
This edition will give you interviews and information about the current President and Secretary, I thought it a good place to start, we will fall right on the annual elections, so we may have changes happening as we go to press.

## Classic Mustang Facts.

### 1966 High Country Special Mustang.

In 1966, Ford started a special run of cars to be delivered to only the Denver DSO. The only things special about these cars is their colours and a special brass shield that was attached to the front fenders above the word Mustang. Only three colours were available on the HCS Columbine Blue (kind of a dark robin's egg blue colour), Aspen Gold or Timberline Green. However, these were special colours and not available on any other Mustang. There were only 333 cars made, of that number 274 were coupes, 20 were fastbacks, and 39 were convertibles.

The cars were pretty much like all other Mustangs produced in 1966, they were all body styles, and any engine /transmission options that were available. If you are looking for one of these, they were built only in San Jose Plant, have a date code of 15G, and have a six digit DSO code that started with 51 02nn. They were shipped by train to Denver where they were re-shipped to dealers in Colorado, Nebraska and Wyoming. So they are not just found in Colorado but in any state that worked out of the Denver DSO.

Only 333 were produced for 1966, and they were only sold in Colorado, Wyoming, and parts of Nebraska. All were built in the San Jose plant, and you could choose any of the three available body styles.

#### QLD STATE CONCOURS (SHOW N SHINE):

EC asked about the Show and Shine and again offered the opportunity for members to use the hoist at his business premises to allow members to inspect the under carriage of their vehicles. EC advised that it was a grenade that had been lobbed and the Committee had to deal with it now. SC stated it had been voted on before and now we are voting on it again and does it mean that the next Committee may have to deal with it again. EC advised that the Committee must deal with every request, and it could be raised again in the future requiring any future Committee to have to deal with it again. 

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

## **Queensland SIV's Guidelines**

As a part of the Mustang Owners Club of Qld, many members avail of 'club registration' As part of this you agree to the Qld Transport terms and conditions for the registration and operation of a Special Interest Vehicle. Operating outside the approved usage may very well mean that you are uninsured and liable in the event of an accident.

CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS;  A special interest vehicle must not be used for:  General purposes - for example, to commute to and from the registered operators place of employment, running down to the shops, and other forms of everyday vehicle use.  For hire or reward - a fee cannot be charged for use of the vehicle, and the owner cannot receive any consideration or reward for supplying the vehicle.
You and anyone driving your special interest vehicle must only use the vehicle for:
<ul> <li>participating in rallies or events, including impromptu events organised by an incorporated vehicle club or events sanctioned by the Australia Street Rod Federation (ASRF).</li> </ul>
☐ a rally is a social event where a parade of special interest vehicles travel together for competition or to meet at an agreed location. Rallies and events must be listed in the incorporated club newsletter or on the incorporated club's website or social media page (or in another manner approved by the club or ASRF, such as the club calendar of events) prior to the event
$\hfill \Box$ an impromptu event is an event that has been initiated by a club member, involves one or more vehicles, and must comply with the following elements:
<ul> <li>□ involves an invitation to wider club members to attend the event; and is either</li> <li>□ endorsed in advance of the event by the relevant club or ASRF committee; or,</li> <li>□ where it exists, complies with published club guidelines as to what is a valid event; and</li> </ul>
☐ is listed wither in the newsletter, on the website, or social media page (or in another manner approved by the club or ASRF, such as the club calendar of events) prior to the event. Note: Incorporated vehicle clubs should maintain a register of endorsed impromptu events. This register should contain information on the impromptu event.
☐ participating in processions for which a Special Events Permit has been issued under the Transport Operations (Road Use Management –Accreditation and Other Provisions) Regulation 2015
□ exhibiting the vehicle in displays, fetes or similar functions conducted for religious, charitable or educational purposes ceremonial purposes (such as weddings, formals, funerals) involving immediate and de facto family members, or as part of a sanctioned incorporated club event, provided this is not done for fee or reward. Immediate and de facto family means parents, grandparents, sons, daughters, grandchildren, adopted children and adopted grand children, but not extended family members such as aunts, uncles, nephews and nieces
$\hfill \square$ preparing for, proceeding to, and returning from the above activities
direct travel to and from an approved inspection station to get a safety certificate or certificate of inspection before offering the vehicle for sale travel in order to have the vehicle repaired. There is no distance restriction, however, such travel must be reasonable and justifiable by the vehicle operator road testing within a 15km radius from the place where the vehicle is garaged or is being repaired. The purpose of the travel must be to road test the vehicle following repair or restoration, or for general vehicle maintenance and not for any

other purpose. This does not include use as an everyday means of transport. A passenger may travel in your vehicle to assist with road testing—only if your vehicle can legally carry

# **Some Points relating to SIVS**

# **Club Membership is MANDATORY**

There is now a legal requirement to maintain membership of at least one club to have SIVS registration or use a SIVS registered vehicle. Penalties now apply and the SIVS REGISTRATION MUST BE SURRENDED if membership lapses.

