














QHMC DELEGATES REPORT November 2021

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
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CLUB RUN CALENDAR

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2001-2002 Ford Tickford Mustang Cobra (Australian Delivery)

The American Mustang converted in Australia to right hand drive.



When Ford Australia wanted a high-performance car to add to their line-up in 2000, they looked at the Mustang, which previously had a short history in Australia in the mid 1960s & has been privately imported by enthusiasts ever since.

The problem was the Mustang was only built as a left-hand drive car and this was not suitable for Australian road laws, so Ford Australia asked their performance car partner at the time, Tickford Vehicle Engineering to set about developing a conversion process for the car which was one of the most ambitious modification projects to be developed by a major manufacturer.



The modification involved the manufacture of 150 major new components and 200 minor components such as brackets, as well as the modification of a further 50 existing parts to turn the LHD Mustangs into RHD. More than 250 documented processes were involved with the process starting on the US assembly line where the electric driver's seat is wired to the right-hand side as well as the fitting of an Australian ADR-compliant windscreen, seatbelts, and a Japanese-spec exhaust system along with the Japanese headlamps and tail lamps which are closer to meeting Australian design rules but are still modified in Australia.

Once the cars arrived in Australia the engine, gearbox, seats, carpet, steering column, and dash are all removed to start the conversion. Firewalls were not punched in the USA & a template was used to cut the holes in the firewall

for the pedals and steering wheel while a plate was welded and glued over the old holes on the left-hand side. Moving the steering wheel to the right caused a domino effect under the bonnet and dash as now the steering column and master cylinder are now in the same position as the air conditioner once was. Again, the A/C had to be modified and moved to the left side of the car requiring all the hoses and cabling for the A/C to be rerouted also.



The LHS footwell was slightly larger than the RHS footwell to improve drivers' comfort, this meant Tickford had to now modify the RHS footwell to improve comfort for the Australian buyers as well. The footwell mod involved adjusting the shape of the transmission tunnel and removing the right hand offset of the engine and gearbox by replacing the brackets that held the engine and gearbox in place.

Once all the under-body modifications were carried out the car was put back together with a new specially developed right hand drive dashboard, new pedals and a new steering rack that is mated to the existing steering column.

Once the car was back together in one piece each Mustang was road tested before being sent to the dealers for sale. This was a huge effort, as each car took 55-man hours to complete, Ford Australia aimed to produce 250 RHD cars a year using this method. Unfortunately, sales were slow perhaps due to the cars AU\$85,000 (Coupe) \$90,000 (Convertible) price tag, with production of RHD cars stopping in 2002.

A number of these Mustang Cobras did not leave Australian Ford dealerships until some years after initial release.

Depending on who you are talking to there were just under 380 Australian converted fourth generation (SN95) "New Edge" Mustangs sold between 2001 and 2003. These figures are very open to conjecture with some people that do own these Mustangs, questioning the validity of official Ford documentation that can be obtained from the Australian Ford Customer Service Division if supplied with the vehicle VIN number. (It would make sense that the Ford document supplied on their official letterhead would be a more reliable source of information). Ford cannot validate the actual quantity imported to Australia though & only provides the vehicle build specifications relative to a particular VIN number.

It is definite & documented that Ford USA supplied 100 Mustang Cobras to Ford Australia in 2002 & these vehicles are regarded as the only 2002 Mustang Cobras in the world. Some enthusiasts in the USA do not even know about the 100 Cobras & consider that year as a **non-Cobra production year as there were none sold in the USA**.

Australia eventually received a factory built RHD Mustang when the globally available sixth generation Mustang was launched in 2015.

Australian Mustang Cobras are powered by the same 4.6 Litre all alloy (hand built) quad cam engine as in the American SVT Cobras that produced 320 horsepower. These engines were hand built & signed by the two engineers that assembled them at the SVT facility in the USA. They are exclusive engines to the Cobra, not normal regular production Mustangs

The only gearbox available for these in the USA & Australian Mustangs was a 5 speed Tremec T45.

Independent rear suspension was a first for an Australian Mustang Cobra & was only fitted in the USA to their SVT Cobras, not normal regular production Mustangs.

Unusually our Mustangs have the handbrake in our normal position closest to the driver, not like the US versions closest to the passenger.

Current second-hand pricing for 2001-2002 Australian Mustang Cobras varies significantly but generally pricing of \$35,000 seems to be where they are at the moment making them reasonably good value considering they are a lot of car for the money.

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If you are lucky enough to own a sixties Mustang you will be all too familiar with hot engine problems. First of all do not think that removing the thermostat will make your engine run cooler, in fact it will have the reverse effect as the coolant will pass through the radiator too quickly and therefore run hotter as the radiator does not have the chance to remove the heat. After all, it is only a heat exchanger and needs the hotter water temp to stay exposed to the cooling air to achieve the end result of the desired water temperature.

As Mustangs were designed in Chicago they do not perform all that well in our warmer climate. Some US Mustangs have a two-core radiator, consider a change to a three-core radiator. A three core

radiator does a pretty good job with the slightly extra cooling ability, however a move to a four core radiator will be a disadvantage as the engine will run too cool and therefore not in the desired temperature range of the manufacturer.

If you want to maintain the originality of the car there is no real solution except to be aware of the problem and be vigilant making sure the following points are followed-

- Keep the radiator free of bugs and generally clean.
- Try and straighten any bent fins
- Annually wash the radiator with a jet of water from the engine side out.
- Ensure the radiator cap works and is the correct pressure setting (13 PSI).
- Use a good quality corrosion inhibitor in the water
- Only top up with premixed water/inhibitor, demineralized or rain water
- Flush the radiator and change the radiator water every two years or if it is discoloured

Now a few facts

The highway running temperature range should be: 88°C to 95° C

The moving in slow traffic temperature range is 99°C to 102°C

The block surface temperature of an engine at normal operating temperature is usually around 86°C

The surface temperature of the top tank of a radiator at normal engine operating temperature is around 92° C with the water returning to the engine is around 71 to 73° C


Using an infrared thermometer is a quick, safe and easy way to check the engine temperatures but do not try to measure the temperature on a reflective surface

Note:

The boiling temperature of the coolant with a 13 PSI radiator cap in place is 118 ° C

As the Mustangs run a pressurized cooling system **DO NOT** <u>EVER</u> **REMOVE THE RADIATOR CAP ON A HOT ENGINE.**





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
