The committee thanks all office bearers and other club members for their efforts throughout the year.

Overview

- The key register has been maintained, updated and signed by all parties holding club keys.
- The clubhouse lease agreement with Brisbane City Council has three (3) years remaining.
- The only regular sub-let of the clubhouse is to the Sprite Car Club. A local choir uses the building irregularly as a rehearsal space.

- The Treasurer (Russell Whitney) has done a lot of work to more fully integrate the Club's financial operations with the Cashflow software and the BOQ internet banking portal. The benefits of this work include a much more automated system with much less reliance on paper. Hand written receipts and cheques have been virtually eliminated, saving time, effort and postage. All transactions are captured in Cashflow, ensuring accuracy and transparent reporting. I'm sure this has made the Treasurer's job easier than it once was.
- The Club's financial returns have been prepared and/or checked by David Star (Tax Agent) and John Dixon (Accountant/Auditor) as for previous years.
- Nine (9) members crossed the 20-year membership threshold this year John & Christine Smith, Alan Crane & Carmel Pollard, Don & Sue Allan, Lynette Riley, Ken & Sue Clark, Warren & Michelle Cooke, Robert Hutcheson, Paul & Julie Brelsford and Tony & Wendy Ruhle. These members will be mentioned at the September 2017 meeting and new badges will be presented to those present at the October 2017 meeting.
- No new 30 year members this year.

Financials

The Club accounts with BOQ held a combined total of \$102,847 on 30 June 2017. This is an increase of \$15,896 or 18% compared to the same date in 2016. Total Equity (bank accounts + floats + stock + other assets) totaled \$115,749 – up from \$100,990 in 2016. Some of the extra money came from early payment by members and sponsors for the State Concours. The Club will have a tax bill of approximately \$300 for the 2016-17FY. Generally, income from members is not taxable but income from non-members (think sponsors) is taxable unless it can be offset by expenses. The fully audited financial report is available for perusal and a summary will be published along with this report in the October 2017 Club Magazine. The Tax Assessment from the ATO has not yet been received, therefore the Club's tax situation is only an estimate.

Expenditure

The committee ensured all required expenses were paid and the Club got the best possible value for money. No work was done to the clubhouse in this reporting period because there was nothing that needed attention. This will change in coming years with bigger maintenance items, including an external repaint, coming due. Printing and mailing of the magazine remains the Club's largest recurring expense.

Membership

Membership on 30th June 2017 was 361, two (2) members more than the same time last year. The strong sales of new Mustangs by local Ford dealers is increasing the pool of Mustangs and therefore making more people eligible to become members of this Club. Some members now have a 'new' to go with the 'classic' and we are seeing a lot of new membership applications from people who have just bought a 'new'. This bodes well for the continuing relevance of the Club.

A free draw for members from country areas was conducted at the 2016 Christmas Party, just like 2015 only bigger, to try to include members from outside our normal area of operations.

Major Events

Planning for the Hot Wheels and Cool Classics Car Show, incorporating the MOCA QLD INC State Concours held on 10th September was well advanced by 30th June 2017, with some sponsorship and Concours entry monies already received. This was an excellent event with an unusually good financial result which will be fully reported in the next Annual Report. This was an outstanding effort by the Concours Committee and by all the other club members who pitched in to help.

Club Runs

Neil De San Miguel (Run and Events Co-ordinator) has done a great job getting us out and about to a wide variety of destinations, ably assisted by members who have taken ownership of some monthly club runs during the year. Particular mention to Les Nye for arranging the mid-month mid-week runs which are very popular with members who are free on weekdays. The sanctioned runs and events are great opportunities for members to give their cars some

exercise, particular those cars registered under SIVS that would not otherwise be driven other than for maintenance related reasons.

Club Meetings

Most meetings are attended by 35-40 members. The members voted to increase the raffle prize value by 50% for each meeting and also retire the 'poor box' this year. This was intended to further reward attendance by members without damaging the Club's financial position. The members who attend most meetings form the operational 'core' of the Club, filling most of the elected positions to keep the Club running.

