BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MINUTES: Amendments to minutes with regards to comments attributed to Gordon Bartils (GB). TREASURER'S APRIL REPORT:

Moved: David Irving **2**nd: Rick Dunford

Passed by majority of members present

David Irving (DI) mentioned that some further people should be involved in the reviewing of the financial reports and suggested Reg Coleman. Ed Callander (EC) to follow up with Reg

INWARD CORRESPONDENCE: Correspondence was received from various MOCA State Representatives and the National Committee via Tony Kilvington and a few Qld club members in relation to the notice Ed had placed in the magazine. Ed advised that new member Jeff Coleman had offered to present a short film on the Cobra Jet at one of the meetings and it was agreed by the majority of members that it would be interesting and worthwhile. Discussion around whether the Club should purchase a projector and screen and Alan Messenger (AM) said that the projector required would be quite expensive and suggested the purchase of a big screen smart TV that could be used for other purposes in the Club as well. Discussion around using it for further live streaming of Club meeting etc. **Voted on and passed by the majority.** EC to research cost of TV, Bracket and installation and report back next meeting.

EC spoke about the building inspection carried out by BCC earlier in the day. There was a list of items that have been identified requiring rectification but was advised by BCC to await further contact as there may be some BCC funds available to assist with the cost. Building Report to be held in abeyance until further contact from BCC

OUTWARD CORRESPONDENCE: Ed's responded to those emails that were inward bound to advice those senders their emails were received.

MEMBERSHIP DRAW: Wayne Hardwick

MAGAZINE: Robyn Messenger (RM) advised she would forward all copies of previous magazines to Stuart Brown (SB)

EC advised still had to speak with 3 advertisers

- 1) EC undertook to speak with these advertisers.

EC advised he had spoken to Phil Ross at Shannons regarding an editorial in the magazine outlining their interpretation of SIVS and the implications with regard to Insurance. Phil stated they did not wish to place the information in an editorial but would be happy to have a booth at one of MOCA's events where he would speak to individuals about the implications of using vehicles outside of SIVS and the impact on insurance should a claim be made.

MERCHANDISE: EC advised that all additional shirts have now been ordered.

RUN CO-ORDINATOR:

Neil De San Miguel was absent from the meeting

EC spoke about Stanthorpe run in June

- 1) Need to book Hotel: Apple and Grape Hotel
- 2) Advise Neil de San Miguel & Monique Callander the Social Director once you have booked
- 3) Dinner at pub on Friday night We make our own arrangements in terms of selection of meals and paying for them EC advised the garden bistro had been booked.
- 4) Anna's Restaurant Saturday night need firm numbers to secure booking and advise Monique Callander Social Director. It was decided on an Italian night.
- 5) Car show at Ford dealership on Saturday morning will commence at around 730 800am.
- 6) Wine bus tour Saturday afternoon. 14 confirmed on the tour and there will be 3 wineries/breweries visited. Departure time is midday and EC will need to advise tour operator which wineries are to be visited. If not contacted EC will make the decision himself. Ballandean's will definitely be on the list.
- 7) So far 11 cars and 22 people have confirmed they are attending run

EC advised that those travelling on Friday should meet at the BP Aratula at midday for 1230 departure and that there was only 1 car travelling on Saturday morning and they were travelling from Toowoomba. EC to advise them of the time of the car show.

EC advised the judging of the car show will be conducted by the dealership and that the trophies have been ordered.

BAR REPORT: Bar is full and going well. Rob will be away next month but will ensure the bar is stocked before leaving.

SOCIAL DIIRECTOR:

Monique Callander (MC) spoke about Stanthorpe and reconfirmed the Italian theme.

MEMBERS PRESENT AT THE MEETING WHO ARE CELEBRATING BIRTHDAYS THIS MONTH WERE GIVEN A FREE TICKET IN TONIGHTS RAFFLE:

Nil this month

QHMC: Decision made to collate the reports from John Green (JG) over a 3-month period, summarise the reports and them place them in the magazine in each quarterly edition.

