

Once again this year's Mustang Round Up moved to a new location at the Deaf Children's Australia on St Kilda Rd. The weather on the day was the best we had in recent years which resulted in a little over 400 cars on display throughout the day.

As with previous years the first cars, trade stall holders and food venders began to arrive around 7:00am.

Everyone was greeted by the wonderful Parking Marshall's who'd happily position their vehicle in just the right spot. There was plenty of volunteer's who helped out throughout the day from setting the judging area or attending one of the many entry gates. Whilst everyone was busy with setting up the General Display and Judging Areas, Club Merchandise Stand, the Food Stands and all those little things that make our event one of the largest Mustang Car Show in the Australia. In addition, we had couple of others clubs come along on the day to observe what we do which just goes to show how well we do things.

Judging of the Show 'n' Shine & Concours vehicles kicked off around 9am with many entrants nervously waiting to hear what the judges were saying or writing down on the judging sheets. Whilst the judging started there was plenty of members doing all of those last minute touch ups and cleaning before the judges came around.

This year we had 8 vehicles entered into Showroom & Driven Concours and Shelby Nationals judged classes. All the Show 'n' Shine vehicles were been placed within a couple of areas. This made it a little easier to find the vehicles and getting the judging completed.

We are continually amazed with the high standard of the vehicles that are being presented to Show 'n' Shine judges. Many of these vehicles could easily take the next step into Concours judging and will continue to grow this area of the Mustang movement.

With the day starting to draw to a close, all the Show 'n' Shine entrants began to gather eagerly awaiting the announcement of the winners.

Congratulations to David Krampel in his Black 02 Coupe being awarded the Garnet Judd Memorial Award Most Outstanding Mustang. In addition David's vehicle won the inaugural Graham Folwell Memorial Award for Best 1979-2004 Mustang. David's vehicle is one of Australian delivered Mustangs that was converted by Tickford and his vehicle will be elevated to Concours judging next year after taking out the Top Show award, Congratulations and I sincerely hope David will take the next step.








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LIFE MEMBER RULES

Here's the rules to qualify for nomination as decided at our recent committee meeting. We took the SA Club's Rules and modified them to suit our needs. This was designed to stop comments about biased and mateship coming into play.

A very fair system. It was also decided unlike SA who put up members to the AGM once they have passed the criteria, These members are voted on at the AGM meeting to receive

We decided we would allow members to put up other members via email or forms placed around. These should go to the Secretary and be brought before the committee at the next meeting. The members in question would then be checked out to see if they passed the criteria.

They would then be asked for suitability after which they would be awarded Life Membership at our Concours Dinner

It was also decided that more than one member can be awarded Life Membership on the night.

All members that placed someone up for any awards including City and Country Members of the Year should be replied to with reasons why members were not awarded to alleviate further problems we have en-counted some months ago.

Here's an example of how a member can be nominated:

Has been a continuous paid up member for 23 Years Passes initial criteria, onto to point system example below.

- 1. Has been Vice President for 14 Years 2 Points x 14 Years = 28 Points
- 2. Has been a Committee Member for 5 Years 2 Points x 5 Years = 10 Points
- 3. Has assisted with 5 events 1 Point x 5 Years = 5 Points

Total = 43 Points - well above 30 points required.

Member qualifies to be nominated for LIfe Membership.

Petersen Automotive Museum

I was fortunate to be in Los Angeles in July on a summer vacation. Whilst the family stayed at Huntington Beach I took the day off with our rental car and visited the Petersen Automotive Museum in Los Angeles, what a great day it was.

After battling the LA traffic and the GPS working overtime, the 37 mile journey took 2 hours, the traffic was challenging to say the least, let alone the back streets of LA to get to the Museum.

As I arrived and parked the rental in the car park attached to the Museum, the first car I came across was a classic 66 Fastback in the car park. That was very good sign!

As I ventured into the Museum I was greeted by the friendly security guard who pointed me in the right direction of the front counter to pick up my tickets I had ordered online.

In addition to buying a general admission ticket I also booked the 2-hour underground 'Vault Tour', a private guided tour with 6 other people and a host and separate security guard from the Museum.

I thought the security was a bit over the top until I got into the underground Vault and looked at the cars they had on display. There were nearly 300 cars in the Vault with one car having an estimated value of \$25 million USD. It included some of the rarest and special cars from around

the world that have been bought/restored and collected by the Petersen Foundation.

No photos are permitted during the Vault Tour . The cars on display vary from Boyd Hot Rods, GT40 Fords, Shelby Mustangs, classic European sports cars, classic American Muscle cars, Keith Block rally cars and one-off manufacturer prototypes to Presidential vehicles.

After the Vault Tour I headed upstairs to the main

Museum (where photos are allowed) to spend the next few hours wandering the 3 levels of the car displays.

The 2 key exhibitions (which rotate each 6 months I understand) were the history of Porsche in the USA and the history of the Japanese Cars into North America.

In addition to these there was a large display of American Muscle cars including Mustangs and Corvettes.

It took me about 4 hours to get through the 3 levels which some incredible cars on display.

If you are in Los Angeles whilst travelling to the USA the Museum is definitely worth a visit and not a far ride from LAX airport or central LA.

I would strongly suggest you book the Vault Tour online before you leave; the Museum has over 400,000 visitors a year. Book a visit you will love it.





