

A very fair system. It was also decided unlike SA who put up members to the AGM once they have passed the criteria, These members are voted on at the AGM meeting to receive the award.

We decided we would allow members to put up other members via email or forms placed around. These should go to the Secretary and be brought before the committee at the next meeting. The members in question would then be checked out to see if they passed the criteria.

They would then be asked for suitability after which they would be awarded Life Membership at our Concours Dinner.

It was also decided that more than one member can be awarded Life Membership on the night.

All members that placed someone up for any awards including City and Country Members of the Year should be replied to with reasons why members were not awarded to alleviate further problems we have en-counted some months ago.

Has been a continuous paid up member for 23 Years Passes initial criteria, onto to point system example below.


- Has been Vice President for 14 Years



If travelling from the city down Batman Ave you will need to turn left at the traffic lights (red lines with arrow) into the Tennis Centre Access Rd. do a U turn at the lights when safe then return to the traffic lights and turn right onto Batman Ave and then immediate left into the driveway as indicated by the yellow arrow, which will be manned by a marshal. From there you will be marshalled to the staging point marked X where you will be escorted to the designated parking area.



Please note this is a "lock in" event. No vehicle will be permitted access after 10am and no vehicle can leave the site until 2pm or after.

We recommend that you arrive early to avoid disappointment. Once the site is full there are no further options to park.

SITE RULES

All vehicles

- must be road registered
- must be escorted by a marshal
- ٠ to stop and when its safe to continue
- have hazard lights flashing, where fitted, whilst moving
- not travel more than walking pace (5km/hr)
- park where allocated
- place MOCA Vic supplied drip tray under the engine bay.

No pegging of any item into any surface of site. Nothing to be attached to any City of Melbourne asset including trees, park benches, light poles etc. Any banners will have to be erected using owners free standing frames. Only MOCA Vic pre approved Ezy Up Gazebo's can be erected throughout the site. All structures must be 4.5m away from trees, vegetation and garden beds. Site must be kept clean and tidy at all times.

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




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Australia Day 2019

a guick visit to Dick Beckett's Mack Truck Museum.


Southern Cross News arrived soon after to investigate the sudden invasion of Tasmania by a fleet of Mustangs. There

My family had the joy of accompanying our club for a long weekend trip to Tasmania in the last weekend of February.

It was a rare opportunity to savour the delights of wonderful people, lovely cars and all the magic that

Tasmania has to offer, but I suspect that the bulk discount we were all offered also had something to do with it. With around 90 Victorian club members and 38 cars departing on the Spirit meeting a like number of Tasmanian representatives, there was a considerable amount of camaraderie, magic cars and experiences to savour.

With weather in the glorious high twenties/low thirties and the unmatched freshness of Tasmanian food and hospitality on offer, this trip had all the hallmarks of a memorable experience and so it proved to be.

However, although great swathes of the island were dry, that did not detract from the innate beauty of the landscape and vistas on offer. With some insider trading from the knowledge gleaned from the Tasmanian members, we were accorded some of the finest driving roads, unique private collections and food experiences the island had to offer.

We essentially drove a North-South central inland route over four days and first up after we departed Devonport on Friday after a somewhat rocky ferry ride across the Straight, we had a local member open their 50's themed café for breakfast just for us in Deloraine.

Thanks goes to Karl Mansfield for opening his diner for us. After a hearty meal, we visited Mining and Civil Contractor Dick Beckett's collection of the largest restored Mack trucks and earth moving equipment surely in the Southern Hemisphere at Exeter. Why does he collect trucks and earth moving equipment you may ask? Because he can, and what struck me was his humbleness and gracious hospitality, no doubt part of being a recipient of that Tasmanian hard-wired hospitality. From there, it was up to Beauty Point at the Northern most part of the Tamar Valley lunching at the family owned Riviera Hotel overlooking the Tamar River. With sweeping river views, a posse of Mustangs and superb food and service, make a note to add this to your bucket list, even if you aren't lucky enough to catch a herd of ponies.

Launceston beckoned for a BBQ dinner at the Tasmanian Northern members Van Diemen's club rooms on the outskirts of town and conversation soon turned to valve timing, camshaft overlap and diff ratios, but also super tax implications during the transition to retirement phase, pre-60 tax implications and the workings of the super guarantee charge. I could not escape the gravitational pull of some club members





being ex local and state government defined benefit recipients and stories abounded of how they have set themselves up to enjoy life. The mantra they preached was 'work hard and reward yourself harder.' A mantra that should be fully subscribed to.