Merchandising

Sandra Whitney continued to look after merchandising this year. The decision to include merchandise on the membership application form by a previous committee continues to pay off with strong sales to new members as part of their joining 'package'.

Magazine / Website

I am happy to report that the monthly printing and mailing costs are continuing to reduce. This is occurring for two (2) reasons:

- 1. The number of members receiving a hard copy is reducing. Note that a hard copy of the magazine is not offered to new or re-joining members.
- 2. The magazine is now Print Post Approved which reduces the postage cost per unit.

The Magazine Editor (Robyn Messenger) now sends an email to every member each month when the magazine becomes available. Each member then downloads or reads a copy from a secure area on the Club's website. The advantages are quicker delivery, better photo quality, uses less Giga Bytes from the Editor's home internet plan and the reduced print & post costs.

Club Person of the Year - 2016

Russell Whitney earned this award. This award is points-based with points awarded for participation in club activities. Many members do a lot for the club, but Russell did that little bit more than others in 2016.

The 2017 Club Person of the Year will be announced at the January 2018 meeting.

Australia, Asbestos and Collector Cars

The begining

Our story begins in 2003 when the Australian government issued a zero-tolerance ban on any and all asbestos products, aimed mainly at imported Chinese drywall, a problem America also faced at the time. Fast forward to March 6, 2017 when, without prior warning to Shipping and Customs agents, let alone to owners, the Australian Border Force (ABF) began randomly testing all imported collector cars for asbestos, without any industry consultation, procedures or practices in place. One of our clients had two cars already en-route to Australia and so had no choice but to comply. One was a 1966 Shelby Mustang 350 GT and the second a stock 1966 Mustang donor-car, found together as "barn finds" and imported into Australia for restoration.

Making rules on the run

Inspectors were picked from an ABF approved list of asbestos assessors, none of whom had collector car experience since this was an all-new process. An ABF officer and a representative of the customs brokers also had to be in attendance while the owner/importer was required to provide two mechanics, tools, a floor jack, jack stands, safety clothing and masks. All five charged by the hour, with the work being done at the customs wharf.

The inspection of the Mustangs took a full 8-hour day times five people. The front brake pads, rear brake shoes, exhaust manifold and exhaust pipe gaskets from both cars plus the add-on A/C compressor from the stock Mustang were all taken for inspection. Some of the sealer from inside the wheel wells, around the firewall and the caulking around the windshield were also removed for testing. Additionally, samples were cut from the headliner material, the door frame inner padding, the hood scoop, the brake air ducts, the windshield washer bag and sample sections were cut from the wiring loom. As the 350 GT was pushed onto a hoist the ribbed aluminium oil pan fins were

damaged. The pleas of both mechanics to cease the destructive sample-taking were ignored by the inspector, the customs agent and the ABF officer. As the day wound down the inspector recommended the removal of the engine and transmission for disassembly and removal of the front fenders and doors for further examination. Because of that day's interpretation of the regulations, the owner was not allowed to be at the inspection.

Moving to plan "B"

During & after the destructive first inspection, endless e-mails and calls between the customs broker and the ABF, the owner was able to get both mustangs taken to a well-respected exotic car sales and service center in Sydney. ABF required both a removal expert and an assessor to supervise the work, a hygienist to test the air for asbestos (how could I make this up) and two mechanics in space suits, all to remove a clutch. The caulking around the windshield, firewall and inner wheel wells was also removed but reason prevailed and so the engines were not disassembled. Both cars were then released to the owner.

Total time was two months. Costs including the two removal experts, two assessors, two mechanics, (twice) the hygienist, plus the asbestos lab analyses and bulk sample report was approximately \$15,000, not including the damage and cost to replace the seized parts on both cars plus the possibility of fines for non-compliance.