Geelong Revival 3 Tenths

Last year was a complete disaster Wet & Wild Wheel Spin in all 4 gears. It seemed as the timing was in days rather than seconds!!

The year before, my best time for my BOSS 302 was 15.2. All I wanted was 3

tenths to get into the 14 second bracket. On the Saturday it was damp. Myself, Tony Borg and others did the Car Show. The races that day started wet, but improved.

Now on Sunday morning, as I drove down the Esplanade it was overcast but dry. I was hoping for it to stay that way. I had lowered the rear tyre pressures and added a can of HORSEPOWER.

Now in the pits awaiting scrutineering a couple of drops of rain that didn't last. The first session was under way, I was first out in our group. I wait in line, keeping an eye on the engine temperature...now I drive up on the start line.

Remember you just need 3 tenths. All I have to do is two things - easy off the start to minimise the wheel spin and grow a pair before I brake.

Well, the first bit went out the window, the flag drops, first gear revs are up, pull the clutch and smoke pours off the tyres. 6800 grab second, aim for the bend 6500.. I see the finish line.

Push third, the BOSS really starts to get some legs, now hang on. The speedo needle is bouncing off 100 MPH?? The finishing line is getting closer and smaller, don't brake don't brake, back off, jump on the brakes pull back to second the rears give a chirp as they protest under load.

The time 14.8. I got 4 tenths.









Episode 2 - Washing & drying the bodywork, rims & tyres



In case you missed it... Part 1 of Peter's article -Cleaning the Wheels - is in the Spring 2018 Issue of Mustang Roundup.

In this second episode I'll guide you through how to wash and dry your car's bodywork and wheels.

The Tools:

Look at the Tool pics for what you'll use. Here's a list:

- 1. Rubber Gloves to protect your hands.
- 2. Bowden's products Nanolicious car wash.
- 3. 1 x Bowden's Shagtastic Wash Pad.
- 4. 1 x spray bottle of Bowden's After Glow.
- 5. 1 x Bowden's Big Green Sucker microfibre cloth.
- 6. 1 x Bowden's Grey Drop Bear microfibre cloth.
- 7. 1 x Leaf Blower.
- 8. 1 x Hose with controllable head shower, fan, vertical etc. with stop valve control attachment.
- 2 x Buckets one for suds and one for rinsing. Warm water helps.

Supercheap Auto or Autobarn will stock most of these items, especially the Bowden's products. I purchased my Wheel Woolies online from Chemical Guys.

Simply search for Chemical Guys or Bowden's Wheel Woolies. Bowden's set is more expensive than Chemicals Guys but the fourth angled brush makes it an attractive deal in my books.

The brushes minimize scratches as they are made from soft, absorbent wool-like material with flexible but strong handles. These brushes are best bought online, even from eBay, as stores will tend to not stock them due to their cost.

Supercheap Auto or Autobarn will stock all of the Bowden's products I mention. If you prefer a different brand then look for similar items to those I explain.

The type of microfibre cloth however is very important. More about this later in the drying section.

Tool - Wash Pad


Your wash pad should have a deep shag pile with a long and open microfibre construction. This is designed to allow any loose contaminants to be held deeper in the pad and not near the surface that touches the car during the wash. When you rinse the pad the shag pile releases any grit or other solid contaminants more easily.

You should not use washcloths such as a chamois, cotton towel, old rags, sponge or even a normal microfibre cloth as these tend to hold small pieces of dirt, fluff, leaf matter, seeds and grit within their weave. Being trapped by the tighter weave means this grit is less likely to be rinsed off and can more easily scratch the paintwork when continuing with your wash.

You can easily test this for yourself. When you next use a chamois, sponge, normal microfibre or other cloth look carefully at its surface. You'll be surprised how many small particles are trapped there ready to do harm! Check the grit stuck in this microfibre cloth.

The Technique - Washing

Your car's bodywork gets dirty from a range of contaminants. Dust, tree sap, mud, bird droppings, leaf litter and most of it gets rained on at some stage between washes making it stick more to the paint. It's important to loosen and rinse away as much of this as possible before touching the car with a wash pad. See the pic below and check the 'flooding' nature of the low-pressure spray from the hose. Be sure to go over the entire car to wet and loosen any grime.



First Rinse

Follow these steps to give your car's bodywork a thorough washing.

- Set yourself up with your hose with adjustable wash head, washing bucket, and rinsing bucket. In the wash bucket is Bowden's Nanolicious Wash. Its balanced PH is high sudsing to help lift and carry away dirt. It also offers UV protection to prolong the life of paintwork and rubber fittings.
- 2. After carefully rinsing the entire car go to a section where you want to commence the washing with suds. Let the weight of the wash pad only do the work. Do not push hard not even to remove stuck on contaminants. Just let them soak for longer and try again. Never wash in a circular motion otherwise you'll get swirls. I start at the rear of my car and go twice over the area I'm washing and I go in one direction only. On my boot I wash from side to side. See the picture here.

On the doors and mudguards I wash horizontally along the length of the car working from top to bottom on each section. Remember to include the windows for each section as well. On the bonnet I wash along its length from back to front. Use the same washing direction if you have a solid roof. I'll discuss how to wash a convertible soft-top in another episode. See the pictures below.

