I personally would like to thank all these office bearers and other club members for their efforts throughout the year, to keep this great club operating

<u>Overview</u>

- The key register has been maintained as required.
- All the required information for the renewal of the clubhouse lease agreement has been submitted to
 Brisbane City Even though we have yet to see the lease documents I am assured we will be granted the
 lease.
- The clubrooms are currently sublet to the Sprite Car Club (monthly) and the XR Falcon Club (once annually). At this time no other associations are using the facility.
- Club operations have been impacted by the pandemic halting meetings and runs. I am concerned about
 members not attending meetings or club events, we have over 300 paid member and let us assume 200 live
 within 60Kms of the clubrooms, why are we only getting 20 to 30 attending general meetings.
- The Club's financial returns have been prepared and/or checked by David Star (Tax Agent) and John Dixon (Accountant/Auditor) as for previous years. The Club's financial position remains strong and there were no matters brought to the committee's attention by the auditor.

Financials

Total asset value as of 30 June 2021 was \$92064 compared to 30 June 2020 was \$91,056, a slight increase

The club reported a small loss for taxation purposes, this was carried forward to be used against a year when we do make a taxable profit. The fully audited financial report is available for perusal and a summary will be published with this report in the October 2021 Club Magazine.

Expenditure

This year we have had to replace the bar Fridge at a cost of \$2800, we had a path installed from the carpark to the base of the stairs, \$2500 and installed a streetlight to provide lighting for the path and part or the car park, \$1000, both these items were for members safety. While on the health and safety side we have purchased an Automated Defibrillator, this is mounted on the clubroom wall, we hope never to use it, but it is, there, just in case.

Membership

Membership on 30th August 2021 stood at 361 up on the previous year, however some members have not renewed their membership, even after a reminder was sent, this will mean that 25 members will lose their membership. The treasurer has stated that several members when paying their accounts via direct deposit have neglected to identify who was making the deposit. So, if you have not received a receipt for the membership renewal it could be you, so please contact the treasurer to sort this out.

Major Events

The club has had no major events during the year all due to the restrains of the pandemic. The 2022 Nationals Concours is currently scheduled for Adelaide in April, again this is subject to any Covid restrains. We will be hosting the 2023 Nationals, to this end we have a committee in place to organise the event.

Charitable Donations

As we have had no major events during the year, the club has made no charitable donation this year.

Club Runs

Our Run and Events Co-Ordinator, Neil De San Miguel, has continued his fantastic efforts of get us out to interesting places around the Southeast. He has also met the challenge of organising runs that meet Pandemic social distancing guidelines. Neil has had particularly bad luck organising a run to Collages crossing, being cancelled three times lockdowns and flooding. This run is planned and ready to go we just need the right day and some willing members.

Club Meetings

We have been able to hold regular general meeting during the year but under social distancing rules. As I said earlier in this report, I am concerned at the low numbers of members attending meetings. There could be any number of reasons for this, especially the concern of catching CV-19 from a group of people in close contact. As the threat of CV-19 diminishes in the future, I charge the incoming management to follow up on this matter

Merchandising

This area is rather quiet as we have had no major events, just sales to new and existing members.

Magazine / Website



The Committee's responsibility also includes such internal control as Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on our audit. We have conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Association's preparation of the financial report in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the Committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Independence

In conducting our audit, we have complied with the independence requirements of the Australian professional accounting bodies.

Electronic publication of the audited financial report

If the *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* intends to electronically present the audited financial report and auditor's report on its internet website, responsibility for the electronic presentation of the financial report on the internet is that of those charged with governance of the *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* The security and controls over information on the website should be addressed by the *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* to maintain the integrity of the data presented. The examination of the controls over the electronic presentation of audited financial report on the internet is beyond the scope of the audit of the financial report.

Audit report qualification - Basis for qualified opinion

Receipts from cash donations and other cash fundraising activities are a significant source of revenue for *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* The *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of donations and other fundraising activity revenue prior to entry in its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us about revenue from these sources was limited, our audit procedures for donations and other fundraising activity revenue had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion on whether cash donations and other cash fundraising activity revenue obtained by the *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* are complete.

Qualified opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* presents fairly in all material respects in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the financial position of the *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* at 30 June 2021 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended.