Next day Saturday, it was a trip to the National Automotive Museum in Launceston and the theme was 'Australian Made.' One car that got everyone's attention was the actual Monaro that was left precariously dangling off the Tasman bridge after the bulk carrier, the Lake Illawarra plied into a structural support pylon bringing down a





section of the span which collapsed into the Derwent river in 1975. The car's story board said the owner of the car wanted a manual but could only get an auto and the larger transmission tunnel actually balanced the car at the

precipice at the road's edge of the fallen span which prevented the vehicle from falling into the Derwent unlike four other cars which killed four people. The Monaro owner should have taken out a tatts ticket on that night.

As an alternative to the museum, there was the option of a Farmers Market near the museum as well which gave everyone a pleasant choice.

Late morning saw us driving thirty minutes south to Symmons Plains Raceway, the 2.41 km long track being Tasmania's premier motor sport park. A big thank you to Neil and De for allowing my son to ride in their stunning red '66 vert from Launceston to Symmons Plains.





On arrival at the circuit, after a

short greeting, introduction and signing of indemnity forms from the raceway organisers (just how seriously were some members taking this?), we all had the opportunity to do laps of the circuit which we shared with the MG car club.

It dawned on me that we were privileged with activities mere mortals would not have access to and it was somewhat humbling but I was overwhelmed with the fact this was only the second day of a four day trip and there was a lot more to squeeze in. A lot more came in rapid succession.

Now at this point, I must confess I didn't take the Mach 1 over and rented a vehicle, the club members all know the reason why and I got a fair justified ribbing as a result. But Russell kindly took me around the circuit in his lovely black '69 vert and then Karen arranged to have Fredy and Cristina allow me to drive my wife and son in their new '18 'Stang from the circuit.

I am still overawed by the experience and cannot thank



them both enough for their kind gesture. Thank you Fredy and Cristina, the experience left an impression, mainly on me and my son but my wife is coming around. Nothing like a bit of peer group pressure to help things along.

We then drove one of the great roads in Oz, pencil in the Poatina Road (B51), then joining the Lakes Highway (A5) via Bothwell to join the Midland Highway to Hobart

Achingly beautiful winding roads over picturesque mountains, valleys and lovely towns with old world charm. With an armada of Mustangs doing the ultimate road trip. Hard to remain inconspicuous under such circumstances so much so that Channel Seven

caught up with us and interviewed lan and several club members as a feature for their evening news bulletin earlier.

We had a lovely dinner at The Duke near our hotel in Hobart and Ian gave us a wonderful and amusing talk appropriately thanking our Tasmanian hosts and all those who organised the trip. We also celebrated a member's birthday and two anniversary's a day apart at 28 and 29 years. Forgive me if I got those years wrong!!

Sunday morning in Hobart saw us drive to another local member's bean roasting business, Tas Caffe which was opened for us by local member Rachael Sansom which supplies over 120 cafes in Hobart with the best coffee beans the world has to offer.





Upon further enquiry as to where Rachael sources her coffee beans from, she said their company follows the equatorial summer so their beans are sourced from all the countries that roughly follow the equatorial seasons. Fascinating. For a gold coin donation, she made some of the best flat whites I have had the privilege to savour as I do love a good coffee, the irony being I have paid more in Melbourne for lesser coffees.







From there we visited the Puddleduck vineyard for lunch which overlooks a lake brimming with ducks and swans appropriately enough. Well worth a visit.

A free afternoon saw several of us head to MONA to satiate our artistic bent and wonder at the semi subterranean accomplishment of the museum building itself. My failing eyesight was the butt of jokes along the lines of thinking a certain part of the female anatomy was a pair of joggers.... and members let me drive their cars!!

On our last day, Monday we contrasted our artistic inner selves with a drive to Baskerville Raceway (surprise, surprise) heading out North of Hobart. Now, Frank and Lisa must be singled out for kindly allowing us, that is my family drive their super '67 vert from Hobart to Baskerville. If I may, I wish to credit Frank for building a stonking free breathing 302 that is a credit to his engineering skills. Again, privileged and grateful for your kindness Frank and Lisa.