- 3. After you wash each section and are happy you have removed all contaminants it's time for a rinse. Use the same low-pressure shower setting that you used for the first rinse. Check the picture First Rinse on the previous page.
- 4. Continue to wash and rinse your car until all glass and panel areas have been cleaned.
- 5. After you have washed and rinsed your car it will look something like the image below. It's clean but there is too much water sitting on the surface. This makes drying a long and tedious task. Also, if we don't eliminate the bulk of the water, drying is likely to leave small water smears and scratches with any particles caught in the droplets. Our drying towels will also become waterlogged too quickly. We'll correct this in the next step.

6. Time for a final rinse. Get your hose and use a stop valve on the end. Close the valve and remove the wash head you used to rinse the car. Once the wash head has been removed you are ready to flood the bodywork with a flow of water that will sheet, drain away and leave very few droplets on the bodywork. Check the image here.

7. Go over the entire car from the roof, glass areas, boot and bonnet then the doors and mudguards. Flood the entire area with water and watch as the water sheets away leaving only a few water drops to be dried away.

8. After flooding you will notice a significant difference and how few water droplets remain to be dried. The image here shows the difference.

The Tips - Washing & Drying

Washing your car's bodywork will generally take less time than it took to wash your wheels. The entire car should take up to 10 minutes whereas your wheels probably took about 20 minutes in total. Keep the following tips in mind to achieve a great wash in the shortest time with the lowest risk of damaging your paintwork with scratches or swirls.

- 1. Use a low-pressure shower setting on your hose to wet and soak the entire car.
- 2. Use the two-bucket system to keep sudsy washing water clean.
- 3. Use a longhaired open-weave microfibre wash pad to aid washing away of contaminants.
- 4. Wash one panel at a time then rinse.
- Do not push hard on your wash pad or drying cloth. Let the pad / cloth do the job to minimize scratches.
- 6. Always wash and dry in straight lines to minimize swirls.
- 7. A final flood rinse will eliminate most water.

Next we'll dry the car and get it ready for the application of protection solutions.

The Tools - Drying

Your car's bodywork and wheels are now ready to be dried. Here is a shot of the items you'll use.

The drying tools are:

- 1. 1 x spray bottle of Bowden's After Glow.
- 2. 1 x Bowden's Big Green Sucker microfibre cloth.
- 3. 1 x Bowden's Grey Drop Bear microfibre cloth.
- 4. 1x Leaf Blower.



Tools - Drying

There are microfibre cloths and microfibre cloths. Always be sure to use the correct type for drying. For drying you need a microfibre that will easily absorb the water, hold it within its weave and not leave water bead streaks. Such a cloth will also not need any wringing out until the whole car has been dried thereby saving time.

The Big Green Sucker is such a microfibre. Other brands can be used but must adhere to the following composition to be effective.

The Big Green Sucker is a 1000GSM thick, soft, plush weave made with 70% polyester and 30% polyamide. So its weight, number of fibre strands, softness and percentage of polyamide mean it will last a very long time, be gentle on the paintwork and absorb huge amounts of water (2.5L) before needing to be wrung out. Its size of 40cm x 70cm means fewer passes are needed to dry each section of your car meaning less chance of scratching. The bright green colour also makes it easier to spot and remove any grit from the cloth.

Normal microfibre cloths, such as those bought in bulk from Bunnings, have a much lower GSM, are not as soft and their much thinner and shorter weave combined with only 20% or less polyamide mean they will not last as long, do not absorb as much water and are more prone to trapping grit and catching. Being only 28cm x 36cm they need to be wrung out after almost every pass meaning it will take you longer to dry your car and there is more potential for leaving water streaks that will require even further passes to dry your car increasing the chance of scratches. What are they good for? The best uses for these bulk microfibre cloths are the dirty tasks. Inside wheel arches, door jams, cleaning tyre treads, interior surface dusting, wiping out the engine bay, hoses and any other area where dirt or oils are a problem. Because they are so cheap they can be thrown away after use or can be washed separately, checked for grit and thrown away when you feel they are too worn to be useful.

The second cloth is the grey Drop Bear. A 34cm x 45cm 960GSM cloth used for a final wipe down after the water has been removed with the Green Sucker. It is soft, plush, and very absorbent and also lifts spray solutions such as waxes and detail sprays with ease without scratching.

Bowden's After Glow is a spray-on water absorbing fluid used in combination with the Big Green Sucker cloth. The spray is made of a solution that is a water absorbent drying aid so that when it comes into contact with water it absorbs it and carries it into the drying cloth more easily.

A leaf blower will dramatically reduce your drying time and because you are not touching the surface eliminates any possibility of scratches. However, it will not dry your car completely.

Using the leaf blower eliminates as much water as possible from those hard to dry areas – joins between bodywork panels, the area at the base of the windscreen, external mirror housings, the grill and of course the intricately designed rims and tyres. My Ozito blower is battery powered, has a high pressure and cost only \$79 from Bunnings. It was easily the best value blower in terms of its specs and price when compared to others that were available. If you already have a rechargeable system then consider purchasing the leaf blower for that system.

Follow the steps below to blow dry these difficult areas first before reaching for the microfibre cloth.

The Technique - Drying

Drying your car should only take between 15 to 20 minutes, including all bodywork, windows, door and boot jams, under the hood and in the engine bay where water collects. Follow these steps to achieve perfectly dry windows, bodywork and wheels.

