the suppliers' warehouses also means good business for forklift manufacturers to handle the parts, and the shelving manufacturers upon which the parts must be stored, all the way down to the local lighting and HVAC suppliers and installers who provide the means to which these warehouses are lit, heated and cooled.

Auto body supply companies benefit, too, by selling more primers, paints, sealers, sandpaper, tack rags, masks, and spray guns, all of which are needed to refinish all the cars and trucks being restored, rebuilt and customized. Same goes for tool suppliers, from the big stores to the regional truck dealers and swap meet vendors, which, of course, means that all the tool manufacturers profit as well.

Manufacturers of cardboard boxes, Styrofoam peanuts and Bubble Wrap used to protect these

products during shipping are profiting too. Paper mills and printing companies make money manufacturing the paper and printing the shipping labels and order forms, as well as all the catalogues and car related magazines. Which, of course, helps increase the profits of the U.S. Postal Service. Then there are the thousands of graphic artists and IT specialists employed to design the websites for these companies, as well as the computers, software and related hardware required to make each of these businesses function. There's also all the trucking companies such as UPS, FedEx and many others, who profit from delivering to our front door the parts we order.

All the companies that manufacture these parts and products, as well as garage accessories, lifts, clothing, general maintenance items, batteries, and even something as basic as shop rags, when their work staff are combined, employ several million people throughout the world. And that's a pretty significant number of jobs having been created just to meet the demand for automotive merchandise.

Keep in mind that when you order a lift for your garage, or even jack stands, it positively affects the suppliers of the steel mills that provide the steel needed to produce these products. This trickle down affect greatly aids all the swap meets and car shows around the country, too, because they rent spaces to small mom and pop companies that sell these new and reproduction restoration parts, tools and accessories.

Most important, old cars, trucks and motorcycles are an intrinsic part of many a country's history, so they all need to be protected and celebrated for future generations to see instead of being discarded like yesterday's trash.

So, you see, the banning of gas powered vehicles has a far wider reaching negative effect than many people realize. Let's hope it doesn't come true.

Asbestos Update: from Old World Lamps & Tires

The following article has been sourced from Old World Lamps and Tires January 2019 newsletter and is indicative of the risk involved currently in importing classic vehicles with the potential of having some asbestos.

After over a decade of importing Old World Tyres (we) have finally been forced to undertake our first asbestos inspection. This was completed on a 1931 Cadillac sedan we imported for a customer mid 2018.


Over the past few years, I have been criticised overseas for the amount of, particularly veteran, imports we (Australians) have conducted over the last decade. What the criticisers forget is the outflow of cars to the USA & Europe to the big cheque books in the late 1960's and 70's before the days of the internet and Australians were aware of the true value & history of some of our original

Australian imported vehicles. I, personally, am very keen on returning as much of our lost early motoring heritage back to Australia as possible.

If, as many suspect, the asbestos checking is a government attempt to close down the collector car hobby or certainly any imports of new stocks into the hobby or the return of our motoring history, then the Government is achieving their objective as imports have slowed dramatically. If it is to see other country's economies like the US bolstered by having employment swell in the area of stripping out brakes and gaskets from potential exports to Australia, then again they are achieving that also.

Whilst I confess I do not understand the government's focus on asbestos in older vehicles being imported into Australia, it is a political decision and I acknowledge that Australian Border Force (ABF) & Customs officers do their duty by instruction from their political masters. Throughout the whole process of the asbestos inspection, I found the staff to be professional and courteous however the communication process between the ourselves as the importer and government staff is stilted at best!

The process of an asbestos inspection, in theory should be quite simple, however the execution was somewhat mind-blowingly complicated and long winded. In our case the container arrived as usual. and we lodged documents in the normal manner very early so as to fast track the documentation clearance system as much as possible. The Cadillac came back "red line" which generally means Customs wants to have a closer look at the attached documents, particularly the proof of payments to ensure that there is no funny business going on with the value of the car and the payment process. So we supplied the proof of payment, and then Customs come back and said they wished to do an asbestos test on the 1931 Caddy - thus began the hurdy gurdy.