The owners of Baskerville kindly gave us a history lesson which included the fact that it was Australia's oldest licensed raceway having first opened in 1958. But we all know that Bathurst claims to be the country's oldest operating raceway having first opened in 1938 don't we.

Leaving club members and the track owners to sort out which track laid claim to that distinction, more indemnity forms were signed and by now, I was wise to what that meant. Now, at this point, I must thank lan, our marvellous President as well because in another insane gesture of comradery or pity, he allowed me to drive his car around the track. Think of the potential implications. Here I am in the President's own car, a convertible no less, an unfamiliar vehicle with my young son in a car with no roof on a tight motor racing circuit. What could possibly go wrong ?

Well, nothing actually. Visions of bending the President's car and going down in club folklore for all the wrong reasons or worse flashed across my mind. However, I was happy just to parade around and savour the experience. Fact is, my son and I could just have happily sat in the car and enjoyed nothing more than doing so. The fact more so was granted means I am deeply grateful to lan for his very kind gesture. If ever you need confirmation that our club is brimming with wonderful people, all these spontaneous gestures of kindness says it all really. The afternoon (yes, there's more) was spent at Ross where we had some wonderful bakery delights and at Ashgrove's Farm, where we sampled yet again quality Tasmanian cheese, butter, ice-cream, yoghurt using only farm fresh milk. But we were now running late because there were so many road work sections of highway heading north that all the speed changes from 110 to 60 to 40 kms and back felt like we were in a pinball machine, and the roads were unmade, not fun.

Finally, before we caught the connecting ferry back to Melbourne from Devonport, we stopped off at Chas Kelly's residence, and as he is a kind club supporter, we were granted the opportunity to see his private collection of (very) expensive cars, trucks, racers, bikes, a Bruce Springsteen original guitar, and racing helmets.

Episode 3 – Protecting Exterior Surfaces

In this third episode I'll guide you through detailing your car's bodywork, rims and tyres to create a slick and glossy finish on the rims and paintwork with the tyres having a satin protective layer.

The Tools:

Look at the Tools pic for what you'll use.

Here's a list:

- 1. Rubber gloves to protect your hands
- 2. 1 x Bowden's After Glow
- 3. 1 x Bowden's Lazy Wax Spray
- 4. 1 x Bowden's Fully Slick
- 5. 1 x Bowden's Tyre Sheen
- 6. 1 x Turtle Wax Color Magic Polish(Black for my wheels and Red for the bodywork)
- 2 x Bowden's Drop Bear microfibre cloths for each product you will apply
- 8. 1 x Bowden's Big Blue Softie
- 9. 1 x Bowden's Big Green Sucker microfibre cloth
- 10. 2 x Foam / microfibre applicators for Color Magic
- 11. 1 x Applicator for Tyre Sheen



The Tools

The Tools

Supercheap Auto or Autobarn stock all of the products I mention. If you prefer a different brand then look for items with similar properties.

For applying wax and protection products in particular, the type of microfibre cloth you use is vital.

Choosing and using the correct products in the correct order is important. As our Mustang's are in generally good order, I'll be explaining how to maintain and protect your car's paintwork that is generally clean and in sound condition.

So I'll be adding a shine, a smooth surface and a protective anti-static layer to the paintwork and the rims to protect your work for at least a few months. For paintwork with minor scratches I'll suggest how these can be minimized.

Paint restoration for a car with poor paintwork will be covered in a separate article.

To help you decide what to use, when and how long it will last please check the Product Table shown at the end of this article. Use it to decide what you need to apply and how long to wait for it to cure before applying the next layer of protection you choose.

As you will be touching the paintwork multiple times it's vital you use the correct microfibre cloths, so, pay close attention to what I choose and the reasons for my choices. Do not use cotton towels, old rags, or normal microfibre cloths. These cloths can contain contaminants, can leave fluff on the paintwork and are just too rough to allow them to touch your paintwork. They are also less efficient at applying and wiping off the solutions thereby leaving streaks. Modern dedicated microfibre cloths are the way to go.

Before applying any products make sure your car has been washed and is clean. It should be dry and cool. Only apply the products in a shaded area where there will be minimal wind, heat and dust.

The Technique -Apply protection to the body:

Follow these steps to give your paintwork a glossy look with a smooth, sealed and anti-static finish.