Meanwhile, across the continent

Meanwhile, in Perth, on the other side of Australia, an enthusiast with a DKW obsession imported a rare 1953 DKW F89, a two cylinder, 23 hp. 684 cc post-war Germany econo-car built from 1950-54 and based on a pre-war design. Although 60,000 DKW F89s were built, most were scrapped as the German economy recovered and much better cars came to market. DKW was acquired by Mercedes in 1957, sold to Volkswagen-Audi in 1964 and DKW ceased to exist.

The DKW in question was sold new into Portugal, was complete, relatively rust free and at \$7,000 Aus (\$5,400 USD) was a very affordable and unique collector car. As the third collector car to be inspected and the first in the Perth area, the owner was lucky. The asbestos inspector was both reasonable and horrified by the tale of the two Mustangs imported into Sydney, which had quickly gone through the collector car community. The initial inspection found asbestos in the rear brakes, the head and manifold gaskets and the under-coating in the wheel wells. The car was immediately impounded and the real problems began.

ABF again changes the rules

The owner requested that he and a mechanic remove the offending material, but this was rejected by the ABF as they were not "authorized" to enter the "secure" dockside area. ABF insisted on a professional asbestos remover, but none had vintage car experience. The owner next asked to attend with the chosen asbestos remover but was again denied access to his car. A week later ABF agreed to the owner's request to have his mechanic remove the asbestos, but after completing the paperwork, permits and an inspection time, ABF decided that removing the parts in the storage depot might be unsafe and the permit was cancelled.

ABF first declined and then approved transport to Classic Gasoline, a collector car service center in Perth. ABF then again changed their mind and advised the car could only be moved to a certified asbestos removal center. After realizing there was no certified asbestos removal center that could do the work, ABF relented and permitted the car to be moved to Classic Gasoline. Paperwork recommenced, but at the lastminute Quarantine intervened, advising that the DKW could only be moved after it had been spray cleaned, but that it could only be spray cleaned after the asbestos was removed. As the owner wrote, "Catch 22 meets Franz Kafka".

Back to plan "A"

Everyone agreed to go back to plan "A", a removal time was again booked only to have someone at ABF again demand the work be done by an asbestos specialist. After yet more calls, e-mails and negotiations it was finally agreed that AB the original inspector, two mechanics from Classic Gasolinu and the owner would inspect the car, agree to the work to be done and the owner and mechanics would then be allowed to complete the work at dockside. Thanks to the DKW's small engine, it was lifted out without a hoist for disassembly. After even more paperwork, ABF certified the removed parts and arranged their seizure and destruction. The additional storag fees were \$3,000, the mechanics charged \$1,500 and the shipping agents were another \$1,500 plus the cost of finding and replacing the seized parts, so almost equal to the origin \$7,000 purchase price. The local ABF did not issue any fine for the non-compliant parts.

The good news is that most new cars, world-wide, were asbestos free by 1999, but the bad news is that virtually all cars built before 1999 have asbestos-based components. All imported cars must obtain an asbestos test for their vehicles BEFORE they are shipped to Australia, but few countries have certified collector car asbestos inspectors. If asbestos i identified, it must be removed before the vehicle is shipped and owners must confirm the vehicle is asbestos free. The A doesn't have the time, space and manpower to inspect every car, but no-one should take the risk of being caught up in th costs and damage of a random inspection, the possible seizt and destruction of the car plus the reality of fines because th seized parts were not zero asbestos compliant.

The Australian Imported Motor Vehicle Industry Associatio lobbying the ABF to standardize a consistent inspection reg but the extra red tape, inspection costs and uncertainty have slowed imports to a crawl. Additionally, the new rules apply imports AND exports, which will be another yet-to-be-defir learning curve!

But wait, it gets more complicated

If the asbestos-related import/export restrictions were not enough, the Australian government is also ramping efforts t keep what are described as "culturally significant automobil in Australia and is considering the seizure of any vehicle deemed to have been "illegally" exported since 1987. Based on the UNESCO convention in trafficking of illicit cultural property, the proposed legislation would include any vehicle designed by an Australian, built in Australia, altered in Australia, or strongly associated with an Australian. To quo from the proposed legislation, "the best way of promoting to regime would be a couple of high profile actions for the seiz and return of forfeit cultural material". If you have a car w significant Australia history, be nervous.

