
I hope you all get a chance to spend some time with your family and friends over the coming festive season and take a break from the hustle and bustle of every day life.


Depending on when you read this....as you can see from the main pic below, my daughter Danielle is due to have a baby soon. All is set to be an exciting Christmas this year.



After a 4 year break due to COVID and last year's adverse weather, this year's our annual Mustang Round Up & State Concours was held on the Gloria Pyke netball courts within Dandenong showgrounds district.

On Saturday we had around 20 volunteers help complete the marking out of the display area and this was completed in approximately 2½ hours which

greatly assisted with placing of cars on Sunday.

When I woke up on Sunday, I was a little excited & nervous as it's been a few years since our last Round Up and it was first time our oldest child was coming along with me on the day in our cars. Just as the judging started there was plenty members doing all of those last-minute touch up's and cleaning before the judges came around. This year we had 21 vehicles entered in to Showroom & Driven Concours and Shelby Nationals judged classes which is largest in many a year.

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
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Fox Classic Car Museum Tour

Housed in what once was a Royal Mint, the Fox Classic Car Collection in Collins Street, Docklands stands as a testament to some of the rarest and most prestigious vehicles in the world. Over the span of fifty years, Lindsay Fox, the visionary founder of Linfox, has curated an awe-inspiring collection of automotive excellence.

Opened in 1997, the Collection showcases almost a century

in automotive technology and design with models from Mercedes Benz, Jaguar, Porsche, Ferrari, Bentley, Volkswagen, Ford, Lexus, Nissan and MG made between 1923 and 2023 found at the Museum. However, Lamborghinis were noted by their absence as they are not desired by Mr Fox.

Other vehicles such as rare Austin Atlantics, Austin Healeys, a USD 10 million 1938 former Nazi

ambassador's Mercedes and a very expensive "James Dean" Porsche Spyder were also present.

Notable previous owners of some vehicles include Ringo Star, Bing Crosby and Bob Jane to name a few.

Drawing from over 250 rare and exotic vehicles, this ever changing collection is a 'must visit' for any car enthusiast, historian and lover of all things spectacular! Lindsay Fox is a known collector and prestige sellers from around the world seek him out. A member of the Porsche family did just that when he offered a stunning collection of sapphire Porsches for sale.

Unfortunately, two of my favourite cars were not present. Godzilla was at the workshop receiving a new clutch and Ringo Starr's magnificent maroon Mercedes Grand 600

limousine was taking a break.

No Mustangs were to be seen either however I am assured that Mr Fox does own a couple of them. Ford was represented by a pair superb Ford GT's from 2020 and 2005.

Two, soon to be legends, Mercedes-AMG ONE hybrid supercars at USD 2.7 million each are on order. We look forward to seeing them!

A hearty lunch followed at one of my favourite pubs, the historic Old England Hotel in Heidelberg. It is a former stage coach hotel that was also used as a base by the famous Heidelberg School of Australian Impressionist painters in the late 1800's. A photo of a Myer Emporium staff Christmas party held there in the early 1900's adorns a wall.

Finally, what could Mr Lindsay Fox's daily driver possibly be? Of course, it is a chauffeur driven Mercedes-Maybach!

One Saturday morning I was in Bendigo for the Central Crew Coffee & Cars gathering when I sat down with John Chapman for a chat about Mustangs.

- PB "When did you join the Mustang Owners Club?"
- **JC** "1989"
- PB "What is you club membership number?"
- **JC** "282."
- PB "Positions held within the club?"
- JC "Mainly as the Convenor of the Central Crew but also as a judge during the State Concours."
- PB "First memory of a Mustang?"
- JC "In Echuca, up there for the Nationals, I was walking around with Ian Bloom, I was actually looking for a '55-'57 Chev and I found a '67 convertible Mustang instead."
- PB "How many Mustangs have you had?"
- JC "Four."
- PB "What Mustangs do you currently own?"
- JC "The '67 convertible."
- PB "So you bought and owned then sold 3 other cars?"
- JC "Yes."
- PB "What is your most desired Mustang?"
- JC "A '67 Shelby."
- PB "Best Mustang drive?"
- JC "In the convertible to the Adelaide Nationals in 1990. We finished working on it on the Wednesday and drove it to Adelaide on the Friday."
- PB "What is your favourite Mustang Story?"
- JC "This could be a lengthy story but it involved the '67 convertible. We stripped it right down, had to cut some rust out of it then rebuild it to take to Adelaide for the Nationals."
- PB "What is your daily driver?"
- JC "A BA Falcon V8 Fairmont Ghia."
- PB "Timeline within the club Executive? What positions have you held?"
- JC "On the Committee? None. All my involvement has been with the Central Victorian Crew. In 1994 a few of us gathered for a meal and to discuss the idea of forming a small group in Central Victoria and from there this is where we are today. The highlight for me was in 1999 when the Nationals were held here in Bendigo. It took some convincing to get the State