If you have been following along with my first two articles your wheels will be washed and clean as will your bodywork. If you dried it using After Glow it will be protected. If you are happy with the overall look of your car's paintwork – it has a glossy shine that is smooth to the touch, then you are done!

Just make sure you have also applied After Glow to the rims. This will lock in their shine and its anti-static properties will help protect them from accumulating brake dust and general dust as well.

If it's more than 3 months since the last waxing and protection then follow these steps to add shine, smoothness and protection that will last for months.

Applying Lazy Wax

First to apply is Bowden's Lazy Wax. It's a carnauba wax spray so will apply a beautifully warm, deep gloss to your paintwork especially if it is a darker colour. Being a spray it is easily applied and the whole car can be waxed in around 20 minutes.

1. Lightly spray a panel with the wax. Alternatively you can spray it into a microfibre Drop Bear or a Big Blue Softie cloth.



Apply Lazy Wax

 Spread evenly over the surface being waxed. Use straight lines, gently massaging the spray onto the surface. Don't worry if the spray goes onto any glass, plastic or chrome as it does not leave any white residue and will not harm these surfaces.

3. Buff off gently with a dry Drop Bear microfibre cloth until the surface is clear of the wax. Wait for the wax to haze, about 30 seconds, then buff. It does not need to be fully dry. Just spray, spread then buff.



Remove Lazy Wax

4. If you wish to apply a second coat you'll have to wait up to 4 hours, depending on the weather, for the wax to cure. A second coat will add extra wax protection and depth of colour. As my paintwork is in great condition anyway, I only apply one coat of wax. Either way you'll wait for the wax to cure before applying the next layer of protection – Fully Slick.

Applying Fully Slick

Fully Slick will apply a really smooth finish to the surface of the paint with the added benefit of UV protection. So, your paint will be less likely to fade.

1. Apply fully slick by spraying onto a Drop Bear or Big Blue Softie microfibre - the short pile side, then use that to spread it over the panel. Don't worry about it going onto glass, chrome or plastic. Like Lazy Wax, it does not leave any white residue. Here I am spraying it onto the non-plush or short weave side of a Big Softie but a Drop Bear cloth could also be used. The Big Softie is less absorbent than the Drop Bear so more of the spray goes onto the paint rather than being caught in the cloth.



Apply Fully Slick

Spread Fully Slick over the area working in straight lines.
 Once the area is covered there is no need to wait for it to dry, just move to the buffing step.

3. As soon as you have applied Fully Slick remove it by buffing with either a Drop Bear or the plush or longer weave side of a Big Softie. I prefer to use a Drop Bear due to its deeper pile and greater absorbency due to its higher polyamide percentage.

4. The UV protection of Fully Slick increases with further coats. If you are protecting your car for the first time in a while then I would recommend using up to 3 coats. Remember to wait 1 hour between coats of Fully Slick to give each the necessary time to cure. With great paintwork one coat is sufficient. Wait the hour before applying the final layer of protection – After Glow.

Applying After Glow

Apart from being a drying aid, as explained in my second article "Cleaning Bodywork", After Glow will apply a strong antistatic layer of protection that seals the surface and enhances its water shedding, or hydrophobic, properties.

 Use a dampened Big Green Sucker or Big Softie. Either will work well but the Big Green Sucker will absorb more of the After Glow so you'll end up using more of it for this job.
 Spray your cloth with After Glow to cover one side with about 6 to 8 sprays.

2. Now place your cloth on the panel and slowly pull it down the surface. This will leave a slight mist on the panel. Once the panel has had the After Glow applied wait for a slight haze to appear then remove. This will be about 30 seconds. Don't leave it on too long otherwise it can be more difficult to buff off.

3. Next, give the surface a buff with a Drop Bear. This lifts off any haze and leaves a protective beautiful, glossy shine. If you notice smears on the paintwork then buff again or it means the cloth is not totally dry. Time to use another Drop Bear that is completely dry.



Buff away the After Glow

If your car has not had this treatment for a about three months its worth applying a second coat of After Glow.

Once you've applied and buffed away the first coat, wait 15 minutes for it to cure then apply and buff away a second coat for a maximum seal and anti-static protection. These two coats will protect the underlying wax for up to three months, as After Glow is a synthetic product that provides longer protection to the other organic Lazy Wax layers we've applied.

The Technique – Protecting the rims and tyres:

It's time to apply protection to the rims and tyres.