NATIONAL DELEGATES:

AM reported there was no update from the National Committee as they only meet every six months. The next meeting is scheduled in Melbourne.

STATE NATIONALS (SHOW N SHINE) AND 2024 NATIONALS:

Ric Dunford (RD) mentioned the cost of accommodation at the Gold Coast particularly over Easter. Alternative locations such as Hervey Bay and Bundaberg discussed at possibilities. Vic Newland (VN) and John Turner (JT) advised it would an extra hour to their travel and that needed to be considered, along with Interstate travellers having to travel further. All options are to be considered and 3 options will be presented in the coming months.

AM spoke about a combination Show n Shine and Swap Meet and BBQ at clubhouse. Discussions were then conducted about a day where the hoist at EC's warehouse could be used to place a small selection of cars on it and have the judges identify to interested members who intended to participate in the Concourse what the judges looked for on the vehicle under carriage. DL suggested that perhaps it could be filmed and then played at the meeting, on the proposed new TV, so all members could have the benefits of the Judges expertise.

EC spoke about using his warehouse, then a run to Stuart Brown's (SB) for coffee and then returning to the Clubhouse for the final judging of the Show n Shine. He also raised the number of cars that would actually enter in the Concourse and whether or not it was viable for only a handful of cars. He mentioned sending out an EOI to establish numbers.

Brett Roberts (BR) raised that the Rolls Royce club that he is a member of had limited participation in Concourse events as at one stage it was the same 8 or so vehicles that won. After a rethink and the RRD club offering opportunities to show their members what was needed to be competitive there was a marked increase in the number of Concourse entrants, and they now have up to 70 cars entered and being judged. BR raised that is what our club should consider to increase participation

EC agreed and advised this was what he was suggesting.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

Ed advised.

- 1) He had a meeting with BCC at the clubhouse and the BCC Inspector had identified a number of compliance issues that needed attention. EC tabled the report for everyone to review. EC further advised he was later contacted by the Inspector who told him not to commence any rectification work until further advised as there may be some Council funds available to assist with the cost of the rectification work required. EC to keep members appraised of developments with BCC.
- 2) EC raised charity donation and spoke about selecting a different charity each year, or on each occasion we donate and that it was going to be an asset rather than cash donated. He advised that the Club is not broke and as a not for profit club we need to do something for the community. He suggested it needed to be a substantial donation. Marice Saunders (MS) raised that it was embarrassing to donate \$300 or \$1000 and it needed to be a more realistic figure. AM suggested \$1000. EC proposed a figure

of \$5000 and it was put to a vote. The vote was 11 all with some members abstaining. A second vote was then taken on the amount of \$3000 and it passed with a majority. EC then asked for suggestions on charities we could support and advised the whole amount did not need to go to one charity and could be split amongst several charities. Peter New (PN) raised that he thought the NDIS looked after people with disabilities when the suggestion of donating a wheelchair. EC advised that he had printed copies of the role descriptions in a folder on the Management table for members to peruse. He advised that nomination forms will be available at the next meeting and that any member who wished to nominate for any of the positions was encouraged to fill in the form. He advised he wanted to be in a position to have the new Committee finalised prior to the September deadline so that it wasn't left to the last minute.

