





Then we were all on our way to our destination at the Beach Motel in Hervey Bay. Once we had settled in to our rooms, we met up poolside to chat about our drive and the plans for the weekend. There was only one pony on the drive which refused to continue, but with assistance from our president and a tow truck she was up and running again once in Hervey Bay. Two more ponies from Brisbane had arrived in Hervey Bay the day before. Three more ponies met us in Hervey Bay later in the day and then 2 more ponies from Rockhampton met us in Hervey Bay. One club member from Bundaberg arrived to participate in the car show on Saturday, so a total of nineteen Mustangs and for the event which is fantastic.

It was great that some of the north Queenslanders were able to join us also. Friday night, Sue arranged for a courtesy bus to pick us up and take us to the Hervey Bay Golf club where most of us took advantage of the complimentary bottle of wine with our meal orders which resulted in plenty of fluid conversation.

Saturday morning, we prepared our Mustangs for a Show and Shine event. Ed, our President will give more information about this event in a separate report. Many of the ladies went for some retail therapy in the morning and were very happy with their purchases. Some of the members went to lunch at the Burrum Heads Bowls club after the show n shine. The afternoon activities included walks on the beautiful beach and sightseeing. Sue arranged for a return trip on the shuttle bus Saturday night once again, and we enjoyed the seafood platters on offer at the Hervey Bay Boat Club for dinner.

Sunday morning consisted of sampling goodies from the authentic Italian cafe, including the best gelato and Italian cakes outside of Italy. Some chose to walk off the sweet delights along the Esplanade as the weather was perfect. Even though Humpback whales live all over the world, Hervey Bay is well known as the ultimate humpback whale play ground. The humpback whales are a species of baleen whale. They are majestic creatures and they swam up close to our catamaran where we watched them frolic in the calm, clear water. We witnessed Mother's (Cows) with their young calves being chaperoned by other whales and occasionally the Dad's (Bull's) would check out what Mum and baby were doing. Female whales are much larger than male whales but they are very graceful swimming despite their size. We witnessed whales breaching, diving with their tails following and lying on their back's waving their enormous fins. Their fins have bumps on them, called tubercles. These tubercles allow the very large whales to execute tight turns underwater and swim efficiently. The tubercles on the flippers help to maintain lift, preventing stall, and decreasing the drag coefficient during turning manoeuvres. The whales certainly lived up to their reputation as being the gentle giant's of the sea and we were in awe of these amazing mammals. Everyone had a great afternoon. Our return trip to the wharf was topped off with a stunning sunset over Hervey Bay. Upon our return, we quickly spruced up ready for dinner and were once again picked up by courtesy bus and taken to the Beach House Hotel. Seafood was the favourite of the night yet again and we sang Happy Birthday with birthday cake, to Monique (age not revealed) and Marice & amp; Ray's grand-daughter Olivia (age 8). Monday morning we all headed home after a very enjoyable weekend with new friendships being made. Dark Horse



The new Mustang will receive a more powerful 'Dark Horse' late next year. Ford has given the Dark Horse a more aggress the bonnet.

Ford says the Mustang Dark Horse is the "most exhilarating spoke on the Dark Horse variant, saying it's "a track-capable neering in the hands of everyday customers who still want to



The V8 is the same naturally-aspirated Coyote unit found in the regular Mustang, although Ford claims it delivers 373kW (power figures for the regular car haven't been revealed yet). To help achieve the extra power, the engine features tuned piston connecting rods, dual throttle-body intake designs, a lighter radiator and more powerful cooling fans.

Performance tweaks aren't limited to the engine, however, with Brembo brakes taken from the Ford Performance package included as standard (cooled by extra NACA ducts) and a strut tower brace and K-brace to tighten the steering response. Like the standard Mustang, the Dark Horse receives MagneRide shocks and Pirelli P-Zero tyres.

A choice of gearboxes are available for the Dark Horse model: a six-speed manual transmission utilising a unique oil cooler, or a ten-speed automatic transmission which can be operated by the column-mounted paddle shifters.