We want the rims to shine and have great anti-static properties to help prevent them from accumulating brake and general dust as well. As a bonus here I'll explain how to minimize any light scratches on the rims before we apply the protective coatings.

 Use a damp foam or microfibre applicator pad to apply Turtle Wax Colour Magic. Here I am using Black. (Thanks John Pipan for this tip). This product has a colour embedded within the wax and it is this colour that deposits into minor scratches and blends them into the colour of the rim. In my case the black wax will blend small scratches into the black rim.

2. With the damp applicator holding the Jet Black wax, work your way around the spokes and surfaces of the rim. Gently work the wax in using a small circular action to embed the coloured carnauba wax into any small scratches. Allow the wax to dry to a haze. Depending upon the weather this may take a few minutes. I generally apply the wax to one rim and let it dry whilst applying it to a second rim. When the second rim is coated I go back to the first rim and buff away the wax using a Drop Bear microfibre.

3. Buff the wax from the rim using a plush Drop Bear microfibre cloth. Compared to a normal microfibre this plush cloth, with its longer more absorbent threads will more easily lift off and hold the dried wax.

With this dried organic wax this buffing may take a little longer to do compared to the other synthetic solutions we used on the main body of the car.

4. This wax dries to a white haze so buffing may leave some visible white streaks or spots as seen in the image above. Don't stress too much. It means one of two things. First, it generally means some of the wax has not fully dried and needs more time to dry completely before it can be removed. Secondly, the buffing cloth contains too much of the removed wax and cannot effectively lift more without leaving streaks. Simply fold your cloth to a new dry section, or get another dry Drop Bear cloth. Continue buffing the rim. We'll come back later to do a final buff to eliminate any missed haze of the wax.

5. Once all rims have been waxed and buffed wait about 30 minutes for any missed wax to haze. You'll want to go over each rim a second time now with a new dry microfibre Drop Bear to do a final buff of any newly dried wax that has appeared. Once you are happy that all wax has been removed its time to let it cure for about 60 minutes before we add some further protection to lock in the shine from the wax.

Applying final protection to the rims

After 60 minutes it's time to apply protection to the rims on top of the cured wax. Just as we applied layers of protection over the Lazy Wax on the body of the car, we'll add Fully Slick and After Glow.

No need here for detailed instructions as the application procedures have been explained earlier in this article. So, just a brief summary of what to do:

Apply Fully Slick

- Spray Fully Slick onto a cloth and spread it around the rim. Do one small section at a time. I like to move in straight lines to minimize scratching. Because of the intricate design of rims you can use the short weave side of a Big Softie. This can help get into tight grooves and between spokes around the rim.
- 2. As soon as you have applied Fully Slick to about a quarter of the rim remove it by buffing with either a Drop Bear or the plush or longer weave side of a Big Softie. I prefer to use a Drop Bear due to its deeper pile and greater absorbency properties.
- 3. Allow one hour for the Fully Slick to cure.

Apply After Glow

- 1. Spray After Glow onto the short pile side of a dampened Big Softie.
- 2. Gently wipe over small sections of the rim. This will leave a slight haze. Leave to dry as you work around the rim.
- 3. It should only take a minute or so to do the entire rim. Next, give the surface a buffing with a Drop Bear or the long pile side of a Big Softie. This will remove any haze leaving a protective, beautiful, glossy shine.


If you notice smears on the rim then your buffing cloth is not dry. Turn to a new section or use another Big Softie or Drop Bear that is completely dry. Done!

Applying final protection to the tyre

We want the tyres to compliment the beautifully clean and shiny rims. However, a totally glossy or wet looking tyre is not always the best way to go. It can be a personal choice but to my way of thinking there are a number of reasons why a black sheen is a better look for a tyre compared to a wet look.

First, glossy rims will look better if they don't have to compete with glossy tyres. How often do you see a wet glossy tyre in real life anyway? Why create an artificial look that won't last after a wash or rain?

Secondly, applying wet glossy sprays or liquid gloss can lead to pooling, and, can lead to areas where the wet gloss drains off leaving streaks and an inconsistent application. This is not what we want.



Pooling and inconsistent gloss / streaks

Thirdly, if the gloss has not totally dried it will flick off the tyre and mark the bodywork and under carriage leading to lengthy removal work.