executive to agree but we did and in doing so we were able to save the club financially. There was about \$60 in the bank account and when we finished it was around \$80,000. We set it up at the Tom Flood Sports Centre, closed the gates and made everyone pay to get in. We had groups of people in their houses making up gift bags. We had quite a few donations to give away and we ended up walking through the crowd handing them out. We had a few 'discussions' with the State Executive but we were able to get the Treasurer (Ron Minogue) on board and that helped us get through. In the end the Central Crew organised a 2nd Nationals in Bendigo then a further 2, one each in Ballarat and Geelong before the State team took over

- PB "Most admired club member?"
- JC "lan Collins. We've had many discussions, some of them heated, but I consider him to be a very good friend. Also, the 3 ladies who address each meeting and organise the social activities. I admire them because of the work they put in."
- **PB** "Do you have a vision of the club going forward?"
- JC "Always have done. I believe that long term we need our own club rooms. At one time I suggested that we could have set up at Essendon Airfield. Lots of parking, we could have had access to a hanger and with tradie club members we could have done a good job, but in the end it didn't happen.
- PB "Do you have a pool room?"
- JC "No."
- PB "Do you have a favourite drive."
- **JC** "Up and along the Murray Valley Highway. Love that."
- PB "Last question. When you jump in to the car what do you put in to the cassette or CD player?"
- JC "I have a cassette titled 'Mustang Hits of the Road', and it's all hits of the '50s and '60s."
- **PB** "Thank you for that. Let's hope there are many more drives in front of us."


Where apart from magnificent scenery we also encountered a wandering bull, an unaware cyclist & an unexpected effluent sprinkler.

I had almost given up hope when I got a call from Ian that Steve Lond (the then president) had just brought in a car from the US which they thought would be perfect for me. Well, one trip out to Mustangs of Melbourne and I was in love, I'd found my pony!

The year I got my car, the Mustang Nationals were being held in Adelaide. Having grown up there, my sister and I decided we should go so I could show off my pride and joy to our Adelaide family and friends.

> We were again taken under the wing of Londy & Richo and we spent the 2 day drive to Adelaide sandwiched between them "so they could make sure we were ok" (I had already driven that trip by myself multiple times to visit our family mind you!).

The highlight of the trip was meeting up with some Bendigo crew at the overnight stop. We'd never met Roger & Angela

Williams before, but they were an absolutely ball. We probably shouldn't mention driving along a one lane highway and all of a sudden, this blue Mustang pulling alongside and Rog taking a photo of us at 100 kph (yes, he was also driving!).

After arriving in Adelaide, I was all keen for the Saturday cruise because it was going up the northern beaches which was our neck of the woods.

As fate would have it, my mustang decided it didn't want to partake in that particular journey. Well, Mustangers to the rescue, guys from all around came to help and it was diagnosed that I needed a new starter motor.

Londy grabbed Nick Duyvestyn and asked him to call his son who worked at

Repco to source a new started motor (unbeknown to any of us, this was the random start to a completely new life, more about that later). > boot upholstery. Steve has since also done interior restoration, carby and numerous other things (all too technical for me to remember).

Aggie isn't fast, and she isn't a show car but she's a survivor and still manages to turn a few heads on the road and she really brings

CAR CARE Tools, Techniques & Tips

Episode 20 - Detailing Extras - Part 2 of 2

In the last episode, Detailing Extras – 1 of 2, you were introduced to a range of products and tools to consider having in your Extras Kit. So, in this 20th episode I have a final set of products, and tools, covering Detailing Extras – 2 of 2.

To help you choose what to buy, and maybe when, these extras cover the following categories:

- Protection products.
- Enhancement products.

Protection

If your car is ready for protection products, then the following should be added to your Extras Kit. You should consider a quality wax, and a sealant, to lock in the wax, depth of colour, and shine.





For cars without a Ceramic Coating protection a quality Carnauba wax adds depth and shine. I would recommend Bowden's Carnauba Body Wax, or feel free to choose your favourite quality Carnauba wax.