Basis of accounting

Without modifying our opinion, we draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling Committee reporting responsibilities. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.



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

LA & Long Beach ports extend gate hours to curb congestion

The main US marine gateway complex is pulling out all the stops in an effort to reduce congestion that is suffocating import flows. The ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach are extending gate hours during nights and weekends.

Los Angeles is expanding gate hours on weekends, while Long Beach is keeping gates open between 2am and 7am.

The joint announcement from both ports followed consultation with multiple supply chain stakeholders and the US Department of Transportation, as concern over supply chain disruption has kept mounting. Last week a record 65 vessels were at anchor in San Pedro Bay waiting for slots to discharge their cargo. The pile-up brought the average wait time for ships at the port complex to 8.7 days, up from 6.2 days in mid-August. The ship waiting the longest arrived on 23 August.

By one estimate door-to-door transit times from China to the US using container vessels have reached 71 days, compared to 40 days two years ago.

The US administration has become increasingly restive over the worsening situation. The White House has set up the 'Supply Chain Disruptions Task Force' with a brief to alleviate bottlenecks and speed up the movement of goods to consumers while expanding export opportunities for US firms. The ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach have worked closely with it.

70 Boxships at Anchor or Drifting Off Southern California - Up to 2 Weeks Wait for Berth. Are We Next?

With all anchorages full, and the view from the Californian coastline a vista of steel hulls and laden boxships, record amounts of vessels are being forced to drift off San Pedro Bay. MarineTraffic snapshots of the traffic (see below) require further zooming out to deeper seas as each day breaks new ship queue records.

Yesterday's update from the Marine Exchange of Southern California shows that there are 95 ships at anchor or drift areas, waiting for berth space to open up at the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach, America's top two maritime gateways. Of the 95 vessels in the queue, 70 are containerships.

Remarkably there are now 37 ships — including 29 container vessels — being forced to drift in the Pacific.

The process typically sees a vessel drift a number of miles before returning to its original position, something that tends to burn substantial amounts of fuel. Ships that start out at the back of the queue can wait for as long as three weeks now for a berth space to open up.

Speaking about the current extreme supply chain crunch last week as a keynote during London International Shipping Week, Søren Toft, the CEO of Mediterranean Shipping Company (MSC), the world's second largest containerline, discussed the massive growth in US demand, citing a 33% increase in imports from Asia into the US in the first seven months of the year. MSC has been moving 12 months' worth of goods within an eight-month timeframe, Toft revealed, telling delegates: "Supply chains are not built for such massive changes."

Giving an <u>update on operations last month</u>, Gene Seroka, the executive director of the Port of Los Angeles, said the challenge facing the entire supply chain amounts to "squeezing 10 lanes of freeway traffic into five lanes."

Data from Freightos shows the average time it takes for ocean freight to go door-to-door has increased 43% over the last year, from 50 days to 71.5 days.

Splash reported yesterday that the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach have expanded the hours during which trucks can pick up and return containers as part of their efforts to improve freight movement and reduce delays.

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

A GENERAL OVERVIEW OF ASBESTOS AND ITS DANGERS


As a respiratory and sleep physician I have been managing patients with asbestos diseases for forty years and acted as an expert witness in this field for about thirty years and estimate I have done about ten thousand medicolegal reports. I remember the first patient where I acted in a medicolegal way as he was a patient of my late father who was a GP then at Chermside. This man who had been in the Army for most of his life was suffering from a mesothelioma from which he died in about a year from diagnosis. After taking what I thought was a detailed occupational history I could find no lead until I asked him more about his service in the Army during WW2. His name was Major Norm Horder, and he had served in Army Water Transport in New Guinea e.g., landing craft etc and worked on exhausts and engines and worked with asbestos lagging. This secured his wife a service pension and a compensation and was my first of thousands of subsequent "wins".



As time went by, I became increasingly familiar with the places asbestos was used in and the various trades and tricks of the trade. Most notably I even saw patients whose fathers had been banana farmers as the farmers then used old hessian bags from James Hardie which had once contained asbestos. The whole family including children used to take the bags down to the dam, firstly shaking them out then rinsing them and drying them on the grass. Years later would the asbestos disease manifest as I shall explain. Nowadays banana farmers use blue plastic bags but then it was hessian bags.