The first 10 minutes or so will be using the leaf blower and the remaining time will be spent absorbing any remaining water on the bodywork with the microfibre cloth.

- Use the leaf blower starting from the top of the car.
 Don't try to dry the roof. After flooding there should be very little water there anyway, but do blow water from any gutters, from any crevices around windows and the windscreen.
- 2. Have your wiper blades extended. Use the blower to push water from the blade itself and the wiper arm.
- 3. Now move on to the mirrors. It is areas like this that collect water that cannot be easily removed with a cloth. Blow around the edges of the mirror so water trapped behind will be expelled. See the pic here.

4. Move now to the door panels, door handles, petrol cap, around the boot and bonnet. Then go on to areas around the lights and grill. There will be a lot of water trapped in all of these areas and it is very difficult to remove just with a cloth. The blower however will make it really easy. Work from the top of the grill, around the sides then along the bottom. You may have to do this a few times to remove all water.

5. Finish by blowing water from the tyres and rims. Start from the top of the tyre working from side to side, not up and down. Go around the rim where the tyre meets the rim and push the water from top to bottom. Go up and down each of the spokes, again, working from the top of the wheel down. All water should be being pushed downwards. You can also put the nozzle of the blower inside the rim to blow water from the brakes and inside of the rim itself although most of this will be blown away anyway while you are blowing the outside of the tyre and rim.

My wheels after the blow-dry. What would be a very difficult challenge to dry completely with a cloth is absolutely dry. All that needs doing to them now is a final dressing that I'll explain in the next episode.

- 6. Now just a word of WARNING. There will still be water on the body of the car. Don't be tempted to push it off with the leaf blower. You'll be chasing water droplets forever and you will not eliminate the water completely anyway. Leave what little water remains for soaking up with your microfibre cloth and the After Glow spray. We'll do this next.
- 7. Grab your Big Green Sucker and wet it. That's correct - wet it. Get it damp. You'll have to run it under a tap or dunk it into a bucket of clean water a few times. We don't want it soaking wet but just damp. Any microfibre cloth will not naturally absorb water. They work best when slightly damp.

8. Next get your After Glow spray. After Glow is a drying aid. It must NOT be sprayed onto the paintwork directly but onto your cloth. It will absorb water droplets and draw them into the microfibre cloth. Have the cloth opened out and spray one side.

Normally about six sprays over the cloth will be a good start. After Glow works best with your damp cloth. It will impart a shine, a long lasting sealant and water sheeting coating to the paintwork. Importantly it dries in around 30 seconds. That's long to dry one area before you go over the dried area for a final wipe down with the buffing cloth, which you'll see shortly.

9. Select an area to start on. I start at the boot and rear end, and then do the glass, doors and mirrors, mud guards and finish with the bonnet and grill. Here is what the water to be dried will look like.

10. Place your microfibre cloth, fully opened, flat onto the paintwork with the sprayed side facing down. Slowly draw it along the panel in a straight line. Pull slowly letting the weight of the cloth only do the work. Going slowly allows the After Glow too absorb the water into the cloth. It should take about 10 seconds to pull it down the length of the bonnet.

11. Move your cloth to a new section of the panel and continue to dry it slowly. If you see a small water bead trail you are moving too quickly or the cloth is not in full contact with the body. Make any adjustments by pushing the cloth into any undulations and try again.

Do NOT wipe backwards and forwards. This is not needed. Just one slow pass is enough. There is NO need to wring out the cloth. It will more than easily dry the entire car. Give it a try. In fact you'll be trying really hard to wring out any water from the cloth at all. Remember it can easily absorb up to 2.5L of water.

- 12. When you have finished drying one panel, put your Big Sucker somewhere safe - with the sprayed side facing in onto itself so it does not pick up any grit from where you rest it.
- 13. Next pick up your buffing cloth. This will smooth away the After Glow that may have left a light haze on the paintwork. Again, wipe in straight lines only and not back and forth. Just go in one direction only.

14. Move onto your next section of bodywork. Remember to place your buffing cloth safely on a clean surface to avoid contamination. Unfold your Green Sucker, spray with about three sprays of After Glow and continue. Reloading with After Glow after every few panels will aid water collection. Continue to dry the whole car including the rims if needed. Done!

What's up next?

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
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VACC Centennial Cavalcade

They had rockabilly bands playing at quite a few different venues, vendors selling everything from hotrod and muscle car parts to "T"shirts, food stalls and pubs that really got into the spirit of the theme. It's spread over a large part of town and the car shows are held in the Casino car parks, so you were driving from show to show and we probably only saw half what was on display.

FINDING MUSTANGS

Next we headed back south, down to Placerville and starting searching for a few Mustangs to bring back home. Like most of the stories that you hear, good Mustangs are getting very hard to find and that certainly rings true when you are searching for them.

I happen to find a 66 Mustang GT coupe over there before we left home and had a friend take a look at it for me. It seemed in reasonable condition with only a little bit of body work and a few bits and pieces to be done. I had it sent down to our panel beater/painter over there but he's such a perfectionist, that he doesn't like to do patch panel repairs, he would rather replace the complete panels.

So now I've got a restored GT sitting there waiting to come home.