All of this should be a warning of future potential problems the collector car community. If there's a way to go overboar on regulations, the government, any government, seems to find a way to make life overtly complicated. While Australi is currently the epicenter of Monty-Pythonesque import (an export) restrictions, others will follow. China, for instance, simply forbids the import of classic cars, Norway wants to eliminate ALL (new and used) gas and diesel powered cars 2025, while India and Germany want to eliminate all new g and diesel cars by 2030 and France by 2040. Our children v live in a very different world.

DOWNSIZING.

Many in the club are reaching an age where downsizing is entering their thinking and this photo is a good example. Now that the yellow racer is back together again, this may be my next challenge. After heaving the heavyweight Mustang around the tracks, something smaller, lighter and more nimble may be just the ticket. There is a purpose in the bonnet being measured ----- I think a 302 might just fit ------ I mean how hard could it be?

On the subject of our 1968 racer, an engine rebuild was required after roller rockers broke up at 7,000 rpm. with needle rollers and shrapnel going through the engine.

It was instructive to be able to trace the failure, as most rockers were in different stages of destruction ----destruction that began with the breakage of the 5-cent circlip that locates the needle bearings. First the circlips, then the bearing caps came out, next the needles, then the rockers broke up and flailed about damaging some valve stems and pushrods.

These rockers are sold as "Premium Race Rockers" but sadly we have proved this is not the case. Brand name supplied in a plain brown envelope. Replacements are steel not alloy, although the valve gear is the last place extra weight is wanted.

I will notify the Club when next we race, so that all members can go about all day with fingers crossed!

FUEL FILTERS

The fuel filter is as vital as the engine oil filter but often it is forgotten. Forget the fuel filter to your peril, unless of course you like sitting on the roadside with a car that will not run. The fuel filter is small that hides in the engine compartment often snuggling up to the carburettor hidden under the air fitter or under the fuel pump, and unfortunately is often neglected and gets upset stopping the engine completely.

The fuel you buy at that shiny pump in the servo comes from a tanker through a pump into an underground tank through a pump into your car tank, then though another pump into the carby or injectors. Just how clean do you think that process is? Let me tell you from first-hand experience, NOT VERY, keeping fuel clean costs money. Grit and water gets into the fuel via many different sources. For the most part, this settles to the

> bottom of the underground tanks as sediment, a similar thing happens in your car but in driving you stir up this sludge the pump it into the carby. A further complication, if you're unlucky enough to fill up just after the servo has received a new load of fuel, all that sediment will be stirred up, mixed into the petrol, and you'll get a petrol-sediment mix in your petrol tank. Similarly,

if you frequently run your gas tank down to the 'E' mark on the gauge, you'll be sucking up petrol-sediment mix from the bottom of your own tank. It's a good job that the smart dudes at Ford decided to put in-line fuel filters in your Mustang fuel system.

These filters come in two basic styles.

Carburettor engine fuel filters. These are the plastic in-

line fuel filters. They look like a little plastic container with a wavy yellow pad in them. They're typically designed to have the fuel sucked or pushed through them via a mechanical crank-driven fuel pump. In some vehicles, you'll find this has been replaced with a smart little aluminium or chrome filter, same filter just looks better and costs more. (BLING)

Fuel injection filters. These are the metal canister-type fuel filters that are normally buried under the car somewhere. They're designed to have the fuel pushed through them by an electric high-pressure fuel pump at the tank, and so the pressure in the fuel line is much higher. Therefore, they're made of metal. Internally, the filter material is normally finer too.

WHY do vou need to filter fuel?

Well I do hope by reading this note you are getting the idea even though fuel looks clean its isn't. It is the water and fine dirt that will corrode the carby/injector and block the jets and injector ports. A common myth is that fuel filter is for the life-time-ofthe-car items. BULL!!!! A fuel filter will last from 5,000k to 50,000 depending on where you get your fuel.