There are plenty of exterior differences to mark out the regular Mustang from this track-focused model. The LED headlights are darkened and the grille has a gloss black finish with trapezoidal shaped 'nostrils' either side. There's also a larger lip spoiler at the front, along with lower side skirts and optional carbon-fibre wheels. A fixed rear wing, more aggressive diffuser and darker quad-exhaust tips complete the dramatic look.

Inside we see the same technological overhaul as the regular Mustang with a 12.4-inch digital instrument cluster and a 13.2-inch central screen. The steering wheel is a thicker, flat-bottom steering wheel covered in suede and stitched in blue. There's also blue stitching on the door panels, seats, gear shift gaiter and centre console.

There are even more performance-focused versions of the Mustang on their way in the shape of the Dark Horse S and Dark Horse R. Ford says the S is designed for track day enthusiasts while the R is a specially-developed racing car.

The seventh-generation Ford Mustang is here and with it comes a whole family of pony cars. Aside from the coupe and convertible, EcoBoost and GT, there's a new-for-2024 Dark Horse that elevates performance with a projected 500 horsepower. It also has a bespoke six-speed manual, NACA ducts, beefy Brembo brakes, and improved cooling. The road car is joined by two derivatives that do away with the license plate: Dark Horse S and Dark Horse R.

The Ford Mustang Dark Horse S is essentially a stripped-down version of the street-legal version and we're being told it has been conceived for the "weekend track day enthusiast." To shave off unnecessary weight, the Blue Oval yanks out all the non-essential parts and trim pieces before adding a safety cage (FIA certified), race seats and steering wheel, along with safety nets and a fire suppression system.

The 2024 Mustang in Dark Horse S guise is further modified by featuring a central panel incorporating the knobs and switches for the headlights, wipers, turn signals, rain light, and mirror adjustment. Ford also throws in a pit speed limiter and an optional front passenger seat. A data and acquisition display system is also part of the package while the exterior gains hood pins, adjustable rear wing, front and rear tow hooks, and an upgraded exhaust. Ford will install the same wheels you'll find on the road-legal Dark Horse, but with chunkier brakes for additional stopping power. In addition, the S gets Multimatic DSSV dampers and the ability to adjust vehicle height and camber settings.

Pictured is the Mustang Dark Horse R, and Ford family which has all the goodies of the S but comes with Ford Performance Parts wheels, a fuel cell for better range, and bespoke seam welding. In addition, the R has special serialization tailored to race cars as it's intended for actual racing whereas the S is more along the lines of a weekend track toy.

No fewer than six racing Mustangs are in the pipeline for the S650 generation, including GT3 and GT4 derivatives as well as versions intended for NAS-CAR and NHRA Factory X. We'll see the new generation in GT3 flavour at the prestigious Le Mans endurance race in 2024 on the Circuit de la Sarthe.

2024 - S650 MUSTANG- More then just a new look.

The 2024 S650 Ford Mustang is far more than a nip-tuck to the sheetmetal. And even more than just engine updates. In fact, after a conversation with S650 Mustang chief engineer Ed Krenz, it appears that just about everything on the new car was touched up, with the most noticeable change to the driving experience happening right in the hands of its operator.

"The most impactful thing is the steering and handling of the seventh generation. It's night and day compared to the current model." Krenz stated. "The current model balances things like noise and vibration, steering precision, and other factors. For S650, we really wanted to eliminate any compromises from a steering perspective."

"Starting with the steering wheel, your touch point for the steering system. Obviously, a flat bottom steering wheel, but also a bigger circumference rim. Actually, it's the biggest that we've done, even compared to Shelby products. Talking about the section (not the wheel itself). And we increase that as we go up the performance pyramid. In this case, we just went to the base car with the biggest section of a steering wheel we've done, and it's just about how it fits in your hands and maximizes grip and comfort."

Of course, the steering wheel wasn't the only aspect of the S650 Ford Mustang steering that was modified when it came to delivering improved sensations and control to the the driver.

"Then you walk down the steering column, and the current model has a joint in there that's there for vibration. We removed that from the S650 product. Then we increased the steering gear ratio as well as upgraded the overall steering rack capacity. So it makes a much quicker, nimble feeling car to drive."

Krenz explained.

Going along with the steering improvements, the S650 Mustang handling has also received significant upgrades over the current model. The chassis of the car is also stiffer, and features a reworked suspension system, as well. The Pirelli P Zero tires on the new Mustang GT are consistent with the outgoing model, however.