The obligation is on owners, NOT clubs to ensure continuing membership. Clubs are not asked to retain dating certificates, only the owner.

SIVS REGISTRATION is covered by two websites;

https://www.qld.gov.au/transport/registration/fees/concession/special-interest this gets you to Special Interest Vehicle Concession Scheme Guide. This covers guidelines which are signed off by the GOVERNOR GENERAL NOT the parliament. The main part to read is Conditions and Restrictions.

The second website is more complicated and is administrated through parliament and covers all road rules not just SIVS vehicles. Transport Operations (Road Use Management -----Vehicle Standards and Safety) Regulation 2010

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# The Shelby / Arning drop - 64/66


Every car enthusiast I've ever met can agree on one thing. Old cars don't handle very well. It's pretty easy to see from the small hollow sway bars to the odd steering / suspension geometry. Now for the time this was quite advanced but let's be honest, the technology at the time was limited. Now prior to the late 60s the auto manufacturers were all focused on one thing when it came to suspension, comfort. That was the selling point that most car makers tried to push, that their ride was the best ride. Then along came the great muscle car era, the late 60s. Auto manufacturers could tell that the consumers wanted something different then your cozy little Sunday cruiser they wanted power and good looks too. So, designs changed the cars got faster and much better looking, according to my standards, but a lot of these vehicles still handled like a 30-year-old bus. Then along came a man whose name quickly became associated with fast fords, Carroll Shelby. Carroll saw that handling was lacking and this wouldn't do. So, he turned to one of the engineers at Ford who had come up with an idea on how to help this issue, Klaus Arning. Klaus's worked with Carroll on the GT350's and GT500's specifically on the suspension, he should Carroll his idea the so-called Shelby / Arning drop. This idea was simple yet effective. Lower the upper control arm and bring it rearward. This novel idea did three things, it lowered the vehicles centre of gravity, it reduced body roll by nearly 10% and it greatly improved the camber curve of the vehicles. Now that this brief little history lesson is over let's get into the theory behind this modification.

How the Shelby / Arning drop changes depends on the year of vehicle, 64-66 Mustangs, (this also would cover 60-66 Falcons and Comets), lowered the mounting hole for the control arm 1" in a perpendicular line to the original holes and moved them rearward by 1/8" on that same line. Word of caution make sure that the holes are always moved 1/8" rearward

The 67-70 Mustang, (and 67-70 Falcons, Comets, and Cougars), are only lowering the control arm mounting holes by 1"

In both cases you will want to drill the new mounting holes out to 17/32nds. The area around where the mounting hole sit are some the strongest, and thickest of the metal in the vehicle. Having said that it is suggested that you start small and work your way up to the 17/32nds in 1/32nds increments if possible. There are several places to find templates for doing this process. There are lots of online companies and individuals that offer metal templates that bolt in location of the control arm and give you pilot holes to start drilling the new mounting holes. You can also search online to find paper templates that can be printed off and taped on the shock tower. I personally suggest getting a metal template they're often very cheap and it takes away the guess work.

Now let's talk about what this process is actually doing. Firstly, the centre of gravity is lowered, since you are lowering the upper control arm by 1" the lower spring perch is also being lowered by 1" and thus your front end is being lowered by roughly 1". Considering that almost 1/3 of the vehicles weight rests purely in the engine bay then this is going to effectively lower the centre of gravity make the car more stable, especially around turns.




Secondly, reducing body roll, anyone who has driven an older car has experienced body roll and often time it's enough to slide you across the seat, (if you have a bench seat that is), now some of this on the mustangs was caused by their unibody constructions where the body also acts as the frame, this design usually allows more twist and flex than your normal body on frame construction. Now by lowering the control arms your reducing the amount of leverage the upper control arms have on the shock towers which reduces the flex of the body lessening the amount of body roll.

Lastly, and most importantly, the improved camber curve. For those not in the know, camber is the inward or outward tilt of the top of the tire when looking at the face of the wheel. Moving the top of the tire in towards the car is called negative camber and moving it outward away from the car is called positive camber. The more negative camber the more tire that is actually making contact with the road. In a similar fashion during normal suspension travel a vehicle can have the top of the tire move either away from the car, (positive camber curve), or towards the car (negative camber curve). Stock the mustangs and their likewise based suspension brethren have a positive camber curve. So, when you hit a bump or the suspension moves upward the control arms actually moves the tire outwards reducing negative camber and causing less contact with the road, reducing handling. After doing the drop the camber curve has changed now the upper control arm brings the tire inward increasing negative camber keeping more tire on the road and increasing handling. Another added benefit of the drop is the flattening of the arc for the camber curve changing the camber less throughout the suspension travel keeping it closer to the specification it was aligned to.