- 3) EC raised about nominal payments for some positions on the Committee in line with what MOCA Adelaide. VN raised about where all the money was coming from as we are going to lose members with the new 3 and 3 rule, spending \$2000 on Committee positions. JT raised the proposition of Affiliate Members such as is done in Victoria and WA and that we had lost some members who still wanted to remain in the club but had to leave due to the fact they had sold their Mustang. JT advised there was a lot of knowledge that had been lost and some valuable members were no longer part of the club, and this could be an avenue to allow them to remain part of the club. EC agreed that it may be an option and that he had been handed some information by DI earlier in the evening about that particular subject. DI then spoke about what had been done in relation to research previously on the subject and advised it more complex than it seems. DI advised he had given EC all of the information. EC advised he was going to review all of the information and was not opposed to the suggestion of Affiliate Members. EC advised it will be up to the club members in the end.
- 4) Wayne Hardwick (WH) and Robyn Hardwick (RH) raised the 3 and 3 rule and advised it was difficult for them to attend the required meeting and runs as they were also members of another club that met on the same nights and had runs on similar days. EC advised that the rule was put in place with the intention of increasing participation and to benefit the club as the club was on the decline and would have folded in the near future without increased members participation. VN stated the club would not fold and EC replied it would have if something had not been done. EC stated that was the last time this was going to be discussed at a meeting and that the decision had been made in the best interest of the club.
- 5) MS raised a matter from the floor where she advised her and Ray Saunders (RS) had committed to organise a club run to Chinchilla on 17, 18 and 19 February to participate in the Chinchilla Melon Festival. She advised the club had participated in the parade in the past and that ti was a good location and fun weekend. She advised she had booked 20 Cabins at Chinchilla Tourist Park and that she needed firm number by November. She advised her and RS would organise the event and didn't anticipate they would need any help. MS and RS were thanked by the Committee for taking the initiative and organising the event.
- 6) General discussion about the All Ford Day to be held at Willowbank on 17 July and that a strong presence from the club would be good. MM raised that her nephew went last time it was on and was unable to find MOCA anywhere. 7 members at the meeting showing interest in attending, further discussion to be held next meeting.



From The Club President - June 2022

Well, that's yet another month done and dusted, now just to survive the End of Financial Year onslaught.

There actually are a few things to report this month. Which tells me we are starting to get things sorted in terms of the ongoing management and reshaping of the club, especially now that all the big item issues have pretty much been sorted.

One topic, that did raise its head at last month meeting was the issue around looking into if it is worthwhile having an "Associate" membership class for those members who for whatever reason, have sold their Mustang, yet would like to still be connected to the club, albeit without owning a Mustang anymore.



That all being said and not to pre-empt any outcome, from what I have read and absorbed so far, I don't see a whole lot of negatives. In fact, there are many clear positives, it's just going to be to decide to either run with it or not and what exactly the final details will best look like. This is not going to be an mediate adoption though, as it will take a little bit more work and tweaking by others and also a little bit of re-wording of our current constitution and then the process of a formal membership vote plus lodgement with the Office Of Fair Trading etc that process may take several months

But the management committee will keep everyone up to date on this progress over the next few meetings. but to be honest, it may need to run into the next management committee period, before anything is formally resolved enough to move forward or not move forward.

My recommendation for the new committee will be to seriously look at adopting this into practice, with a few minor adjustments to its current form.

As September is now only a matter of 3 months away, some members have asked me with all the changes made, will I be willing to throw my hat in the ring and nominate for club President for another term ----- not really sure what to make of that, but I do honestly feel, it would be wrong of myself to push ahead with all the changes made so far and not be willing to see this through for another year. Therefore, on that basis I will be putting my hand up for another year if that's the wishes of the Qld membership base. If not that's cool too! These changes and reshaping of the club may not be to everyone's liking, but they are 100% needed if the club is to survive ---- JMHO! :)

I would also encourage others to come forward now, if you would like to stand for any of the club positions.

We will be adopting the SA guidelines for this process and will be closing off all nominations by the end of July 2022 and the nominated persons WILL need to be PRESENT at the August club meeting to accept the nomination for their positions for the September AGM where they will be officially voted in or not.



Australian Shelby Register update

Firstly, a brief introduction – I am the Queensland Shelby Representative, having joined the Queensland branch of MOCA about 3 years ago. I have held a long-time passion for the early generation cars and was finally able to secure my Ivy Green 1966 GT350 Fastback. She is a striking beauty and I will probably complete a full restoration one day, but in the meantime, I have been doing a few things here and there, a lot of research and having a great time enjoying it. I also have a 2019 Bullitt, but that is another story.