What started out as a few minor repairs turned into new panels, a full respray, new tyres, trim pieces and a thousand other parts, so anyone looking for a beautiful White, blue pony trim Auto 66 GT let me know

Through a very close friend over there, I found a 1965 A code Mustang Fastback that is rust free but still in need of restoration and purchased it.

Next we found another rust free car, a 1967 Mustang Convertible which Pete bought that's in excellent condition. So now, we have two cars that needed to get to Longbeach CA to the shipping agent but more about them a little later.



BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, SPEED WEEK, UTAH

Back to the trip and we headed off west towards and onto the Bonneville Salt Flats to watch Speed Week for a few days. We stayed at one of the Casinos in West Wendover in Nevada and this is where most of the racers stay and obviously do a lot of bench racing.

There's one bar in particular that's called Carman's, but better known as the Chequered Flag bar just out of town and the place there is absolutely full of Bonneville memorabilia and of course the compulsory bench racing, but on a slightly more serious note.

After a few beers and talking to the many competitors there, including quite a few Australians, you can really start to understand and appreciate what they do and how the speed bug and truly bitten into them.



The following day were back on the Salt which most competitors call the "big white dyno" to watch some spectacular racing/time trials.

There must be 100's or more different racing classes and some of the competitors were very professional with huge truck and trailer set ups, massive motorhomes and huge sign written marques.

I did appreciate the home grown racers slightly more, you can see the true effort in trying to go fast on a budget, reminds me of Burt Munro and his Indian.

SPEEDWAY MOTORS MUSEUM OF AMERICAN SPEED, LINCOLN NEBRASKA

On the road again and we continued heading east towards Lincoln Nebraska to visit Speedway Motors Museum of American Speed.

The Museum of American Speed was founded in 1992 by "Speedy" Bill and Joyce Smith. Now if you're into anything automotive race related, racing history, pedal cars of every description, race engines, transmissions, racing memorabilia, racing workshops etc, this is an absolute must see. It's only open for four hours per day so it's a must, that you get there at opening time.

We spent the full four hours and some there and when we were talking to one of the volunteers, he noticed our accent and started to tell us about the connection they have with Australia.

When we thought we should be making our way out, he told us to stay back a bit because he wasn't in a hurry to leave so another hour and a half later we were still there.

The attached Speedway Motors parts store is another one to visit and chatting to the spare parts people, they told us about the great deals that could be had but my suitcase is only so big and it was already jam packed with Mustang parts.

I could go on about this place, which really would be an article on its own, so I do suggest that you check out their web site and like I said, it's a must see. I could have spent a week there going back every day.

INDIANAPOLIS MOTOR SPEEDWAY & MUSEUM, INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA

The next part of the trip had us heading still further east to take a tour of the famous Indianapolis Motor Speedway and Museum, commonly known as "The Brickyard" in Indianapolis, Indiana.

All ready for the tour and after paying an entrance fee, which we thought covered the tour, we hopped on the bus that was to be driving around the circuit. The tour guide came up and asked for our token and after explaining that we had already paid, we were told that it would be another \$20.00 for the bus ride and after looking around the bus we could see that others were in the same situation as us. So off the bus, back into the Museum, paid the \$20.00 and then back on for the tour.

The tour guide was extremely knowledgeable about the track, its history and track operations. Recently a tradition has started that when a driver finishes first, that they go down and kiss the bricks at the start line.

We were to be given the same opportunity only the bricks in question were in the pit area and weren't the original bricks and that's when Pete said I might as well kiss the bricks on my house to which there was quite a bit of laughter not only from me but the others around us.



The Museum is well worth the visit with an enormous amount of history and a huge number of NASCARs from the very early years to current on display.






HENRY FORD MUSEUM, DETROIT, MICHIGAN

The following day had us driving five hours east we headed towards Detroit Michigan to spend a few days at the Henry Ford Museum. Like most of the Museums we had visited along the way this one again is a must see but be prepared to spend a few days there.

There is so much to see, not only for the Ford car enthusiast but the amount of history covering cars of all makes, early racing cars, trucks, huge early steam trains, aeroplanes, tractors, early farm machinery, massive steam engines, early fifties furniture, heating stoves, early lighting, buildings, musical instruments, early fifties dinner's and list just goes on and on.



We spent two full days there and I still reckon there sections that we missed. There are literary hundreds of items on display, including interactive displays for the little kids and slightly bigger (or older like Pete and I) kids, so there is defiantly something for everyone.

We also did the Rouge factory tour where the F150 is being built. The factory and its history were fascinating and the very knowledgeable tour guides made the trip certainly worthwhile.

DEADWOOD HOTROD SHOW, SOUTH DAKOTA.

After leaving Detroit we headed west towards Chicago on our way to South Dakota. The town of Deadwood in South Dakota, is a fantastic place for a Hotrod show. The town reminds me very much of old historic towns here in Australia like Clunes, Bendigo or Ballarat with their fascinating old buildings and surroundings. The Deadwood Hotrod show, like quite a few that we had come across in the US, runs over four days. Most would think, after all of our travels, that we would start to get sick of Hotrod/car shows, but believe me we were just getting started.



The four days are so full of activities with rockabilly bands playing in the main street, hotels and restaurants getting into the theme, people dressed in their best fifties clothing, to having complete roads blocked off for the rockabilly bands night performances.