If your car does have a Ceramic Coating then there is probably no need to add wax or sealants. There is nothing wrong with adding these products as sacrificial layers. They can only prolong the life of the Ceramic Coating. I would recommend Bowden's Lazy Wax spray.

For single stage/clear coat only paint, use Bowden's Carnauba Body Wax. If your time is precious, you could use Lazy Wax instead. It is much easier to apply, and remove, with excellent results.

TIP: If you choose a different wax, be sure it does not contain a cleaning action – abrasives. You just want a pure wax.

If you have a choice, opt for Carnauba, as it is the best there is. This is due to its optical brilliance. Its flat flake composition makes light reflect in straight lines, giving the strongest, and best shine possible. On the other hand, synthetic waxes have a multi-faceted construction and they scatter the light in different directions meaning any reflection is not as bright or intense.

Waxing Single Stage/Clear Coat Paintwork:

- Spread Carnauba Body Wax evenly onto your applicator pad.
- 2. Use slow, gentle circles following a straight line along, then work back across, your chosen panel.
- You want a light layer of wax only. Thicker is harder to remove!
- 4. When a light haze appears use the short pile side of a Big Blue Softie to remove the product.
- 5. Now use the long pile side of another Big Blue Softie to do a final buff. Continue as needed.

If your car has a Ceramic Coat, and you want to apply Bowden's Lazy Wax, follow along. This Carnauba Wax spray will apply a beautifully warm, deep gloss to your paintwork especially if it is a darker colour.

Waxing Ceramic Coat Paintwork:

- 1. Spray Lazy Wax on to one section of a panel.
- 2. Using the short pile of a Big Blue Softie gently spread it along the panel following straight lines.
- 3. Keep spreading until there is a very light haze.
- 4. When the light haze appears use the short pile side of a Big Blue Softie to remove the product.
- 5. Now use the long pile side of another Big Blue Softie to do a final buff. Continue as needed.

TIP: If you still see a haze after buffing, it means your cloth is not dry enough. Use a new, dry Big Blue Softie, long pile side, or a Drop Bear.



Another product for your Extras Kit is Bowden's Fully Slick. You could use other products of your choosing, but do ensure you choose one that is synthetic and will seal the underlying organic Carnauba Wax layer.

A synthetic sealant will last longer than organic products.

Without a synthetic sealant the wax would deteriorate and wear off after just a few weeks or washes.

Remember that these are sacrificial layers. They help protect

underlying paintwork from damage.

Bowden's Fully Slick is added on top of the wax. It will apply a really smooth finish to the surface of the paint with the added benefit of UV protection. So, your paint will be less likely to fade.

Applying Fully Slick

- Apply Fully Slick by spraying onto the short pile side of a Big Blue Softie, and use that to spread it over the panel
- Spread Fully Slick over the area working in straight lines.
- 3. As soon as you have applied Fully Slick remove it by buffing with either a Drop Bear or the plush or longer weave side of a Big Softie. I prefer to use a Drop Bear due to its deeper pile and greater absorbency coming from its higher percentage of polyamide fibres.

TIP: Don't worry about it going onto glass, chrome or plastic. Like Lazy Wax, it does not leave any white residue. Just wipe of excess with a dry Big Blue Softie or Drop Bear.



Bowden's Boss Gloss is a product deserving of being added to your Extras Kit. It's a very effective dust removal product and shine enhancer. I like to use it after a wash just to add that extra sparkle.

I use it to remove any dust that has settled on the journey to a car show, or just prior to judging if dust has fallen due to passing foot traffic. Boss Gloss can also help wipe away any rain from the bodywork.

Its formula actively lifts water and draws it into your Big Blue Softie or Big Green Sucker.

For dust removal this is the product of choice. You can remove light dust without washing.

- Spray Boss Gloss over the panel where you want dust removed.
- Grab a dry Big Green Sucker. Spray it lightly with Boss Gloss for lubrication.
- Hold it lengthways across the panel.
- Slowly draw it down the panel rotating the leading edge of the cloth up, and away from the bodywork, as you move the cloth along the panel.
- This action lifts the dust away from the panel rather than dragging the dusty cloth over the paintwork.
- Continue slowly running it along the panel, lifting the moisture into the cloth.
- A slight haze appears. Wait for this haze to dry a little, and buff with a dry Drop Bear, or the long pile of a Big Blue Softie, giving a clear finish.

Do not use the same side of the cloth again! It is impregnated with dust and you do not want to scratch the paintwork! Turn your cloth to a new section and clean the next panel. Continue to use new cloths as you remove the dust from all panels.