"In terms of suspension, the MagneRide dampers now have the next-generation control system that we've evolved with some learnings from Raptor programs," said Krenz. "The base car has a new supplier of monotube shocks... The breaking system; we migrated to electronic brake boost ... so you can tune the brake pedal response, and there was a lot of effort into getting what a standard Ford electronic brake pedal feel might be on something like an Explorer and bringing that into what we think a performance car or sports car needs to feel like."

"We also went to electronic park brake from mechanical park brake for this product, again by wire. That enabled us to do a couple of cool things, including the ultimate evolution of the Drift Brake. Which is, sort of, next-level unexpected." A reference to Vaughn Gittin Jr.

Ford is making more than 5,000 curated Ford and Lincoln photographs and product brochures from the first century of the company's history available to the public online for the first time – and will continue to grow the site as new items are added.

The searchable collection – at https://fordheritagevault.com – spans Ford's production history from the company's founding in 1903 to its centennial in 2003 Historical assets are available to Ford enthusiasts as free downloads for personal use from the American-based auto industry's most comprehensive online database, which will continue to be updated and expanded.

Dearborn, Mich. June 16, 2022 – Today, on its 119th anniversary, Ford Motor Company is making a century of its archival material available to the public through a new online database called the Ford Heritage Vault.

Ford created the Heritage Vault (https://fordheritagevault.com) for fans, journalists and car enthusiasts, making it easy to discover the company's rich heritage from anywhere in the world. The searchable artifacts are downloadable for personal use, free of charge, for the first time as part of the American auto industry's most comprehensive online database.

The Ford Heritage Vault contains more than 5,000 curated photographs and product brochures from Ford and Lincoln vehicles, spanning from the company's founding in 1903 to its centennial in 2003. Ford will grow the Heritage Vault over time, drawing from its archives. "We're opening up in a way we've never done before," said Ted Ryan, Ford archive and heritage brand manager. "Our archives were established 70 years ago, and for the first time, we're opening the vault for the public to see. This is just a first step for all that will come in the future."

The materials available in the online collection today were carefully curated over the past two years by Ford's archives team. Many of the high-resolution images showcase the design and functionality of Ford and Lincoln vehicles. Others are memorable images that bring Ford's heritage to life for fans and car enthusiasts, while also educating newcomers to the Blue Oval.

One set of brochures serves as a time capsule for the 1970s and '80s. The series was created to market specific vehicle design packages to younger consumers and shows beach outings, racing and skydiving, accentuated with vivid oranges, browns and yellows.

"Complementing all of the vehicle photos available in the Ford Heritage Vault, brochures like these add so much more information and impact for people who want to learn about our products, heritage and accessories," said Ciera Casteel, processing archivist, who prepared materials for the Heritage Vault.

Taking a trip down memory lane

Ford worked with graduate students from Wayne State University's library and information science program in Detroit, as well as Ford employees and retirees, to pilot the Heritage Vault in advance of its launch.

The collection appealed to both casual browsers and dedicated automotive enthusiasts, who reported a better appreciation for Ford and its heritage after using the site. A Ford employee even remarked that seeing the old photos brought tears to his eyes.

Ford Bronco and Ford F-Series were common search items among testers. Meteor, Fairlane, Galaxie, Model A and Edsel were also popular, with one user finding the Tempo models their mother and grandmother owned in the 1980s and '90s.

Opening Ford's heritage to all


Ford Heritage Vault has been created with accessibility features that translate photos, charts and graphs and other pre-digital assets for compatibility with assistive technology now used by blind and visually impaired site visitors, such as screen readers, to interpret websites. Heritage Vault users can request remediated versions of additional brochures as needed.

"These assets were born analog, and we have worked hard to bring them to the digital world," said Casteel, who led the effort to make the assets accessible. "But digitizing isn't enough. It was important to us that the Heritage Vault is accessible for everyone to enjoy."