Word to the wise, while this modification does have many positives one should be aware that it also has some pitfalls. Biggest one being that by lowering the control arm you change the angle that the ball joint normally sits at, this usually isn't too much of an issue but during hard turning it is possible to "bottom out" the travel of the joint and breaking the stud is possible. It should also be noted that the control arm now runs a higher risk of making contact with the bump stop for the front suspension. It seems counter intuitive that lowering the control arms would make it move closer to the bump stop but it's all due to the angle the upper control arm sits at under new "normal operation". In this figure the black and red represent how the control arm normally sits and where it moves to under normal travel black being static and red being the top of travel. While red and blue represent the control arm after the drop with red being static and blue being the top of travel. This change should be understood when performing this modification as it could potentially cause issues.

You may be asking yourself does this change my alignment? Yes, it most definitely does. There are new specifications suggested when doing this swap.



As a step further from the Shelby drop on the 64-66, you can now also buy a negative camber wedge kit, basically a way to centre the ball joint again. A kit is now available that is designed to re-centre the ball joint when the control arm is lowered and negative camber is increased. Requires drilling to relocate upper arm, front suspension disassembly and realignment to supplied specs. Increasing negative camber is one of the best modifications you can do to improve the handling of your Mustang or to enhance the effectiveness of any other suspension or anti-sway bar addition

Shelby American has provided a throwback to its heritage by announcing the return of the GT500KR, one of the most powerful Ford Mustang packages available.


Available for MY20, MY21 and MY22 Shelby GT500s, the GT500KR package increases the 5.2-litre V8's output from 760 horsepower (565kW) to in excess of 900 horsepower (670kW) with the help of a 3.8-litre supercharger.

The King of the Road upgrades are more than just an extra dollop of power, the GT500's Magnaride suspension tweaked to work better with new adjustable springs and sway bars at the front and rear.

While the base GT500 looks anything but discreet, going for a GT500KR takes it up a notch with new one-piece, 6061-T6 forged aluminium wheels (20-inch x 11.0-inch front and 20-inch x 11.5-inch rear) on all four corners, coupling with a carbonfibre bonnet, front splitter and rear diffuser to make its stance even more aggressive.

Despite the GT500KR featuring an impressive level of equipment, Shelby offers a range of optional features for buyers to further exhance their car, ranging from Le Mans style 'over the top' stripes, painted stripes, a polished supercharger, rear seat delete with harness bar and its Shelby Wide Body kit.

Special 60th anniversary badges are available for MY22 models as a no-cost option, honouring the 1962 formation of Shelby American that ultimately led to the first GT500KR

# Ford Mustang Mach-E Headed To Australia Amid Regiona EV Pivot

With the launch of new products including the Ford F-150 and the discontinuation of others like the Ford Focus and Fiesta ST, Ford Australia is in the midst of quite a few changes in terms of its lineup. However, those changes include a big electrification push, with five new models of that type set to launch in Australia by 2024, a list that already includes the Ford Escape PHEV and the Ford E-Transit and E-Transit Custom. However, FoMoCo filed to trademark Ford Mustang Mach-E in Australia earlier this year, and earlier this month, announced that the EV crossover in New Zealand next year. Now, the Ford Mustang Mach-E is headed to Australia as well, according to CarExpert.

The Ford Mustang Mach-E will be Australia's very first Blue Oval EV, where it will compete with the Tesla Model Y and a handful of other all-electric crossovers already on sale there including the Hyundai Ioniq 5, Kia EV6, and the forthcoming Subaru Solterra and Toyota bZ4x. It will also join the aforementioned models in the automaker's newly electrified Aussie lineup as well, which are set to launch over the course of the next two years, and makes a ton of sense given the fact that a right-hand drive version of the Mach-E is already on sale in the UK and Ireland.

Ford has not announced what variants of the Mach-E will be available in Australia, though UK customers can choose from rear- and all-wheel drive configurations with the standard and extended range batteries, as well as the high-performance GT.

The biggest issue that prospective Australian Mach-E buyers figure to face is availability, as Ford continues to work to ramp up production of its EV crossover. FoMoCo is currently producing around 2,000 Mach-Es per week at the Cuautitlan Assembly plant in Mexico with plans to double that early next year, though that doesn't include how many it's building in China, where the Australian version will likely be sourced.