Another twist was pineapple farmers who used a white powder which was sprinkled over the growing fruit to protect it from sunburn. However, this powder was contaminated by a type of asbestos fibre resulting in disease which in the case of asbestos usually manifests decades later.

Well, you might say, what's this got to do with Mustangs to which I reply, lots. Although no car restorer, I have heard many accounts of asbestos powder being added to make "bog" by panel beaters i.e., to fill dents and holes. Asbestos sheeting was used to reduce the heat damaging panels during welding. The sheeting was mobile and temporary and just used as a heat shield. Clutches and brake linings e.g., Hardie-Ferodo were made of compounds containing asbestos and air hoses were used to blow the dust out of a wheel housings etc and thus the workplace was clouded in dust. Brake shoes were ground to size and asbestos heat shields were found in cars between the engine and passenger compartment. On bigger vehicles, asbestos lagging was placed around exhausts etc. I am sure those of you who have worked on vehicles can tell me more from your own experience.



Well, why is asbestos so dangerous and what is it? Asbestos has been used for thousands of years and means in Greek, "unquenchable". In other words, it has this property of being resistant to fire and there is a story that the Frankish Emperor Charlemagne

(around 800 AD) had a tablecloth made of asbestos he used to impress guest with by throwing it into the fire after dinner. It had also been used as shrouds and burial rites even in ancient times. This aluminium-magnesium silicate has an unusual property of forming tiny fibres and as they are so small, they are easily inhaled and then lodge in the lung essentially for good. They induced oxygen free radicals and these in turn lead to carcinogenesis later by affecting the DNA in cells resulting generally in mesothelioma (cancer of the pleura or lining of the lung) or lung cancer. This usually takes about thirty years and mesothelioma was generally a fatal condition although treatment is improving. Lung cancer however, if diagnosed early can be cured.

Asbestos can also cause benign diseases more commonly. Pleural plaques are thickening on the inside wall of the chest we call the pleura; that fine membrane we pull off when we cook spareribs. If the thickening is more diffuse and wider, we call this diffuse pleural thickening. Sometimes the inflammation caused by the asbestos can cause the lung to roll in on itself like a jam-roll. This can look like a tumour e.g., lung cancer and is called folded atelectasis. Pleural fluid can accumulate in the chest too and we call these benign asbestos pleural effusions. Sometimes these can get quite large, but they are benign, but it is important to make sure there is no malignancy e.g. mesothelioma causing the fluid.



Asbestos is the most severe form of the benign group of diseases and is due to the scarring or fibrosis in the lung itself. It is generally slowly progressive and tends to occur from much heavier and usually prolonged exposure.

I commonly see asbestosis in carpenters who have cut asbestos-cement sheeting with angle grinders for years and including roofing material like Super Six, laggers, those who worked in power stations, those who sprayed limpet asbestos on ceilings, engine-room sailors, boiler operators, those who worked in asbestos factories and mines. The list is endless.

There are essentially three common types of asbestos; white, amosite (from Asbestos Mines of South Africa) and blue asbestos which famously came from our Wittenoom Gorge in Western Australia. I shall spare you their proper names but in general, white is less nasty than Amosite which is not as nasty as blue asbestos. There are some other forms which exist in Turkey and Greece, and which was and is used as a form of stucco on houses and fireplaces.

When I see patients with asbestos diseases, I take a detailed occupational history including about who did the washing as women are at risk from this and their children crawling around in the laundry. I know most of the tricks, workplaces like the Wunderlich factory at Gaythorne, Meeandah at Pinkenba, James Hardie at Longland Street, Newstead, as well as buildings which were full of it e.g. SGIO Building etc. After a physical examination I do lung function and a high-resolution CT chest with prone lung windows (lying on your stomach as well as your back). Often Workcover or a lawyer needs to be involved. Chest pain is common in benign disease, and I published the largest series in the literature about this. There is no preventive treatment, but regular review is my recommendation and I generally see patients annually with lung function and at least a chest Xray. It is a long story that time and space here do not allow but the take home message is to be aware of this and take precautions when facing a workplace where you think there may be asbestos as sometimes fairly minor exposure can cause mesothelioma. As smoking increases the lung cancer risk, this should be avoided. If we pick up an early lung cancer, it can be a happy ending.