MAGAZINE:

Stuart Brown (SB) advised the Club Magazine would be published on 1 December and to keep an eye on the members Facebook page and Website for updated Event Calendars. If anyone has anything they want to be published in the magazine they should submit it to him. Paul Halliday (Doc) advised he would submit further Trivia questions and asked that the answers be printed on a different page to the questions. Currently 75 members/sponsors receive hard copy magazines but we have to post 100 to be afforded the discounted postage rate. Historic 1965 Ford Mustang Shelby GT350R sold for record \$4 million

A one-of-a kind 1965 Ford Mustang Shelby GT350R was sold at the Mecum Auctions Kissimmee, Florida, event for \$4,070,000.

It was the highest price ever paid for a Mustang and \$220,000 more than what the same car auctioned for in 2020.

The car, serial number 5R002, was built as a prototype for the GT350R competition model, of which 34 were later built. It was tested by Ken Miles of "Ford v Ferrari" fame, who also raced it along with famed drivers Bob Bondurant, Peter Brock, Jerry Titus and Chuck Cantwell.

The GT350R was designed with a modified version of the Mustang's 289 cubic-inch V8 that puts out over 350 hp, an oversized 34-gallon racing fuel tank, and various suspension and drivetrain updates.

The now fully restored car went on to win 10 races in the SCCA Production-B class before being sold in 1966 to a Ford engineer for \$4,000, who later installed an experimental Ford GT40 racing V8 that was included in the sale.

The Shelby has now been twice sold for more than the second-most valuable Mustang, which is the 1968 GT 390 from the Steve McQueen film "Bullitt" that was sold at the 2020 edition of Mecum's Kissimmee event for \$3.74 million. (Source fox news)

Queensland SIVs Guidelines

As a part of the Mustang Owners Club of Qld, many members avail of 'club registration' As part of this you agree to the Qld Transport terms and conditions for the registration and operation of a Special Interest Vehicle. Operating outside the approved usage may very well mean that you are uninsured and liable in the event of an accident.

CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS; A special interest vehicle must not be used for: General purposes - for example, to commute to and from the registered operators place of employment, running down to the shops, and other forms of everyday vehicle use. For hire or reward - a fee cannot be charged for use of the vehicle, and the owner cannot receive any consideration or reward for supplying the vehicle.
You and anyone driving your special interest vehicle must only use the vehicle for:
☐ participating in rallies or events, including impromptu events organised by an incorporated vehicle club or events sanctioned by the Australia Street Rod Federation (ASRF).
□ a rally is a social event where a parade of special interest vehicles travel together for competition or to meet at an agreed location. Rallies and events must be listed in the incorporated club newsletter or on the incorporated club's website or social media page (or in another manner approved by the club or ASRF, such as the club calendar of events) prior to the event.
an impromptu event is an event that has been initiated by a club member, involves one or more vehicles, and must comply with the following elements:
☐ involves an invitation to wider club members to attend the event; and is either ☐ endorsed in advance of the event by the relevant club or ASRF committee; or, ☐ where it exists, complies with published club guidelines as to what is a valid event; and
□ is listed wither in the newsletter, on the website, or social media page (or in another mannel approved by the club or ASRF, such as the club calendar of events) prior to the event. Note: Incorporated vehicle clubs should maintain a register of endorsed impromptu events. This register should contain information on the impromptu event.
□ participating in processions for which a Special Events Permit has been issued under the Transport Operations (Road Use Management –Accreditation and Other Provisions) Regulation 2015
exhibiting the vehicle in displays, fetes or similar functions conducted for religious, charitable or educational purposes ceremonial purposes (such as weddings, formals, funerals) involving immediate and de facto family members, or as part of a sanctioned incorporated club event, provided this is not done for fee or reward. Immediate and de facto family means parents, grandparents, sons, daughters, grandchildren, adopted children and adopted grandchildren, but not extended family members such as aunts, uncles, nephews and nieces
□ preparing for, proceeding to, and returning from the above activities
☐ direct travel to and from an approved inspection station to get a safety certificate or cer- tificate of inspection before offering the vehicle for sale travel in order to have the vehicle repaired. There is no distance restriction, however, such travel must be reasonable and justifi- able by the vehicle operator road testing within a 15km radius from the place where the vehi- cle is garaged or is being repaired. The purpose of the travel must be to road test the vehicle

following repair or restoration, or for general vehicle maintenance and not for any other purpose. This does not include use as an everyday means of transport. A passenger may travel in your vehicle to assist with road testing—only if your vehicle can legally carry passengers.