Finally, think about this. Where do you actually apply the wet look? The outside of the tyre? Why? Don't you want the tyre to look like a new tyre? Well, what about the tread? Or, do you want the outside to look wet but the tread to have its natural sheen, or worse still, a dusty tread. We have to be consistent.



Wet look v Sheen

My approach is to have the tyre look like it has just come from the assembly line. Check tyres in a tyre store. They don't look dripping wet and glossy, but the walls, and the tread, have a consistent, clean and dry sheen. That's what we'll go for here.

Applying Tyre Sheen

Your tyres should be washed, clean and dry. We'll apply some Bowden's Tyre Sheen, or your chosen product – hopefully one with a sheen finish. Bowden's is easy to apply with an applicator as it goes on freely and dries very quickly. It replenishes the rubber with enriching oils to protect and preserve and lasts a long time over many washes. It's cleaning and water resistant properties help keep the tyres cleaner for longer. It removes browning on old tyres that have not been carefully cared for and will not harm any finishes - chrome, metal, paint, or white walls.

Apply Tyre Sheen

 Use an applicator or a Bowden's Muffy sponge. Spray 3 to 4 squirts onto your applicator then run this around the outside wall of the tyre. It will go on very easily. The Muffy has a high pile so will allow the Tyre Sheen to be deposited into the fine and deeper grooves on your tyre. It will look very wet when applied but don't worry, it dries very quickly to a dry, sheen finish.

If I am at a car show then I also apply Tyre Sheen to the tread. Start by reaching under the quarter panel to the opposite side of the tyre – this helps to stop your arm from rubbing onto the wet surface. Starting from the bottom of the tyre work up and around the tread. Keep doing this, moving your hand towards you and the tread closest to the outside of the tyre. Take care to get the Muffy into the deep tread to ensure an even coverage. Cover all of the tread so both it and the wall of the tyre have a clean, dry sheen.

Whitewall worries?

Treat whitewalls very carefully. Here are some quick tips. First, wash them as normal. Spray Orange Agent on the whitewall and work in using a brush or normal microfibre cloth. Rinse off and repeat until you see an improvement. This is the safest for factory or aftermarket whitewalls. There are many things to consider before I mention other approaches but that's for another article.

Once dry, treat with Tyre Sheen to add essential oils and UV protection which helps stop cracking and yellowing. Tyre Sheen will not cause your whitewalls to discolour.

Applying Tyre Sheen

 Cleaning up? Well, if you have applied the Tyre Sheen carefully that is all there is to do. If your Muffy accidentally spreads Tyre Sheen onto the rim, it can be easily removed with a microfibre cloth – slightly damp if you wish. This is one time you can use a normal microfibre cloth, but just wipe very gently.

The Tips – Exterior Cleaning and Protection:

Keep the following tips in mind when applying protection to the bodywork, rims and wheels:

- Always use clean, dry microfibre cloths.
- Change buffing cloth when it becomes moist.
- Do not let products dry too long before buffing.
- Colour Magic helps minimize fine scratches.
- A Muffy pad will easily place Tyre Sheen into both fine and deeper grooves of the tread.
- A Sheen looks more consistent than a wet look on tyres, especially if the tread is done as well.
- Protected bodywork will maintain its shine and protection for 3 months, rims about 2 months.

The Product Table (ON THE NEXT PAGE) shows what to apply, when, how long to wait before applying more layers, and the type of cloths to use for each application.



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

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

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


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All Ford Day Steven Vasilevski

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Aloha Mustangers Rob Wiatrowski



In September and October 2018, my family decided to cross the pond halfway to Hawaii. Our main goal was to see the volcanoes on the Big Island and delve into the history of Pearl Harbour. Plus the fact that they have a great aviation museum on Ford Island, the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum was also there to satisfy my aviation bent.

We were there for three weeks and to cut a long story short, the volcanoes National Park was closed after the recent eruptions in May 2018. But in a cruel twist of fate, they were partially opening the park a week after we were leaving so we have made plans again this year to go back and see those darn volcanoes.

Yes, Pearl Harbour is a must see. We all have an idea of the events that happened there but like any truly immersive history lesson, being there adds another dimension to proceedings.





The USS Arizona Memorial is built over the remains of the sunken battleship USS Arizona, the final resting place for many of the 1,177 crewmen killed on December 7, 1941. And about half a mile away is the USS Missouri.