During the last couple of years, there has been some significant changes to the management of the Australian Shelby Registry culminating in the previous 'Shelby.org.au' site going offline and unfortunately the pre-existing Australian Shelby Registry, including all the information in it, is no longer accessible.

Long story short, the MOCA National Body has rebuilt the Australian Shelby Registry in conjunction with Cloudmesh SA and Craig McKenzie (MOCA Shelby Registrar) which is now available at https://www.mustang.org.au/shelby-registry/. You can find a direct link to it on the MOCA website.

The MOCA National Body, through Tony Kilvington (SA), has reached out across the country to reconnect the State Shelby Representatives as a part of the reboot process. As the Queensland Shelby Representative, I am keen to do our part in rebuilding the Registry and encourage current Shelby Owners to register their car – even if it has been previously recorded.

We are keen to get into contact with all Shelby owners and obtain not only current details again, but also any prior recorded history of their car that they could possibly share. The aim is to rebuild a new and improved version of the Australian Shelby Registry.

The Australian Shelby Registry is now <u>free to join</u> and is open to all Shelby vehicles (including the new generations and the Shelby Trucks) for the model years 1965 - 1970, and 2006 - 2022.

If you own a Shelby, please do register (or re-register) it in the Australian Shelby Register.

As a relatively new member of MOCA Queensland, I do not know many of the current Queensland Shelby owners as yet. I will be notified of each Queensland registration when it occurs and will touch base to introduce myself and open a conduit, to what will hopefully be a stronger Shelby representation at future events.

DELEGATES REPORT RMVSG {Recreational Motor Vehicle and Safety Group}

Meeting 17. 03.2022

TMR and Qld.Gov. has committed to reviewing current Qld. Vehicle modifications to ensure best alignment with other Australian States and Jurisdictions. This will harmonise standards for light vehicles through Infrastructure and Transport Minister's Meeting [ITMM] New Zealand is represented at this meeting.

SCOPE:- Safe and appropriate modification of light vehicles, with two or more wheels, registered or intended to be registered in Qld. Identifying the standards in Qld. and the National Code of Practice for light vehicle construction and modification { NCOP } also known as Vehicle Standards Bulletin-14 Identifying standards in other states where they impact light vehicles being registered in Queensland. Exploring options to achieve best alignment with other States where practicable.

NOT in SCOPE :- Modifications to NEW or IMPORTED vehicles before first registration in Australia. Modifications to heavy vehicles, personal mobility device, ride-able or conditionally registered vehicles. The Approved Person accreditation scheme who approves or certify modifications.

CONDUCT of Review: The Vehicle Standards Unit, within Land Transport Safety and Regulation Branch, TMR will conduct the review, with the support of the RMVSG. Recreational Motor Vehicle and Safety Group formerly the Motoring Organisation and Car Club {MOCC} A Discussion Paper will then be developed to seek input from community and industry stake holders. Following this a final report will be presented to Qld. Minister For Transport and Main Roads

Safety CERTIFICATE: Light Trailers of up to 4.5 ton only need a Safety Certificate to register no longer a Certificate of Inspection.

Export of vehicles: - I asked if they could include in the Import of Vehicles Website to include a Warning note on EXPORTING Vehicles where they can be caught up in a 1984 restriction on vehicles of significant to Australian Motoring Heritage. TMR are to send out an answer before the next meeting?

3RD PARTY insurance: - I asked how 3rd party insurance covered E-scooters to which they said the cover is different in other States {as it is for Vehicles } The hire companies have special policy for hire scooters, but there is no cover on personally owned scooters.

SIVS dating certificates: Bailey Rowe is worried about the number of people wrighting their own dating cert. His clubs have tried E-certs but found this time consuming and TMR do not want the extra work. A lot of suggestions were brought up with no solution. My suggestion was that the form is to prove you are a member of a constructed car club and the vehicle is over 30years old or trucks and busses 25 years old, the problem as I see is that some clubs make new members must attend 3 runs 2 meetings before they are approved to get a dating cert. This means about 3 months wait to register their vehicle on SIVS. This makes it simple to create their own club dating cert. My advice was to advise the clubs to do the cert. as soon as possible and the new member will have a better attitude toward the club.