Some Points Relating to SIVs

Club Membership is MANDATORY

There is now a legal requirement to maintain membership of at least one club to have SIVs registration or use a SIVs registered vehicle. Penalties now apply and the SIVS REGISTRATION MUST BE SURRENDERED if membership lapses.

The obligation is on owners, NOT clubs to ensure continuing membership. Clubs are not asked to retain dating certificates, only the owner.

SIVs REGISTRATION is covered by two websites;

Dear Recreational Motor Vehicle and Safety Group member

I am writing with regard to the Special Interest Vehicle Concession Scheme (SIV) road test radius.

As you may be aware, in 2021, the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) reviewed the SIV road test radius following the tabling of the Transport and Public Works Committee report, Inquiry into Motor Recreational Activities. At that time, it was determined that the road test radius of 15-kilometres remained appropriate.

Since this time, further representations relating to this matter have been made to TMR. Upon considering the additional information provided, a further review of the 15-kilometre road test radius has been undertaken. As a result, I am pleased to advise that that the current 15-kilometre road test radius has been expanded to 30-kilometres for all vehicles operating under the SIV scheme.

The TMR website, including the SIV Guide, has been updated to reflect this change.

I trust this information is of assistance.

2023 Ford Mustang GT Supercar Officially debuts at Bathust



When the redesigned, seventh-generation 2024 Ford Mustang debuted several weeks ago, The Blue Oval simultaneously revealed that the new pony car would be the vanguard for a renewed push into motorsports, including Le will be a while before the new model starts professionally racing in other series, but there is one series that will host the all-new Mustang in short time, becoming the first of its kind to feature any seventh-generation Mustang on the track. To that end, the 2023 Ford Mustang GT "Gen3" Supercar been officially revealed at Mount Panorama ahead of the Bathurst 1000, and it will compete in the 2023 Australian Supercars Championship.

This is the first time a seventh-generation Mustang has debuted in racing form, since previous images were computer generated. As for the 2023 Ford Mustang GT Supercar, The Blue Oval's homologation team, Dick Johnson Racing, constructed the vehicle, in collaboration with Ford Performance. The GT will start racing in next year's Supercars series. As a Gen3 product, it hews closely to its street-oriented counterpart, and utilizes a production-based Ford 5.0L V8 Coyote engine, although displacement has increased to 5.4L for this specific application.

Ford hasn't finalized its output yet, but says it will boast over 600 horsepower and 650 newton-meter (479 pound-feet) of torque, while weighing in at about 1,200 kilograms (2,645 pounds).


The 2023 Ford Mustang GT Supercar will be utilized by other Ford-supported teams too, including Tickford Racing, Grove Racing, Blanchard Racing Team, and Walkinshaw Andretti United, in addition to Dick Johnson Racing.

"Mustang has been an iconic brand on and off the track for 58 years and its legend will continue around the world," said Mark Rushbrook, global director of Ford Performance Motorsports. "We always say Mustang was born to race, and that is more true today than ever. The Mustang GT Supercar is ready to race in 2023."

The 2023 Ford Mustang GT Supercar represents the first motorsports offensive for the seventh-generation pony car, which is slated to race in GT3, GT4, Nascar, and NHRA series in the future. As Ford Authority previously reported, the renewed push will not involve electrification at this point in time.





Electronic publication of the audited financial report

The examination of the controls over the electronic presentation of audited financial report on the internet is beyond the scope of the audit of the financial report.

Audit report qualification - Basis for qualified opinion

Receipts from cash donations and other cash fundraising activities are a significant source of revenue for *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* The *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of donations and other fundraising activity revenue prior to entry in its financial records. Accordingly, as the evidence available to us about revenue from these sources was limited, our audit procedures for donations and other fundraising activity revenue had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion on whether cash donations and other cash fundraising activity revenue obtained by the *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* are complete.

Qualified opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* presents fairly in all material respects in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the financial position of the *Mustang Owners Club of Australia Inc.* at 30 June 2022 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended.

Basis of accounting

Without modifying our opinion, we draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling Committee reporting responsibilities. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.