The "Mighty Mo" was the last American battleship ever built and the last to be decommissioned. Weighing over 58,000 tons and measuring just under 900 feet from bow to stern, the USS Missouri is a must see to understand the scale of a mid Twentieth Century full blown battleship.

The Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum has some great aircraft on display and two that caught my eye was a B17 that Flying Fortress splashed into Agaiambo Swamp in New Guinea, settling into five feet of water and thick grass, and there it lay for more than a half-century. Australian Army pilots who glimpsed it from overhead dubbed it the "Swamp Ghost."

The recovery of the 'Swamp Ghost' was made in 2006. The arduous process required the bomber to be disassembled in the swamp and the pieces flown out by helicopter. The wreckage spent four years on the docks in Lae pending the New Guinea government's approval to export it and finally the B-17E "Swamp Ghost" returned to Hawaii in 2014. And they have an Australian F111 on display. This aircraft is one of the original two dozen F-111Cs purchased by Australia.



I cannot miss mentioning the Grand Final was on the last Saturday of September and we watched it a day behind conveniently early on Friday night and all the sports bars were jammed with Aussies watching the game. How great it was seeing the Magpies lose to the Eagles and to make it worse for the black and white army, which seemed to come out of the woodwork in Waikiki, they lost by only five points.

I said to my wife if the Eagles won (which looked shaky up until mid-way in the last quarter) she could buy that diamond ring that cost, well let's just say well north of a grand (very well north). Great to see the Pies lose but not so great to see our trip's budget take a hit even further.



But what is of real interest as if the previous items are not interesting enough was what is called the Annual Floral Parade, which concludes the Aloha Festivals and unites the Hawaiian community for a colourful procession of Hawaiian culture on the last Saturday of September every year.

Intricate and vibrant floral floats make their way through Waikiki, men and women on horseback showcase the traditional art of Pau Riding (Hawaiian horse riding), and various community groups parade their activities to eager spectators.

The mission of Aloha Festivals according to their website is "to foster the Aloha Spirit through the perpetuation of the Hawaiian culture and the celebration of the diverse customs and traditions of Hawaii."

But cultural representation aside, various community groups need a ride to display their hard-working community members and this is where our car comes in.

The number of Mustang convertibles carrying their community representatives were a feast for club members eyes. One car had a sign stating they were a member of the 'Mustang Owners Club of Hawaii,' pretty much the same as our club logo and drummed home that we are really part of a worldwide community.

There were models from '65, '66, a Fox body and too many '18's to count. There was also an early 60's Vette, a '60's Triumph, a Sprite and some other cars, all 'verts.

I forgot what the floral festival was all about and thought how cultured it was to have Mustangs as the main parade cars. I have included just some of the photos of the parade and these are only a smattering of the cars at the event. Mark the last Saturday of September in your calendar and sit back and enjoy the parade.

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




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2019 Torquay Motor Show Steven Vasilevski

AUSTRALIAN SHELBY REGISTRY



The Australian Shelby Registry was created back in 2009 by the Australian Mustang Club and affiliated with Shelby American (SAAC) Australian

Shelby Owners and Mustang Motorsport. Nez Demaj was elected the Australian Shelby Registrar by the Australian Mustang Club and certified by SAAC in 2009.

The main objective of the Australian Shelby Registry is to create a data base of early and late model Shelbys and establish the amount and wherabouts of all Shelbys in Australia. Also, to have links with SAAC and to update their records, change of ownership and any relevant information of each Shelby produced. Once a Shelby owner has submitted their details such as their name, state of residence and Shelby details such as VIN and Shelby numbers then their information is loaded in the Australian Shelby Registry. Once submitted, the Shelby owners details are kept confidential at all times and never published in any magazines or websites. In each state of Australia, there are State Shelby Representatives who can assist any present Shelby owners with any questions relating to their Shelbys.

There are advantages in being an Australian Shelby Registry member as there are many Mustang and Shelby displays organised around the country so every Shelby member is contacted via email whenever there is an upcoming Shelby display. Also, when a Shelby owner decides to sell his/her Shelby, they can inform the Australian Shelby Registrar and he will email all Shelby Registry members.

The Australian Shelby Registry is a group of Shelby owners who come together at various Shelby displays around the country while enjoying each others company and their vehicles.

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

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
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