These people just love driving their cars everywhere. The continuous parade of cars around the town was just amazing and went well into the night. The quality of the hotrods on display in and around the town is what you would normally find at high end under cover car shows here in Australia.

The thing that I did notice is the lack of police presence and for very good reason; everyone was just there for the hotrod show and nothing else. The unfortunate part of the show for two guys like us on a budget, is the price of accommodation. We arrived there quite early and spent the whole day at the car shows and visiting a few watering holes just to make sure we stay hydrated.

By the very early morning after spending a bit of time in one of the casinos, we thought we would try to find a room. Normally when there are no shows on, the rates are a very reasonable \$80 to \$100.00 per night. However, this particular night, we were told that one room, for one night, was going to be \$438.00!

So back to the casino stayed a little longer, went back to our 2013 Mustang convertible and had a little nap in the car. Up early, back to the casino to use their complementary facilities, and spent another day at the show. The town is completely surrounded by mountains which makes for an awesome backdrop to the show.

Again after a full day at the show, we headed further west and found a reasonably priced hotel about one hundred miles out.

A good night's sleep and our next destination was Seattle, Washington. In Seattle, we have friends there that we met in 2014 on the Mustang's 50th and as you probably already have guessed, they are car people just like us.

It is amazing when you meet likeminded people; you gain a friendship that lasts forever. After staying there and sharing car related stories, we headed off to another friend's place in Seattle, only this time we are actually doing some tourist sightseeing stuff.

A few days there and since we were so close to Canada, we went to Vancouver and then onto Whistler for a few days sightseeing.

Sightseeing stuff all over with, time to get back to the real reason were there, muscle car/hotrod stuff. We started heading south towards Seattle and while we were travelling, we heard about a car show in Ferndale WA. This show was held in a casino car park and again we were not disappointed with the quality of cars/hotrods on display.

Travelling the country looking at different shows, gives you a deep appreciation to the amount of work that goes into some of these vehicles, these were show class vehicles in a parking lot.

Spent the day there and managed to get a chance to talk to quite a few car owners and what I found interesting is the amount of money or better put, the little amount of money needed, to get the cars up to such a high standard. The cost of some parts that I was making a comparison with, is mind boggling, we certainly pay a premium price here in Australia for our parts.

SHIPPING AGENT, LONGBEACH, LOS ANGELES

Back down to Placerville, it was now about the time we had to start thinking about getting our cars down to the shipping agent in Longbeach LA.

By now, most of you would have heard some horrendous stories about the Asbestos issues we are having here in Australia and how it has been affecting the import of some cars.

After reading every single bit of information I could get my hands on regarding these problems, and speaking to the shipping agent, it turns out not such a big deal after all.



You just have to be prepared to have your car inspected before it leaves the US for any asbestos contamination and in particular, the brake friction material and the exhaust gaskets and seals and if it passes, it's all good to send back home.

To save some of the hassles and to reduce the cost of the asbestos check, I removed all of the brake linings, exhaust gaskets and carpet from the Fastback, pressure washed every single part of the car including the underside and interior before I took it down to LA on the trailer.

With the Fastback loaded with all the necessary parts to complete the restoration, securely strapped down onto the trailer and Pete ready to drive down to LA, we headed off around five am the following day to try and beat the traffic.

Traffic in LA does not seem to have any special time zones; it is hectic anytime of the day or night.

The slow eight hour drive towing the trailer with my mates F250 and Pete following close behind, had us at the shipping agent around two in the afternoon.

One of the first lessons we learnt early on when in the US, is to never rely on your GPS unless you absolutely have too, because the one we were using, must have had its very own sense of humour and had us going around in circles in LA just for fun.

When we finally got there, we quickly jacked up Pete's convertible and removed all of the brake linings and exhaust gaskets from it as well. This might seem like a bit of an over kill, but it

did make the process for Asbestos checking quite a bit quicker and had a cost saving as well.

Once the cars were in the depot and all the paper work was sorted, now it's just a matter of waiting to see how long it takes to get to Australia. There were quite a few cars in front of ours waiting to get shipped out but the average sailing time once the cars are packed in the container and on the ship is only twenty days and then around a week to unload and get through customs.

Left the shipping agent around five pm heading back up to Placerville and the drive was somewhat quicker without having to worry about my Fastback on the trailer.

GRASS VALLEY HOTROD AND CUSTOM CAR SHOW, GRASS VALLEY, CALIFORNIA

The following weekend had us travelling slightly north to another

fantastic three-day car show in Grass Valley CA. Like all of the others before, we were not disappointed with the quantity and quality of the cars there. The show was laid out in very beautiful parkland setting with established trees and neatly cut lawns, so there was ample shade

and plenty of space for around three hundred muscle cars, bikes, hotrods, boats and vintage machinery.

They had an area called the 'Corral' where you can sell your cars and if I hadn't already bought my Fastback, I would have certainly bought a car from there. The prices were very reasonable, providing you don't take into account our poor dollar exchange rate.

Like most of the shows around the US there are always great vendors and food trucks to keep you interested and well fed. I still find it amazing, that no matter what part of the world you happen to be in, if you are at a car show, everyone is friendly and loves to chat.