A final buff with a dry Drop Bear or the plush side of a Big Blue Softie will ensure all haze has been removed leaving a high shine to the paintwork.

Protecting Matte, Satin Or Wrapped Paint

Some cars require specialized products for their protection. Matte, satin and wrapped paint are types of finish that need these special products. Not everyone need add these to their Extras Kit, but if you own such a car, then these products will be essential additions you need to have.

Matte/satin paint and wraps are more sensitive to pollutants than regular paint, clear coat or ceramic coatings.

Pollutant fallout; water spotting; dirt and dust; bird droppings; and insects, all present potential damage to these surfaces. They can become badly marked, and degraded quickly, if not dealt with ASAP. Rinsing with water, as soon as you can, will keep these paints and wraps in good order.

TIP: Did you know? Matte / satin finishes are made of a matte clear coat. Instead of it being glossy, it contains larger particles that give a more blobby or rougher surface that reflects light in a multitude of directions thereby eliminating any gloss normally associated with a clear coat.





These special surfaces must be maintained very carefully otherwise damage will occur.

Regular maintenance is the key to keeping them looking pristine. Keep these points in mind:

- Wash regularly by hand with a microfibre cloth as all others will scratch.
- Wash with Bowden's Auto Body Gel and never one that contains shine or protectants!
- Dry with the long pile side of a damp Big Blue Softie to soak up water then use a leaf blower.
- Buff gently with a Drop Bear to avoid scratches.
- Add specialized protectants to seal and protect from UV and contaminants.

The two products shown above are ones I would recommend to protect, and then maintain, your special painted surface or wrap.

CAR CARE Tools, Techniques & Tips

Episode 20 - Detailing Extras - Part 2 of 2



Protecting Glass

Clean glass, and a glass cleaner, work for a time to help water roll of the glass.

Applying Rain-X greatly enhances, and extends, the water shedding capacity for many months due to the Nano particle and hydrophobic nature of the product. It gets into the pores of the glass to seal it with a slippery surface.

I apply Rain-X to the external surfaces of the windscreen, rear

view mirrors and rear window. You can choose to apply it to side windows if you like.

Apply a few sprays of Rain-X onto the applicator pad to start.

- 1. Apply Rain-X to a small section.
- 2. Move in overlapping circles to work it in.
- 3. Apply more Rain-X to your pad and ensure the surface is fully, and evenly, covered.
- 4. Move to another section and apply the Rain-X while the previous section dries.
- 5. Once a section has a dry haze, immediately apply a second coat of protection.
- 6. Once dry, use a new microfibre cloth to buff it away with the short pile of a Big Blue Softie.
- 7. Turn the cloth to a new section if you see streaks.
- 8. Leave the treated glass to cure for about an hour.
- 9. Use a Green Clean Glass cloth wrapped around a wand to give a final buffing polish to the glass.

TIP: Depending on how contaminated the glass is you may need to complete this process twice. Turn to a new section of the steel wool, and microfibre cloth frequently, to ensure you are not contaminating what you have just cleaned!

Enhancement products

Enhancement products assist in the rectification of paintwork that has scratches or swirls.

We do all we can to protect our paintwork from scratches, but realistically, scratches are inevitable. The trick with enhancement products is to minimize these scratches from view. This will prolong the time before a professional paint correction is needed.

Products you can use fall into three categories - colour correction wax, touch up paint and glazes.

Colour Correction Waxes

A correction wax fills light scratches with a wax of a similar colour to your paintwork. The wax fills the light scratches. Its colour blends with the colour of your paintwork, hiding the scratch.

Turtle Wax Color Magic has a range of colours designed specifically for this enhancement process.



The Color Magic product is offered in a range of popular colours. I have the red and the black. I have used both on my paintwork, and rims, to great effect, especially before car shows, where I want to ensure any light scratches are as hidden as possible.

Apply it as you would any other wax. Add protection on top, as previously explained, to ensure the longevity of this product to at least a few months.

Touch up Paint

Every car will get stone chips and scratches that may require filling with touch up paint. Sometimes this paint is supplied with your car, or you can purchase it from your



dealer. I have found such paint to be thick after many years of sitting in the garage, and difficult to apply. However, there is a much better alternative that I think is an essential addition to any Extras Kit of tools.

Dupli-Color touch up paint can be purchased in any colour, so long as you know your cars paint code. Auto accessory stores do stock it, but have a very limited range indeed.

Better to order directly online.