The container sat on the dock while everyone (ABF, Customs and Quarantine) decided what to do and if our normal quarantine facility had the necessary approvals to handle the asbestos inspection. In the meantime, I had to alert our client that the asbestos inspection process had been initiated on their vehicle. After all the approval processes were sorted, Customs allowed the container to be moved off the dock and to our quarantine facility with the strict instruction "seals intact", which means the container cannot be unpacked until ABF & Customs are present. So the next process was to find a licensed asbestos inspector that ABF & Customs approved of (they do not have a list of preferred suppliers) - this process took another 14 days! With the container sitting there unable to be unpacked, the container was now well outside it's permissible hire period from the shipping line and demurrage was levied on a daily rate.

Finally with ABF, Customs, an asbestos hygienist & myself as acting mechanic all together at the container yard, we opened the doors of the container and removed the Caddy, and the other goods within

the container. The Caddy was then placed inside the quarantine facility where the inspection commenced.

The testing itself was relatively simple – take samples of potential areas of hazard ie wiring, firewall heat suppression, head &exhaust gaskets, brake linings etc. a total of seven samples were taken of suspect areas.

Where the process became truly extraordinary was when Customs required that all the other goods are "held, not to be released is case of cross contamination" until the Cadillac was cleared or any offending material is removed. So over \$100,000 worth of goods including customer tyres and our stock was held while this process was concluded.

Several days after the testing, the results were returned in a 28 page report and there was asbestos found in the brake linings and the exhaust header gaskets. As such, the process of finding a new asbestos hygienist was undertaken, as the previous hygienist firm was not allowed to undertake the removal, so as to prevent the perception that one firm may be "gold digging" for work. However this required more time consuming logistics and again put further delays into the removal of the asbestos and the release of the container.

Once a new firm was located, the process of coordinating the new hygienist, ABF & Customs together begins and four weeks later a date is finally secured. So on a Monday morning, we all assembled to remove the offending parts. As this was a 1931 Cadillac and the parts are not available off the shelf, I was keen to ensure only the brake linings (not the entire shoes) with the asbestos were removed. Luckily the linings were riveted to the shoes not bonded and I could drill out the rivets and remove the offending material without destroying the integrity of the Caddy. Likewise, I un-bolted the exhaust header and dropped the engine pipe so the gaskets could be removed without any damage to the car. After 51/2 hours, the asbestos was removed bagged, tagged and sent off for destruction.

Then another week later the official certificate was finally issued and all up costs calculated at around

the \$5000 mark! I was relieved, thinking that meant that finally all the other goods in the container were released for quarantine inspection, but no, it takes another 2 weeks before the computer system is updated to release the goods for inspection some ten weeks after the container arrived! Needless to say, I (and my customers) were considerably frustrated (an understatement) with the length of this process.

I seriously question the political motivation of this process, considering the amount of asbestos already in Australia. As mentioned previously, I have no problem with the ABF & Customs staff members - they are doing the job as directed by their political masters. However the process & lack of timely procedure sucks. Weeks of delays, extraordinary costs and interruption to business and the hobby as a whole. Even in the event the government persist with the process, there needs to be some better process and procedures developed to minimise the disruption to business and reduce the extraordinary costs levied upon the importer of a collector vehicle. Reports are rife of importers going broke or just deciding to give up under the constant government pressure & cost of asbestos inspections. The government accepts other perceived antiquated aspects of collector cars like, no indicators, two wheel brakes, acetylene headlights, wood wheels etc. Surely accepting a very minimal chance that a vehicle may contain asbestos would be reasonable? Particularly considering the amount of asbestos currently in Australian cars and other parts of Australian society.

Our hobby earns the government millions in revenue - just with this container alone there was nearly \$20,000 in GST and 10s of \$1,000 more to be spent on the restoration of the vehicles contained in just this one container, in turn creating jobs & making the Australian economy thrive and producing more GST for the government. By my estimate, the collector car hobby is a \$500mill to \$1-billion industry and with this pinpoint focus on old car imports, the government is potentially shutting down a huge segment of our industry, costing themselves \$millions in lost revenue by focusing on one tiny aspect of what is a whole of nation asbestos issue. Hopefully common sense somewhere in the political arena, driven by a loss of revenue, will ultimately prevail.

In order to facilitate the recognition of the importance of our hobby and the supporting industry, we need to unite and make representation to the Federal Ministers to streamline this process and confirm once and for ever if this is actually designed to be a back door process to close down the collector car market. It is time to for representatives from individual aspects of the hobby to collectively meet with all appropriate ministers and lobby government to get a clear direction on the asbestos issue and the government's intentions toward the collector car hobby as a whole