SHELBY MUSEUM, LAS VEGAS SPEEDWAY AND SPEED VEGAS, LAS VEGAS NEVADA

One part of this trip was to spend a week down in Las Vegas. Las Vegas is the home to the Shelby Museum, Las Vegas Speedway and Speed Vegas but to name a few. We first did the Shelby Museum which has been relocated from the Las Vegas Speedway to their new show room and work shop only a few miles out of town.

Our tour guide was a personal friend of Carroll's, and he had some fascinating stories to tell. The show room was as you can imagine, was full of Shelby's of all descriptions,' memorabilia and souvenirs.

During the tour of the cars, our guide managed to describe the true value Shelby had on the three major car manufactures and the major impact Shelby had on racing and his own personal racing career.

The tour also had us walking behind the scenes of the workshop and again our guide gave an in depth spin on the

happenings of the factory, all in all, a great place to visit even if you're

Next on the agenda was a Cars and Coffee event held at Speed Vegas on the Saturday. Speed Vegas is a type of race track where you can hire a Ferrari, Lamborghini, Porsche, Audi, Mercedes, Nissan GTR or a Shelby Mustang to do several laps on the track all at a premium price of course. The cars and coffee show must have had around seventy cars and hotrods there. They not only had coffee trucks there, but food vendors, a band and even had event sponsors.

During the week there, we went and purchased tickets for the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series meeting to be held on Sunday.

Got up early on Sunday because they were excepting a huge crowd and we didn't want to be parking miles away. Well getting there with what we would call early 8.00 am, for a 2.00 pm start, wasn't quite early enough, the car park at that time was more than half full. Once inside there was plenty to see and do around the track. With a packed lunch and plenty of water, we made our way in and found our seats.

The track layout is fantastic and you had an almost clear view of the track no matter where you may have been sitting.

There was plenty of commentary while you were waiting with driver and team interviews on the big screens. Come race time and the crowd was starting to get very excited as the drivers started making their way out onto the track.

This race was set for 267 laps and when the flag dropped, the exhaust and engine noise coming from these cars as they raced past was deafening. I'm not a huge NASCAR fan, but this is one thing I've always wanted to see while I was in the US. I certainly wasn't disappointed with the actual race, although the first 100 laps were a bit confusing to a novice like me, but as soon as the race was approaching the last 50 laps you can see that the racing was taken up a notch or two.

The drivers were taking higher ricks and headed out to the top of the banking for that extra bit of speed into the corners. This of course caused some spectacular slides and wall touches that again had the crowd standing and cheering. I would definitely do it again, the atmosphere of the crowd, racing and venue was fantastic.

THE LAST BIT

Just to finish off this part of our trip, we must have visited around 25 different auto wreckers or more commonly known as "Junk Yards" over there. One in particular, was a yard we had visited back in 2014 and when we arrived there, the first thing the owner said was "I remember you two, you're Aussies" so I think we must have left some sort of impression on him.

Another one is Turners in Fresno in CA. The junk yard, which covers 70 acres, has been run by the same family since the early 40's and they have cars from 1928 to present and still have remains of some cars from those early years.

One of the main things we have always tried to do, is we tend to stay off the main highways and get onto the back roads to see the real America. We found some very unusual road side stalls, antique shops that looks as though time has stood still, saw some of the most beautiful country side, met some wonderful people and a few weird ones to throw into the mix, ate some good ol' southern food and had an absolutely fantastic time.

We did around 8500 miles (13,600 kilometres) in that six weeks in a 2013 Mustang convertible and that's not counting the few trips from Placerville to LA and back moving cars around in our mates F250.

A visit to Birdswood motor museum too. Then up to Mildura and home via the trail. Then we wondered if anyone else would enjoy such a drive.

We were planning for a departure in first week of October and then the idea came to us to put a small notice in Roundup.

Deadline for next issue was September 5 so we figured it would give time for any interested co-travellers to respond. Unfortunately we didn't allow for the production time. In the notice we suggested a departure date of October 15, but we were flexible. In fact flexibility has been a byword for this journey. Originally we planned for October 1st but then No 1 Sister (who has assumed the mantle of Matriarch after passing of Mother) announced a "family lunch" was to be organised, for October 7th. Then several medical episodes interrupted plans, the lunch was delayed by a fortnight, etc.

Our copy of Roundup arrived a couple of days before the announced departure date so we figured everyone else was in the same boat, that if they were interested they would have no time to plan and join us and would have assumed we were on our way.

Our departure date ended up being November 10th! Then there was another issue that became involved. I had also wanted to visit Canberra to see preparations for the Centenary of Armistice.

It would only take a day or so to catch up on the things I wanted to do, but add to that a day's travel each way and it seems a little impractical. But, what if we looked at plans from a different angle? A while ago we followed a caravan and on the back was the message "Every day is a Chooseday."

Consequently, plans got changed a little bit. We packed the Canary and headed off to Canberra on Saturday November 10th. Arriving late afternoon we dropped bags in to our hotel then headed out for dinner.

One of the things we enjoy about Canberra is the variety of restaurants. A nice casual dinner on the sidewalk in Manuka then we headed to the War Memorial to see images from WW1 being projected on to the walls of the building.



To one side portraits were projected on to a large tree most amazing. The mood of the people who milled around and took it in was very respectful. We also saw thousands of plastic seats lined up for the official ceremony to be held

On Sunday we stopped at a public carpark and took a shuttle bus to the memorial for the official ceremony. With trusty fold-up seats (always loaded in the boot of the Canary) we joined the throng outside the formal seating zone. (The seated zone was open to all-comers but you had

to book and we didn't find out until too late.)