CARAVANING QUEENSLAND Jason Plant: Complained that TMR should do something about that dealers were caught where vans and motor homes were in flooded areas and were not classified --- "certified right off" because they are unregistered. If they the sell them they must tell the customer they have the problem, but when they are resold the new customer does not have to admit to possible water damage. Another problem is that it easy to go to TMR services in the suburbs and they will issue a plate and chassis number for a home-built caravan or trailer but only 4 per year, so if you need more plates your request need other names.

As you know you do not need a permit, but you need the 3rd party filled out and paid, If the testing officer takes a longer time to complete the form and are unable to register the vehicle the same day, you have to go back to the 3rd party insurer to change the date to the date you are registering the vehicle, and the cover is only covering the trip TO the testing station. The simple way is to use a Mobile testing officer.

1965-67 Mustang Sales in California

Between April 1964 and August 1966. Ford sold almost 1.2 million Mustangs across the U.S.A. Of that phenomental number, just over 200,000 were sold in Southern California. The Law Angeles sales district, spanned as far north as Fresno, as far cost as Las Vegas, and as far south as San Diego, and encompassed a huge sales area, solling 20% of all Mustangs, Galaxies and Thunderbirds. To sell more than 100,000 units of any vehicle per year was outstanding, and Ford wanted to keep the momentum of this kind of sales volume very high.

When the 1957 models were introduced to the public on September 30, 1956, the reaction was very positive for this new, updated model. However, there was some concern for how the pony for market share would stake and in the Los Angeles sales district.

What made things worse was the advent of the new competition just activing for 1967, which meant that the Mustang couldn't rest on its laurels anymore, and that some new and elever marketing had to become. Mustang's cousin, the Mercury Cougar premiered in '67, outselling its own projected sales of \$5,000, to hit no,000 sales.

Despite the competition, the 1967 Mustang held strong, almost outselling all of them combined! A total of 472,121 Mustangs were sold nationally by the end of 1967, including just over 85,000 sold in Southern California, down 15 to 20 percent from the previous year. Needless to say, 1967 was still a *great* year for Mustang!

Although Mustang still outsold the competition, several factors would effect Mustang sales as it approached the 1968 model year. The market was very soft for Mustang in 1968, particularly in Southern California, As a result of a United Auto Workers factory strike in November 1967, it reduced the number of Ford vehicles by almost a half million overall, creating parts shortages for the San Jose plant. When production resumed, the competition was already gaining ground. Canaro sales greatly increased up 95% from 1967, along with the Firebird, Javelin, and by March, the arrival of a restyled Barracuda and the new and

But what would effect Mustang the most would be the inhouse competition from Torino and Congar. Other factors of concurr were the rise in retail prices for the new, federally mandated safety changes and snug requirements, and any price increases reflected by the UAW strike settlement. Mustang sales in 1968 were down from 472, 121 to 317,404 - a drop of about 25-70% (except for the March '68 Spring Sprint protoution that exceeded sales projections during March 1967). Compared to 1967 Los Angeles District Mustang sales (an estimated 115,000), 1968 sales

were only So,000 - lower than in 1967, but still way ahead of each of the competitors individually.

It was this foreseeable drop in Mustang sales during the middle of '67, that modivaled Los Angeles Sales District

Manager Lee S. Grey to find something that exald retain that momentum that Ford had with the Mustang. The popularity of the Mustang was so great, that a drop of 15,000 units could justify almost any unique marketing plan. What Lee wanted is something that would play up the local car culture, catching the imaginations of customers into showrooms. If something wasn't readily available for the '67 model year, it just might be for 1968. If dealer customized Mustangs worked, then maybe some surt of customized Mustang built just for Southern California would be the ticket to higher sales.



The Ford "Torino", once a name considered for the Mustang, was introduced for the 1966 madel year as a mid-shed musteleant.