Talk about it with your family doctor and seek good advice. I am happy to provide informal information if requested.

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Classics through to your daily driver!

My Journey with my Convertible – Stewart Rendell

I purchased my 1972 Mustang convertible at the end of October last year - it was one of those things where I'd been saving some money and was going to put it into Super, and my partner suggested I'd do better in another classic car - I have a 1965 XP Falcon Futura Hardtop. The mustang came as a car that had had some work done on it and had been used - and now needed some TLC. She's fitted with a 460 big block with a C6 and is now RHD (using a GM steering column for some reason). I did use the car for about a month or so to get a 'feel' for things and then had the front end rebuilt as there were a few creaks and groans I didn't like the sound of...


Then into the shed for the things I could do. Looking back at the photos I've done a lot more than I thought I would have had to do!



First job was the centre dash panel to remove the non-operational factory gauges. I'd seen a US YouTube video of a guy who'd installed 52mm VDO gauges, so I went down this path, but had to 're-angle' the bezels to point straight ahead rather than left and it worked out well. I also re-installed the radio that didn't work properly along with new speakers, an amp in the boot and a new power aerial. It was at this time I worked out that the steering column wasn't a Ford - the ignition key should have given it away!



The starting switch had failed at some time in the past and a previous owner had installed a push button to start the engine - so I bought a new Ford switch from the US and immediately saw I had more work to do.



Luckily during the conversion to RHD they selected something that has the same electrical arrangement and grafted the Ford plug coupler into the harness, but the switch operated in the opposite direction (push instead of pull) so I had to make a new bracket to attach to the steering tube. Once I plugged it in, we were back to a key start. I was able to track down the indicator assembly as well - another win as the nylon had cracked and it was a bit sloppy - this took a little more wiring detective work, but I was able to change this over and connect into the harness so even the horn operates now.



I changed all the locks and managed to track down a NOS GM barrel for the ignition - met more fab people in the US via the internet. With the top of the dash still off I did some wiring repairs and renewals and saw the state of the flexible PCB on the rear of the main instrument cluster that I removed it and went to work - pulling it to pieces to clean the dust etc out and remove

the blue dash lamp covers and upgrade the bulbs to LED - much nicer now at night. The wiring updates extended into the engine bay - there were so many inline fuses that I installed another fuse box near the battery and rationalised some of the wiring for the radio, amp, gauges and driving lights. Plus removed the coilpack wiring from the engine valley where it had been cooked... I also needed to install additional battery cables between the engine and body to address some starting issues - thought the starter was failing, just not enough copper between the battery and starter.



With the 460 being so tight in the engine bay I moved power steering hoses and fuel lines away from the extractors and replaced the neutral start switch while I had the T bar out. The T bar had always been problematic, and it turns out that the throw arm underneath is set up for a FMX auto and the C6 has a longer throw requirement - so I had to reset that lower arm, so the transmission matches the lettering on the T Bar - which I also converted to RHD. I threw in a new set of spark plug leads as it looks like rats had been nibbling on the original set... I decided that the painted 'plastic' bumper had seen just too many nudges so invested in a new chrome unit and installed a new front chin spoiler at the same time - which completely



transformed the look of the front of the car - along with new driving lights.



At this stage the interior was out and I'd ordered new carpet and underlay and the interior was with a local motor trimmer - both with a 4-6 week wait time. Well the interior was completed and no carpet - the Victorian supplier cried off saying Covid had affected them. I did get the heat proofing but never saw the carpet or underlay - whereas another Victorian supplier had them both to me in less than a week... I'm still waiting for a partial refund from the first supplier, who's gone very quiet, so I suspect I'll never see my refund. With lots of ensure 4 or 5 times and cut once the underlay and carpet went in along with the refurbished interior, including a new leather steering wheel - wow, what a difference.

I took her to a local exhaust guy for some refettling of the exhaust tips to get rid of the chrome droops with the last splash being a set of period correct Magnum 500 wheels and new tyres.

And the result has put a smile on my face and she's great to drive :)