Massed bands and honour guards trooped in (and the occasional one assisted out after standing in the sunshine) then the Prime Minister arrived.

There were some interesting comments about him driving up in a luxury German vehicle.

We joined in the observances then checked out the sea of 62,000 crocheted poppies set up across the lawns.

Back to collect the Canary then it was off to the Parliament building where there was a carpet of crocheted poppies in the forecourt. A few other calls, to The Mint, the Arboretum,

the National Museum and our day was done. We rested up in

our room before searching for food, this time in Kingston.

Now we could get down to the real reason for this trip. On Monday morning we drove out of the national capital

and headed down the highway back towards Melbourne, except that we turned off and took the road to Wagga Wagga, through Deniliquin and ended up in Echuca. I had originally wanted to make Swan Hill but local advice was to be prepared for "lots" of kangaroos, we stopped at Echuca, which was a fortunate thing.

When we went out for our daily search for food we stumbled in to a Greek restaurant where I was served what I believe to be the best Greek meal I have ever enjoyed. I was still talking about it days later and can taste it now as I write this.

From Echuca we headed to Swan Hill and then turned left in search of the Silo Trail. Because of where we started this part of the trip we did things a little out of order but caught up with all 6 towns that form the trail. Patchewollock,

> Lascelles, Rosebery, Brim, Sheep Hills and Rupanyup.

All are different and mostly feature images of local identities. Planned overnight in Horsham became a bit difficult as nearly every motel was full. Apparently there are a lot of contractors working on wind farms etc and they have filled most rooms in the town. We did find a room but it was fairly ordinary. From Horsham we headed

west towards South Australia. The road was good, traffic flowed and we settled into the swing of it.

Across the border and we passed through a fly-speck on the map called Coonalpyn. Here was another painted silo, created by the one artist who has done more than one. His other work is at Brim and the style is very similar.

Further on and we landed in Tailem Bend (a name I've always thought had romantic "outback" images). Just before you reach Tailem there is a large Rydge's Hotel, out in the middle of nowhere. We had heard stories that there was an automotive experience here at "The Bend Motorsport Park". A complex of tracks accommodating everything from Super Cars to go-carts.

With various options and facilities this could be an interesting stop for a group heading to SA. They have Track Days and on-site accommodation (or in Tailem Bend proper) and is something I will investigate at a later date.

We made it to Adelaide and with the help of the Canary's GPS we found our hotel. After a long day of driving the 20 minute walk to a nearby eatery street for dinner was most welcome. Well, it would have been 20 minutes except that we passed a Ford dealer and they had a new Bullitt Mustang in the showroom. A walk inside (they were still open at 6:30 pm) and we discovered the green machine had a sold sticker on the window but we chatted with an enthusiastic sales guy.

The following day we used a local bus service to head in to the CBD. Interesting sights, Rundle Mall was a hive of activity. Attractive building styles from years gone by. We wandered over to the Torrens and surrounding parklands. Strolled and soaked up the atmosphere on a nice sunny day.

The following day we went driving again. This time to Birdswood and the National Motor Museum. A winding road in to the Adelaide Hills, we were last here 16 years ago.



The facility has changed somewhat (as you would expect) but still holds some interesting vehicles, like the last truck used by Tom Kruse on the Birdsville Track mail run, a Force 7, one of 10 prototypes built by Leyland to compete with the Monaro, a mock-up of an all-female garage and chauffer service that operated out of Kew.



A number of vehicles brought back memories for both of us, of vehicles from collective pasts. There were a few cars missing so that when they have an Austin 16, a Renault Dauphine and a Ford Capri (1993 model) then their collection will hold even more meaning for us. Also, sadly, we did not see a Mustang here. Then it was a scenic drive back to Adelaide.

Leaving the SA capital we headed back up the motorway through the Adelaide Hills and retraced our steps back to Tailem Bend where we turned off and headed to the coast.

We decided to take the scenic route homeward and headed to Mt Gambier to see the Blue Lake. And blue it was. Apparently in November it is at its bluest. We also looked for a hotel to bunk up for the night but half a dozen all in a row were all full. Bugger it, Portland is only 100 km away so we drove on. 5:30 in Mt Gambier, a hundred kms and we should be in Portland around 6:30, except that we were crossing the time zone back in to Victoria and we finally got in to town and found a bed well after 7pm.

Still, a room with a nice view of the sea front, the hotel had a good restaurant and we tucked in. The pokie barn was also very friendly, though not friendly enough to cover the bill for the night.

Last day and we took the scenic route from Portland to Woodend. A side trip to Dartmoor to see a row of sculptures of WW1 figures, carved from old trees by chainsaw. Then it was to Hamilton and Ballarat and finally home. We drove 3525 kms over 9 days, saw a dozen or more Mustangs on the road and ate food in more places than I'd care to remember.

A couple of observations. We never get "lost" because we always take "the scenic route". Along the way we observed a paddock with more than 20 camels grazing and at another location we watched a koala strolling down the road looking for a new tree to call home.

Next time we plan a trip we will try and give the world more notice and if somebody wants to come along we will enjoy the company.

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
42nd Annual Winton Historic