Here is what you will get with a Dupli-Color pen:

- 1. Fine scraper to prepare the scratch or chip.
- 2. Fine point paint nib.
- 3. Brush paintbrush.
- 4. Sealed paint reservoir.
- 5. Clear coat paintbrush.
- 6. Clear coat reservoir.

The pen contains everything you need to repair small scratches and stone chips. Easy to apply, and with a clear coat as well, fabulous results. Here are the details to find your colour:



Glazes

Using a glaze is another way of enhancing the look of slightly scratched paintwork. Even if there are no scratches, a glaze is capable of adding an intense shine to all paintwork, especially white cars.



All glazes contain fillers that will hide, or mask, swirls, and light scratches, allowing light to reflect more evenly off the paint with more of it shining into the eyes of the observer – it will look brighter and more shiny – just right for a car show!

There are two types of glaze - those that contain abrasives, for cleaning with a micro-cutting action, plus fillers, and those with no abrasives - fillers only.



Meguiar's #7 Show Car Glaze is a good place to start. It does contain an abrasive, so take care. It will wear away your paint layers. Use a thin layer only as white residue can be left behind requiring further cleanup and buffing.

Those containing abrasives help remove light swirls and scratches, and in doing so will wear away the clear coat, or single stage paint, and a ceramic coat. If your paint really needs any more than a light touchup, then a full professional polishing is better.

TIP: Never use an abrasive glaze on a ceramiccoated car. The coating will be damaged reducing its effectiveness and longevity. Remember, it is by cutting that a ceramic coat is removed! Use Auto Finesse Ultra Glaze for a glaze with no abrasives. It contains fillers only. Other glazes may even contain a wax for shine enhancement.

A glaze is applied in the same way as a wax. Just be careful to ensure there is no white residue left over. Allow any glaze to cure for at least an hour to check haze residue and before adding wax.

You can find Meguiar's Mirror Glaze at most auto stores. Auto Finesse Ultra Glaze, however, must be ordered online. Here are the AUS ordering details:

Black Plastic Enhancement

Mr. Black is an extremely useful Bowden's product used to renew black plastic whether it is wheel arch plastics, bumper, grill, lower lip or valance plastics. Literally, any black plastic that needs to be refreshed, to be looking darker and more consistent, needs to have Mr. Black applied. You could also choose any other similar product if you like.



I purchased the Mr. Black Box (\$85). The Box comes with applicators, and a special applicator brush, for applying Mr. Black to tricky areas. Gloves, cloth, and Flash Prep are in the box. Great value.

Mr. Black requires the plastic to be absolutely clean with no contaminants, so follow the cleaning and application instructions carefully.

Mr. Black uses very concentrated, and fluid, dark dyes. It is formulated for all black external plastics. The Mr. Black bottle will do many cars. Use it sparingly. Applying too much is just going to waste it.

With a few drops on the applicator spread the dye to the plastic. Go over previously applied areas in a different direction for full coverage.

Let soak for a few minutes. Use the second applicator to gently wipe over the area to even it out.

Let Mr. Black dry for about 10 minutes. Wipe with a normal microfibre to lift away un-dried Mr. Black.

What's up next?

You now have an Essentials Kit and an Extras Kit. Use these items to improve your skills. Enjoy!

AUSTRALIAN SHELBY REGISTRY



The Australian Shelby Registry was created back in 2009 by the Australian Mustang Club and affiliated with Shelby American (SAAC) Australian

Shelby Owners and Mustang Motorsport. Nez Demaj was elected the Australian Shelby Registrar by the Australian Mustang Club and certified by SAAC in 2009.

The main objective of the Australian Shelby Registry is to create a data base of early and late model Shelbys and establish the amount and wherabouts of all Shelbys in Australia. Also, to have links with SAAC and to update their records, change of ownership and any relevant information of each Shelby produced.

Once a Shelby owner has submitted their details such as their name, state of residence and Shelby details such as VIN and Shelby numbers then their information is loaded in the Australian Shelby Registry. Once submitted, the Shelby owners details are kept confidential at all times and never published in any magazines or websites. In each state of Australia, there are State Shelby Representatives who can assist any present Shelby owners with any questions relating to their Shelbys.

There are advantages in being an Australian Shelby Registry member as there are many Mustang and Shelby displays organised around the country so every Shelby member is contacted via email whenever there is an upcoming Shelby display. Also, when a Shelby owner decides to sell his/her Shelby, they can inform the Australian Shelby Registrar and he will email all Shelby Registry members.

The Australian Shelby Registry is a group of Shelby owners who come together at various Shelby displays around the country while enjoying each others company and their vehicles.

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


